## Christmas Bureau in jeopardy

■ **Smith:** No one has stepped up to lead it

The Jackson County Ministerial Alliance Christmas Bureau, which served 762 needy individuals last December, is without leadership and may not be held this year, it has been reported.

For the past several years, Evangel United Methodist Church's serving team has coordinated the Christmas Bureau, which provides free Christmas gifts, essential items, food and pharmacy gift cards to families, seniors and disabled residents.

In December, organizers announced they were stepping away from their leadership role and seeking one or two people to spearhead the event in 2015. Since then, no one has agreed to lead the event, according to Kay Smith, one of the previous organizers.

"Basically, someone with strong leadership skills is needed," Smith said. "They also need experience organizing and planning large events. There are people in place to help, but there's no top leader."

It was previously reported that Evangel United Methodist Church is still available to host the event at its Family Life Center.

In 2014, the Christmas Bureau served 206 families that included 402 children. In addition, 70 seniors and disabled residents were served.

The Christmas "store" is stocked with toys and essential items donated by members of the community, as well as purchased through financial donations by individuals and businesses.

Last year, the Christmas Bureau received a \$5,000 donation through United Way of Greater Topeka and additional donations from Wal-Mart and the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation.

So far, \$2,000 in funding has been

## Homestead looking at housing plan in Derby

As Holton's Homestead Affordable Housing watches over the construction of new senior housing complex in its home city, the company has also set its sights on the construction of a new complex in the south central Kansas community of Derby.

If the Derby City Council gives its approval to certain incentives being

proposed by Homestead president and CEO Tom Bishop, the city could be looking at the completion of a new 64-unit senior housing complex by late summer 2017, Bishop said. The proposed housing complex will be similar to the housing complex currently under construction at the south edge of Holton, he noted.

Homestead already has two similar senior housing complexes in

nearby Mulvane and Haysville, both of which are already full, Bishop said. Many of those two complexes' residents came from Derby, he added.

"We've got a waiting list of about 35 people at Mulvane, and a waiting list of 39 people at Haysville," he said. "I think there were nine from Derby who moved to Mulvane when we opened it a few years ago."

According to the Derby Informer newspaper, Bishop and Derby's Community Development Advisory Board have been mulling over Bishop's proposal to initiate construction of a 64-unit affordable housing complex for seniors on an 80,000-square-foot plot in that city, which is located just south of Wichita.

## Harrison and crew keep the power flowing

When Holton's residences and businesses crank up their air conditioners in the heat of the summer, the amount of energy used to run hundreds of air conditioners tends to mount up.

Ira Harrison is there to make sure that the City of Holton can handle the power load.

"Typically, when the temperature reaches 85 to 90, we'll generate when it's really, really hot, up until about 11 p.m. to midnight," said Harrison, the city's electrical production superintendent since the beginning of 2011. "I don't know how many hours we've run this year as far as generating hours, but it's been pretty consistent with the last three years."

Harrison is in charge of the city's power plant, located at the north edge of Holton and in service for more than 100 years. The city purchases the majority of its electric power from outside sources, but Harrison and his crew watch over a system of eight dual-fuel power generators that can provide up to 21 megawatts of energy for the city during the summer months.

## Search continues for parole absconder

The Jackson County Sheriff's Office continues to search for a 25-year-old man wanted on an outstanding warrant from Wyandotte County, it has been reported.

Danny Ross Adams was last seen near 142nd and T Road in Jackson County after he fled on foot from a Jackson County Sheriff's Deputy, according to Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse.

According to the Kansas Department of Corrections, Adams was convicted of burglary in 2012 in Wyandotte County. He is an absconder, which means he is no longer in contact with his parole or probation officer.

Sheriff Morse alerted the public shortly after 9:30