## Election Day is Tuesday

Tuesday is General Election Day, and registered voters in Jackson County are encouraged to exercise their right to vote for national, state and local representatives.

Voting polls in Jackson County will be open for 12 consecutive hours from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in each precinct.

The ballot will include positions for U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives Kansas District 2, governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, commissioner of insurance, Kansas House of Representatives 61<sup>st</sup> District, Kansas House of Representatives 62<sup>nd</sup> District and district one county commissioner.

Township clerks will be selected for each of the county's townships.

Jackson County voters will also be asked to retain two Supreme

Court judges, eight members of the court of appeals and one district court judge.

All Kansas voters will be asked whether they support a constitutional amendment to make "raffles" legal in the Kansas.

Voters in Liberty and Netawaka Townships will be asked whether they support an 8-mill tax levy for USD 113. Also, voters in the Straight Creek Township will have an additional question on their ballot asking whether they support a \$9.8 million bond issue for Atchison County USD 377 facility improvements.

All voters must present a photo ID when voting. The photo ID will be used to verify each voter's name and appearance, not their address.

## Local history to be shared during "Second Saturday"

The history of Holton's Town Square and many of the buildings that house its businesses will be the focus of the second "Second Saturday" promotion, coming up from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. this Saturday, Nov. 8 on the Square.

"Historical Holton" is the theme of Holton/Jackson County Chamber of Commerce's monthly event, which features Holton's past on display at many participating businesses in addition to retail shopping specials, drink samplings and refreshments, according to Chamber director Carolyn McKee. The evening culminates in a dinner and Civil War-themed presentation at Your Place or Mine, 501 E. Fifth St., with Boyd and Helen Plankinton (see related story).

"Everybody's going to have a little piece of history about their place, and that includes Your Place or Mine," McKee said, noting that at one time, Holton had a soda bottling company that occupied the same building that houses Your Place or Mine today.

The event will also feature a "retro decor" display at expressions Flowers and Gifts, 406 Pennsylvania Ave.,

in memory of longtime Holton resident Judy Hann, who died this past August.

"Judy was into different 'retro' things," McKee said.

Going back a little further than "retro," Hotel Josephine, located at Fifth Street and Ohio Avenue, will celebrate 125 years of lodging in the community with a historic presentation on the hotel. Bell Graphics, 118 E. Fifth St., will be open for what McKee advertised as a "bare bones" tour of the old printing facility that dates back nearly a century, as does some of the printing equipment inside. Its former owner, Gary Bell, will be in front of Ann's Home Health at 107 W. Fourth St. with his band, the Fence Row Special.

Businesses that once occupied places on the Square will also be spotlighted at two locations where new businesses may be found. At Jayhawk TV and Appliance, 435 New York Ave., memorabilia from the location's time

## Plankintons to offer living history of Civil War life

For nearly two decades, Boyd and Helen Murphy Plankinton of Holton have enjoyed sharing their knowledge of events and artifacts of olden days with their "living history" presentations that have taken them around the state and across the country.

This coming Saturday, Nov. 8, the Plankintons will offer a presentation of Civil War life, both on the battle front and the home front, as part of the Holton/Jackson County Chamber of Commerce's Second Saturday event, "Historical Holton." They'll be featured at a dinner presentation that evening at Your Place or Mine, 501 E. Fifth St. in Holton, with dinner start-

ing at 6 p.m.

"We'll talk about the events leading up to the Civil War, and I'll talk about the role of the civilian and the fashion of the time," Helen Murphy Plankinton said of Saturday's presentation. "We're hoping it will be educational, but also entertaining."

The Plankintons have participated in a number of local and national living history events since 1996, ranging in location from Lecompton to Gettysburg, Pa. Boyd has participated in Civil War battle reenactments, such as the battle that occurred in Gettysburg, Helen said.

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## Trout stocked at Elkhorn

On Friday, Holton Parks and Recreation director Mike Reichle helped officials from the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism stock 1,000 trout in Elkhorn Lake at Rafters Park for anglers to come and catch starting on Saturday.

This marks the fifth year that the City of Holton has worked with KDWP's Community Fisheries Assistance Program (CFAP) to stock Elkhorn Lake with trout in the colder months of the year, as trout tend to thrive in colder waters. But what Reichle appreciates more is that it's gotten more people to come to Elkhorn to fish.

"It's fantastic. There are more anglers at Elkhorn than we've ever seen before because of this trout program," he said. "This lake was hardly used before we started in with this program. Now, we've got them out there waiting for the trout to be delivered."

Elkhorn will be stocked with an-

other 3,000 trout this winter, with Reichle noting that 1,500 more trout will go into the lake each month over the next two months. The annual trout fishing season began Saturday and continues through April 15, 2015, he added.

Another draw for the trout program at Elkhorn involves the tagging of six fish, Reichle said. Anyone who catches a tagged fish during trout season may bring the tag to Holton City Hall to claim a prize of \$25 in "Chamber Bucks" and a \$25 gift certificate from Holton Parks and Recreation.

CFAP stocks both of the city's lakes — Elkhorn and Prairie Lake — with fish, and the cost of getting fish put into the lakes is covered mainly through state fishing license sales. The program has also provided the city with grants to make improvements at the two lakes, such as the fishing dock that was built in recent years at Elkhorn.



## 5 Years Ago

Week of Nov. 2-8, 2009

Cheryl Stanley, business and computer teacher at Jackson Heights High School, was recognized for five years of teaching business in Kansas at the annual Kansas Business Education Association Convention. Stanley was also honored as 2009 FBLA Advisor of the Year and 2008 Kansas Rookie Business Educator of the Year.

# Mayetta resident sought in drug-related case

The Jackson County Sheriff's Office is seeking information about the location of Roy Hector Wahquahboshkuk Jr., 38, of Mayetta. Wahquahboshkuk is also known as "Buck."

According to Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse, Wahquahboshkuk is wanted on a Jackson County District Court warrant on charges of conspiracy to manufacture a controlled substance, possession of precursor products with intent to manufacture a controlled substance and possession of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia.

On Aug. 7, Jackson County deputies served a search warrant at 608 W. Third St. in Holton, and following the search, arrest warrants were issued for Wahquahboshkuk, Jennifer Christine Jackson, 37, of Holton; Paige Ann Borchert, 22, of Manhattan; Michael Ray Johnson, 29, of Manhattan; Lisa Helene Morris, 37, of Mayetta; and Martin R. Knoxsah, 56, of Mayetta.

Borchert, Jackson, Knoxsah, Morris and Johnson were all arrested on Sept. 17 on various drug charges,

Morse reported.

Wahquahboshkuk is believed to be staying on the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation near Mayetta or in the Topeka area. A reward is being offered for information leading to his capture.

## More than 110 new voters registered on reservation for Nov. 4 general election

This election year in Kansas, Native Americans on the Prairie Band Potawatomi Reservation have decided that they are going to try and make a change.

Through a "Get Out the Native Vote" campaign, a group of local volunteers recently got organized and went door-to-door to get more people to vote.

And it worked. In less than a month, the committee has signed up more than 114 new registered voters that could have an impact on the Tuesday general election. Especially in Kansas where some incumbents are battling for their positions in hotly contested challenges that are making the national news.

Media groups like MSNBC and CNN are suggesting that the governor's race and Senate race are just too close to call. The political climate in this year's election also has other candidates feeling the heat from recent numbers being reported by the latest polls.

Members of the "Get Out the Native Vote" group organized after learning that Native Americans are one of the most unregistered groups of voters in the United States. Ten volunteers decided to organize a campaign with the help of the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) that is one of the oldest, largest and most representative American Indian and Alaska Native organizations in the United States.

They developed their campaign that was patterned after the NCAI template called Native Vote ([nativevote.org](http://nativevote.org)) that was developed several years ago.

"We tried to hit as many locations on the reservation as possible," said PBPN member and volunteer Paula Hopkins. "It was especially important to get the word out. PBPN government buildings like the Potawatomi Health Center, the Firekeepers Elder Center and Boys & Girls Club were places where the volunteers set up registration tables. The group was particularly interested in targeting Native Americans who have never voted, like elders and young adults."

With the election date closing in, the group is still working to keep the community informed about the voting process. Emails from Verna Simon, another volunteer, have been circulating about how to get people to vote in advance and people can be seen wearing their nativevote.org buttons and t-shirts all around the reservation.

Whatever happens at the polls Tuesday, the PBPN are playing a part and have scheduled a Native Vote Election Day Potluck on that day to celebrate the end of the campaign.

## Cold Weather Rule extends through March 31

The Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) reminds Kansans that the Cold Weather Rule took effect Nov. 1 and remains in effect through March 31, it has been reported.

"The Cold Weather Rule helps to ensure that Kansans can be warm in their home this winter," said Chair Shari Feist Albrecht. "We encourage consumers to take steps to prepare for colder temperatures. Steps can include making sure heating equipment is in good working order, thermostats are set at a reasonable level, weather strip and caulk windows and doorways - these things can cut down on heating costs."

The Cold Weather Rule in most cases prevents or limits utility companies from disconnecting a customer's natural gas or electric service during periods of extreme cold. The rule requires utility companies to offer a 12-month payment plan to allow consumers to maintain or re-establish utility service.

**Disconnection Conditions:**

- Utility companies may not initiate disconnection until temperatures are forecast to be above 35 degrees for the next 48 hours.
- Utility companies must attempt to contact the customer by phone or in person 24 hours before disconnecting service.
- Utility companies are prohibited from disconnecting a customer's service when temperatures are forecast to be at or below 35 degrees over the next 24 hours.

The KCC wants Kansans to have the electric and gas service needed to keep their homes warm during winter months. The KCC also recognizes the customer's responsibility to make arrangements to pay for that service.

The Cold Weather Rule was designed in 1983 to ensure that both goals are met. Any residential customer with a past due balance will qualify for payment arrangements under the rule. However, it is the customer's responsibility to contact the gas or electric company to make those arrangements.

**Payment Plan conditions to maintain or restore service:**

- Customers must contact their utility company and inform that they cannot pay their bill in full.
- Customers must agree to pay 1/12th of the total amount owed, 1/12th of the current bill, the full amount of any disconnection or reconnection fee, plus any applicable deposit to the utility.
- Customers must agree to pay the remaining balance in equal payments over the next 11 months, in addition to their current monthly bill.

The Cold Weather Rule applies only to residential customers of electric and natural gas utility companies under the KCC's jurisdiction. For a complete list of utilities regulated by

Kansans who want to compare health and dental plans and then purchase them through the Affordable Care Act's online marketplace can do so starting on Sunday, Nov. 15, the beginning of the second online open enrollment.

Those who purchased online marketplace health insurance last year are now receiving notices from HealthCare.gov or their insurance companies. The information discusses possible changes in existing health coverage, renewing that coverage, or enrolling in new health insurance coverage for 2015.

These notices also provide information about what to do if you used a tax credit to help pay for your insurance last year and want to do that again for 2015.

There are four key dates concerning this marketplace open enrollment:

**Nov. 15:** Open enrollment begins. If you don't have coverage you can apply for new coverage that will begin as early as Jan. 1, 2015. If you'd like to make a change, you can shop for and enroll in new coverage. Or you may be able to keep your existing marketplace plan.

**Dec. 15:** Enroll by this date if you want your coverage to begin on Jan. 1, 2015. If your health plan is changing or you want to enroll in a differ-

ent plan, enroll by this date to avoid a lapse in coverage.

**Dec. 31:** Coverage ends for plans purchased for 2014. Also, if you purchased coverage for 2014 and have decided to purchase a new plan for 2015, make sure you notify your insurance company that you are making a change so you aren't accidentally enrolled in two different plans for 2015.

**Feb. 15, 2015:** Open enrollment ends. This is the last day you can apply for 2015 coverage to begin March 1 unless you qualify for a special enrollment period.

Kansans who want to get a jump on information concerning the online enrollment process before Nov. 15 can do so by going online to [InsureKS.org](http://InsureKS.org), the Kansas Insurance Department's informational site for ACA information.

The department's Web site also has tools to help you find health insurance agents, navigators, or certified application counselors in your area to help you with enrollment, to learn about planned navigator events, and to estimate your tax credit. You can also get information on the federally-operated exchange in our state by going to [HealthCare.gov](http://HealthCare.gov).

We strongly encourage Kansans who want to purchase health insurance for 2015 and would like some assistance with getting enrolled to contact the health insurance agents,

navigators, and certified application counselors working in their communities who are trained to help you get enrolled.

These in-person assisters can help you understand the different health insurance plans that are available in your area, the costs of the plans, what they cover, which doctors and hospitals are in the network, the prescription drugs they cover, and whether or not you may qualify for financial assistance to help pay for insurance.

Financial assistance is only available for plans purchased through [HealthCare.gov](http://HealthCare.gov).

Under the Affordable Care Act, all citizens, with some exceptions, must have health insurance or pay a tax penalty. The penalty for 2015 is \$325 per adult (up to \$975 for a family) or 2 percent of taxable income above your filing limit, whichever is greater.

For 2015, large employers with 100 or more employees must provide coverage for their employees that is affordable and adequate. Employers with more than 50 but fewer than 100 employees will need to provide coverage for their employees beginning in 2016. IRS rules define who must be counted.

Small employers, those with fewer than 50 employees, are not required to provide insurance for their employees. However, if they choose to

provide coverage, they may qualify for a tax credit for coverage purchased through the federal marketplace.

Regardless of whether you are buying coverage for the first time, looking to make a change, or renewing the coverage you had last year, go shopping on [HealthCare.gov](http://HealthCare.gov) or work directly with one of our Kansas insurance companies or Kansas agents to make sure you are getting the best coverage for you and your family.





## RV volleyball qualifies for semis

To start competition at the Class 4A-DII state tournament in Salina, the Royal Valley volleyball team faced one of its toughest tests right away.

In its first match of pool play, the Panthers went up against the third-seeded Bulldogs of Baldwin, who ended up winning the pool and finishing runner-up in the state tournament.

The Bulldogs were not a totally unfamiliar team as RV coach Denise Visocky likened them to Nemaha Central with their height in the middle, but playing on a bigger stage for the first time seemed to get to the Panthers and some first-time jitters seemed to affect the team.

Royal Valley fell behind 7-2 early in both sets against Baldwin and couldn't rally back as the Bulldogs' front row kept the pressure on. Just when the Panthers cut the deficit to four points in the opening set, Baldwin got a kill and an ace following a timeout to pull away.

One of the biggest issues the Panthers faced in that match against Baldwin was that the team couldn't get in a rhythm and that was something Visocky stressed going into the very next match against second-seeded Holcomb.

"When we played Holcomb, we just needed to settle down, relax and play our type of game and kind of get in some rhythm. I think the girls were excited about that to get some rhythm and take care of Holcomb," Visocky said.

It showed early as Royal Valley had very little trouble taking down the Longhorns in the first set. The only real hiccup came as libero Jaycee Worrell took a hard dive on a dig attempt and had to come out of the match for a short time.

Having the rare opportunity to play in a state tournament, though, Worrell said she was focused on working through the pain and finishing out her career back on the court.

When Worrell re-entered the match, the Panthers were holding firm to a four-point lead. Then, Holcomb started to fall apart while the Panthers kept on the attack as a block from Anna Johnson made it a 17-10 game before the Panthers cruised to the first set victory.

The second set didn't quite go the same way as the Panthers continued to execute their strategy, but it didn't turn into points on the scoreboard as the team's precision was off in that second set. Royal Valley had its chances in the end, but Holcomb ended up forcing a third set.

In another tight one, the Panthers built

up a three-point lead early thanks to a big block from Johnson and an ace by Ali Bryan. That lead held most of the way as Kate Hanson finally got going on the attack and helped the Panthers maintain their advantage.

With their season on the line, though, the Longhorns mounted a rally and took advantage of some RV errors before Sarah Beam righted the ship and came up big with three straight attacks (and two kills) that led to the final three points of the match, giving Royal Valley the three-set victory.

Beam's finish and the match against Holcomb in general helped the Panthers build some momentum going into their final match of pool play.

"We were trying to force things a little bit instead of letting them happen naturally," Visocky said of the team's early play. "It was good for us to kind of face Holcomb the second match. They're a good team, but we knew that we could go out there and really get into a groove and try to get back on our feet."

The Panthers then closed out pool play against number seven seed TMP-Marian in a match that would decide the runner-up in the pool.

Things looked bleak early as the Monarchs were in control, while the Panthers were struggling with errors and net calls that allowed TMP-Marian to take the first set.

With their backs against the wall, the Panthers responded in the following set, though it took a while for the team to feel the pressure. Royal Valley dug itself a 21-16 hole before it really got going.

At that point, the Panthers' front row really stepped up as Sarah Beam had a crucial kill to get the team within two points before Hannah Beam and Hanson combined for back-to-back blocks that tied the game up, 24-24.

"We knew that if we didn't get going then it could be over for us and none of us were ready for it to be over," Beam said.

Beam then delivered one final block (of six total) that secured a victory for the Panthers in the second set.

"We take that momentum from being able to stop people at the net with a huge block. I think that made a big difference," Visocky said. "Against Baldwin, we just couldn't get a lot of touches. We just weren't lining up right. When we got a lot of those against Holcomb and TMP both, I think that really helped us."

In the final set, the Panthers fell in a hole early before Macy Putnam had a

seven-point service streak to give RV a 14-12 lead. That was just one of the many runs that both teams went on, though, as the set played out like one in which the teams' tournament lives were at stake.

Royal Valley scored eight straight points and 13 of 16 to take a 20-15 lead, but the Monarchs answered with an eight-point run of their own to go up 23-20.

"I told them we have to relax, focus on the little things for us and play our game no matter what and take care of business," Visocky said during timeouts. "It was great to see them all step up to the plate and if something went wrong, then they would go back and work 10 times harder to get something back going in the right way."

As the Panthers worked to tie it, the teams then seemed to get stuck in a rut of attacks followed by errors as neither could get the necessary separation. That is, until Johnson and Sarah Beam combined for a block to give RV the advantage and Hannah Beam delivered the game-winning ace (her third of the match) that secured the Panthers' spot in the state semifinals.

## Panthers won't be denied, take third at state tourney

For a team playing in its first state tournament in program history, which spans 40 years, there were bound to be some jitters for the Royal Valley volleyball team over the weekend, especially when the Panthers found themselves playing for a third-place trophy.

That certainly could have added to the anxiety Royal Valley was feeling at the Class 4A-DII state tournament in Salina, but coach Denise Visocky noted she tried her best to keep her team loose in order to play to its potential. Sometimes the right icebreaker can calm the nerves and Visocky's timing couldn't have been better in the third-place match against Iola.

"I called a timeout and tried to get them relaxed a little bit and told them, 'I know your fans all came to watch you play and your parents, but we really don't have to make this go three' and they all laughed about it," Visocky said. "To lighten the mood, it made a difference. They all went back out with a smile on and we came right back into the game."

After that, Royal Valley went right ahead and closed out the match against Iola in straight sets (25-22, 25-22) to claim the first ever state trophy in program history.

"It was a really good feeling. It's nothing I've ever felt before," senior Hannah Beam said.

"It's a wonderful honor," fellow senior Jaycee Worrell added. "I've never been to state, so it's something I've never experienced and to do it in my very last year was the best feeling ever."

The Panthers, a team Visocky noted has not been particularly fond of morning matches this season, came out sluggish in a semifinal match against eventual state champion Clay Center to start bracket play on Saturday.

At one point, Royal Valley had five errors in a row in the first set of the day (and an error to end the match) as Clay Center pulled away for the 25-9, 25-18 victory to move onto the championship.

Visocky said some of the same problems that plagued the Panthers in pool play reared their heads in the match with the Tigers as Royal Valley could not get into a rhythm on offense and was not playing to its strengths.

Going into the consolation final, Royal Valley focused on turning that around and it started to show early in the first set against Iola. After a block from Anna Johnson and back-to-back aces from Hannah Beam tied the game, the Panthers pulled ahead as they got going on the attack with Macy Putnam and Kate Hanson converting back-to-back kills to give RV a 12-10 lead.

The Panthers started to pull away from there as Visocky said the attacks from middle hitters Hanson and Johnson opened up some things for Hannah and Sara Beam on the outside, which is when Royal Valley is at its best.

While Iola came back to tie the match at 16-16, Royal Valley got through on the strength of Hannah Beam's third ace of the set before Johnson delivered a key kill late that cemented the return of the Panthers' attack on the way to a first set victory.

"I feel like the more amped up we got, the more we figured out that we had this shot, we had this chance to get third and that's never happened in our school, so I feel that really helped us move along to get the win," Johnson said.

"I feel like that either we win together or we lose together and I felt like we all wanted to win, so I feel like we knew we had it. We worked so hard that I just feel like we deserved what we had," Worrell added.

In the second set, Iola jumped out to a 6-1 lead before Visocky took that crucial timeout. Sarah Beam then got in on the action as she had a key kill to keep the Panthers within one before

Johnson started to take over towards the end of the match.

Johnson's fifth block of the match tied things up at 16-16, while Erica Pruyser was in the midst of a five-point service streak that saw the Panthers take an 18-16 lead. Hannah Beam and Johnson then combined for a block (after a Beam kill) a little while later that put Royal Valley ahead 21-18.

From there, the ending was a little bit anticlimactic as some Iola errors locked up the Panthers' third-place finish. A win is a win, though, and as an Iola serve sailed long for the final point, the Panthers got to celebrate, even if there were some nerves to the very end.

"I thought that the line was really close, so I thought, 'thank God it's going out,'" Caitlin Burns said of watching that final serve.

With that final point, Royal Valley's historic 2014 season came to a close, ending with the most wins in program history (26), the first state trophy and the first two state banners to hang in the RVHS gym, something Visocky and her players said was a focal point of the weekend.

With the past struggles and lack of history with the sport at RVHS, Visocky said she felt her players were very much attuned to what they were in the process of doing at the state tournament and it hit them right after the match with Iola. "I think all of that compiled and it hit them hard as soon as that ball was served out of bounds and they were pumped," Visocky said. "I'm so proud of all of our kids that were here, all of our JV kids, too, for building such a great program this year and having success at every level."



# Turnovers costly for RV as HHS rolls in district finale

With the Holton football team having already locked up the district title, there may have appeared to be very little for the Wildcats to play for in Friday's district finale against Royal Valley in Hoyt.

The Panthers had been eliminated from playoff contention the previous week and Royal Valley couldn't manage to go out on a positive note as HHS dominated the game early and often on the way to a 51-6 victory.

"I thought it was a tough circumstance and then as the game went on we kind of had some things where we had a lot of turnovers and didn't make it too hard on them," RV coach Jake Lott said.

Royal Valley went three and out and punted to start the game and the Wildcats wasted no time getting on the scoreboard. Holton took over at midfield and proceeded to grind out its first scoring drive, with Luis Butto capping things off with a one-yard touchdown run.

The Panthers then got a quick first down before eventually being forced to punt again and Indie Allen proceeded to get the ball rolling for the Wildcats with a 65-yard touchdown run on the first play after the change of possession, creating some issues for the RV defense.

"After that first drive, I mean the floodgates just opened. We put too much pressure on ourselves on the play side and quit remembering our job on the back side," Lott said.

Then, Butto did the same after the Panthers' next punt as he took the fifth play of the Wildcats' next drive 66 yards to the end zone to put HHS up 20-0 at the start of the second quarter. Butto and Allen both finished the night with 100-plus rushing yards and two touchdowns, which HHS coach Brooks Barta said illustrated the balance of this group of backs.

"I think any of our backs can do that, from quarterback to fullback to running back, so I think we're as balanced as we've ever been at that position," Barta said.

After that is when the turnover issues started to take effect for Royal Valley, as the Panthers gave the ball

away on the first play of their next drive before Allen struck again for Holton.

Following that, Royal Valley started to move the ball on offense and went for it on fourth down near midfield only to fumble the ball again right into the hands of Holton's Justin Rieschick who returned it 50 yards for the score to put HHS up 34-0.

That was one of six turnovers the Wildcat defense forced in the game and Barta attributed that strong effort to the team being focused on two particular aspects on that side of the ball.

"It's kind of a balance between being aggressive and being option sound and I thought we were very aggressive on their inside dive and kind of forced them a little deeper into the backfield. We just tried to disrupt their rhythm and their offense," Barta said.

Royal Valley finally did start to find a rhythm late in the first half as Derrick Barger entered the game at quarterback for Zack Lux who was battling a hip pointer leading up to Friday's game.

Lott said the move was aimed to jumpstart the offense and it seemingly did as the Panthers drove inside the red zone with time winding down in the first half. That drive ended with another turnover, though, as consistency continued to plague the Panthers.

"When we made our reads, we were successful and when we didn't, there were miscues. On top of that, we'd have a good play to get a first down and then we'd miss a block, so there's just consistency issues on our part against a good team that's going to do its job every time," Lott said.

A pass interference penalty on Royal Valley then gave the Wildcats some additional help and set the HHS offense up for another score to start the second half, with Butto sprinting in from 29 yards out.

The Panthers then fumbled on the first play of the next two drives, which Holton turned into 10 points thanks to an 18-yard field goal from Arturo Reveles and an 11-yard touchdown run by Rieschick, making it 51-0 in favor of the visitors.

In the fourth quarter, Royal Valley started to grind out some yards again as a 39-yard run by Derrick Barger set up a short touchdown run by Garrett Schultz, but it was too little, too late as the Wildcats were well on their way to the 51-6 victory.

"I just thought our kids were well-prepared. I think it was real easy to overlook a game that didn't have an impact on the playoffs and I thought we had a nice week of preparation," Barta said. "We were just happy that our kids didn't overlook Royal Valley. I thought we played well and we had some guys step in and play well for us."

Rieschick was one of those guys who started at quarterback in place of Trey Tanking who had been dealing with some cramping issues. Now, Holton (8-1) will get ready to host Osawatomie (6-3) in playoff action at 7 p.m. on Friday night.

Meanwhile, the season comes to an end for Royal Valley (2-7). While it wasn't the end the Panthers were hoping for, Lott knows time is on his side now as the returning players have another year to familiarize themselves with the new offense and to get bigger, stronger and faster in the offseason now that they've seen the level they need to be at to have some success.

"It was one where we kind of saw how far away we were and hopefully all of our kids coming back want to work to shorten that gap, so we can get there next year," Lott said.

## Slow second half hinders JH

Playing to keep its season alive, the Jackson Heights football team weathered an early storm in a district contest on the road at Valley Heights on Thursday.

The Cobras fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter, but came back to tie the game going into halftime. Unfortunately for the Cobras, there was still another half left in the rollercoaster ride that was the district finale and the second held more valleys than peaks as the Mustangs pulled away for a 48-14 victory.

Jackson Heights gambled right away on its opening drive as the Cobras went for it on fourth and one near midfield. The ball popped loose on the play and the Mustangs recovered in the first blow to the Cobras' momentum in the game.

Valley Heights turned that turnover into points by doing what Jackson Heights could not on its first, converting a fourth down and getting a 32-yard touchdown run from Logan Woodyard in the process.

After that score, Jackson Heights had some communication issues on offense that put them in a bad spot and forced the team to punt. A short punt then set the Mustangs up with a short field on their next possession. Woodyard converted a fourth down for Valley Heights once again before quarterback Gage Woodyard snuck in from three yards out to put the Mustangs ahead 14-0.

The Cobras then started to turn things around as Korby Strube had a long return on the ensuing kickoff that set the offense up in Mustang territory.

"Our kids didn't hang their heads. They came right back and we were able to score two and tie it going into halftime," JH coach Caleb Wick noted. "We're going into halftime thinking, 'guys, if we just execute they're not going to be able to stop us.'"

Adam Brey muscled his way ahead

for 15 yards on the first play and Peter Rupnicki then scooted into the end zone from 15 yards out on the next play to get the Cobras within one possession.

Following a stop on the Mustangs' next fourth down, the Jackson Heights offense took over with the chance to even things up.

Strube came up big again with a long catch and a fourth-down conversion that set Rupnicki up for his second touchdown run of the game. Strube then got the two-point conversion to even the score at 14-14.

Jackson Heights was the aggressor in that equalizing drive and also knocked Gage Woodyard out of the game for a short time in the first half. The Mustang quarterback was out for the next drive and the Cobra defense shut them down, forcing a three and out and getting an opportunity to take a lead before the end of the first half.

The Cobras kept chugging along on the ground, but a handful of penalties slowed that final drive and insured that the teams would go into the locker rooms deadlocked at 14-14.

That was the last bright spot for Jackson Heights as the second half belonged to the home team. Woodyard re-entered the game for the Mustangs and completed a 36-yard pass on the first play of the second half, setting up a short touchdown run by fullback Keaton DeWalt.

On the Mustangs' next possession, Logan Woodyard broke free for a 45-yard touchdown run on the second play to put Valley Heights back up by 14 points, 28-14.

The final blow of the third quarter came via Elijah Smith, who had a two-yard touchdown run to make it 34-14. All the while, the Cobra offense was held in check and did not tally one first down for the entire quarter.

"I think we came out in the second half and I think they wanted it more than we did. I think that showed with our intensity," Wick said. "Credit to Valley Heights, they had a game plan they executed to a T. We just didn't execute ours."

Smith scored his second consecutive touchdown to start the fourth quarter and while Adam Brey tried to will the Cobras back into the game with a long run on the team's next possession that, too, went the Mustangs' way as the drive ended in a Jackson Heights fumble.

Valley Heights added one more score for the 48-14 final margin and secured the second spot in the district and a trip to the playoffs. Jackson Heights (3-6), meanwhile, could not quite finish its strong push to end the season to make it into the playoffs.

"We still had everything right in front of us and we were able to get the job done against Wabausee, but we just weren't able to get it done versus Valley Heights," Wick said.

Wick noted that didn't detract from all the Cobras were able to overcome, though, bouncing back from several injuries and an 0-4 start to finish one win away from making the playoffs. Jackson Heights finished the season 3-6 overall.

## Little runs in final state CC meet

If you ever needed evidence of just how tough state competition can be, Jackson Heights cross country runner Kaitlynn Little's experience at the state meet paints a good picture.

Little entered the Class 2A state meet in Wamego over the weekend having run some of the best races in her four-year career leading up to it, but she still came up just shy of a medal in 29<sup>th</sup> place at the end of the day.

While she may have come up just short, Little did everything to put herself in position to get there, turning in her best time ever in her four years of running at the state meet. Having been there so often, Cobra coach Lyle Alley said he didn't have to say much to his senior runner prior to the race, but they did touch base on a few things.

"We talked about the strategy of the course itself because there are a lot of up-and-down hills. We talked about being fundamentally sound on the hills, going up and down those hills and at that meet, with 100 runners in the race give or take, you have to get out. You have to compete in the first quarter of a mile," Alley said.

Starting among the top 40 was good, but Alley said to really have a chance to medal runners need to start off in the top 20 in that opening stretch and Little was just a bit farther back on Saturday.

Overall, Alley said Little ran a good

race, eventually pushing up to 32<sup>nd</sup> in the final half-mile before cracking the top 30. To place at the state meet though, sometimes runners need better than their best efforts.

Little still ran very well and has been giving that same effort all year. Before Saturday, she had not finished outside the top 10 all season and that included two individual titles (including a regional crown) and three runner-up finishes. Alley said that started with Little's increased intensity in practices this season.

"When you become a good practice runner, those things usually translate to a good meet. Sometimes that just comes with age and maturity and that's just the way she was," Alley said.

Comparing her to runners from different eras is a difficult task, but Alley said Little's work ethic throughout her four years on the cross country team was on par with some of the previous state champions he coached.

While Little may have just missed out on her goal of medaling, Alley said that didn't take away from all she has accomplished. Little overcame the hurdle of never getting to run as

a member of a team and carved out her own niche in the Jackson Heights cross country program.

"She had a great career. To finish three times in the top 30 in the state, that's quite an accomplishment on her part. To be able to win a regional championship was a great accomplishment," Alley said. "She's placed herself up there in the history of Jackson Heights cross country as one of the better runners I've ever had. There's no doubt about that."

## Inexpensive diabetes-friendly snacks

Having diabetes does not mean that you need to purchase "special" food. Snacks for people with diabetes are foods that can work for the entire family.

While watching quantity and portion size is important for people with diabetes, it doesn't mean that what you eat has to taste bad. Here are some simple, inexpensive snacks for people with diabetes.

• Apple and Cheddar Cheese. Skip the expensive apples that are sold by weight and buy a whole bag of apples instead. The apples in these bags are generally smaller and cost

and have a body condition score of 5 to 6.

Breeding at a lighter weight is appropriate when you are breeding more heifers than you anticipate keeping, and you can sell off the open heifers at the end of the breeding season or you can roll them over to a fall/spring herd.

You can determine the amount of pounds you need to gain on the heifers from weaning to breeding. Usually .75-1.5 pounds a day will suffice. Monitor their weight and body condition during development to achieve gain and condition goals. Using an ionophore will give you 10 percent more gain or 10 percent less feed for the same amount of gain.

Regardless of target weight at breeding, heifers should continue to grow after breeding and should be about 85 percent of mature weight

at calving and be at BCS of 5.5 to 6.

Consult with your veterinarian for the optimum vaccination and parasite control program for your situation. A crossbred heifer is expected to produce the equivalent of at least one more calf in weaning weight than a straight-bred heifer in a lifetime.

Heifers born in the first 21 days of the breeding season remain in the herd longer than those in the second or third 21 days. They stay in the herd .6 to 1.2 years longer.

Heifers that conceive in the first 21 days of the first breeding season will have heavier calves at weaning, of course, but in a recent study, this weight advantage was apparent through six calf crops.

Pounds are money! Knowing your cow's mature weight and what the heifers weigh now is vital information!

much less than the other apples. Plus, they'll last for a while when stored in a cool place.

It's helpful if you include some protein with your carbohydrates in order to keep your blood sugar stable. Try pairing a slice of cheddar cheese with that apple. One small apple can be cut into four wedges. Cut one ½ inch slice of cheese from a bar of low-fat cheese (bars are less expensive than cheese slices and will last a long time in your refrigerator) and add it to the apple. Each wedge with cheese is about 30 calories, with around five carbs per snack.

• Assorted Vegetables. Carrots and celery are inexpensive and keep well in the refrigerator. Paired with a little peanut butter, which also stores well, they're a healthful snack that fills you up.

If you have room for a garden, trying growing your own carrots and celery. Not only does it save even more money, but it provides you

with the added bonus of exercise when planting, weeding and harvesting. Plus, the end results are delicious, inexpensive vegetables that you grew yourself. These vegetables are basically carbohydrate-free.

Peanut butter has approximately 100 calories per tablespoon and eight grams of carbohydrates. A little peanut butter goes a long way when vegetables are dipped in it instead of spread with it.

• Sugar-Free Gelatin. Sugar-free gelatin is inexpensive and stores well. You can basically eat as much as you like (within reason) since there are no calories or carbohydrates in this food.

• Frozen Grapes. Yes, frozen. Wash red, seedless grapes and place them on a cookie sheet. Put the sheet in the freezer until the grapes are frozen, then take the grapes off the sheet and store them in a sealed freezer bag. Roughly 20 averaged-sized grapes have 70 calories and 18 grams of carbohydrates.

## Smith earns Feaster scholarship at KU

Two University of Kansas juniors have been named the first Gene R. Feaster Physics Scholars, it has been reported.

Emily Ann Smith, majoring in physics and interdisciplinary computing, and Daniel Rhodes, majoring in physics, were awarded the scholarship for the 2014-15 academic year, it was reported. The scholarship covers tuition costs for one year for each recipient.

The scholarship was established by alumnus Gene Feaster, who invented a medical device called Superflab that is used in radiology clinics across the country. Feaster also established a scholarship and a professorship in the School of Nursing, in honor of his late wife. Feaster, who lives in Leawood, graduated with a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1940 and doctorate in physics in 1953, both from KU.

Feaster led a two-pronged career, the first in radiation physics. He began at the Radio Corporation of America, then continued at Westinghouse and Corning Glass. At Westinghouse, he was twice named Inventor of the Year; he holds 10 U.S. patents. He began the second part of his career by studying medical physics at the University of Virginia. This led him in 1977 to KU Medical Center, where he taught radiation therapy to students in nursing and radiology until his 1992 retirement.

Emily Ann Smith is the daughter

of Douglas and Jane Smith of Lenexa and Soldier. She has been involved in physics research for the past two years, including a summer spent abroad at CERN, located near Geneva. CERN is the home of the Large Hadron Collider where physicists collide protons at near the speed of light.

Smith is a member of both the Society of Physics Students and the professional engineering fraternity, Theta Tau. She plans to attend graduate school after her graduation from KU in 2016.

Daniel Rhodes is the son of Chris and Alma Rhodes of Oskaloosa. Rhodes' primary research interest is in nuclear physics, and he is currently working on a project with a professor involving the polarization of Upsilon particles. Outside of physics, he is interested in the Persian language, which he has been studying for the past three years. After finishing his undergraduate degree, he plans to attend graduate school to pursue a master's degree in physics and possibly a doctorate. He is planning for a career in research once he completes his studies.



Trout are generally recognized as a "stream fish" and are most often found in rivers or streams that allow for migration to larger bodies of water that allow for spawning. However, it has been noted that Elkhorn Lake in late fall, winter and early spring months provide the fish with ideal temperatures for survival — preferably 62 degrees Fahrenheit or cooler.

Elkhorn Lake is classified as "Type 2 trout water," meaning that trout permits are required for fishing or possessing trout during trout season, which runs from Nov. 1 through April 15. After that, KDWP officials noted, trout permits are not necessary, but the daily limit of five trout is still in effect after that point.

Trout can be caught with live bait or artificial lures, such as jigs or spinners, or by using fly-fishing or drift-fishing techniques. Although trout are known for sometimes taking live bait from the bottom of a stream or lake, many consider it preferable to

float bait just off the bottom, and when using artificial lures, it is recommended to fish near cover, such as tree roots, rocks or overhangs.

A light-action rod with a four to six-pound test line is considered by many to be the best rod to use for trout fishing. Furthermore, the best time for fishing for trout in lakes is between first light and mid-morning.

All Kansas residents ages 16 to 74 and non-residents 16 and older must have a valid fishing license. Trout permits may be purchased at KDWP offices, most county clerk offices, licensed vendors such as Walmart or online at [kdwp.state.ks.us/License-Permits](http://kdwp.state.ks.us/License-Permits)

The four-acre Elkhorn Lake is considered a community lake by KDWP. Other fish in the lake include bluegill, channel catfish, crappie, bass and walleye. For more information on the lake and the city's other parks and recreation facilities, contact Reichle at 364-9000.

"We'll be in our 'historically-correct' Civil War reenactment wardrobe, with Boyd as a soldier and me as a Civil War lady," Helen said.
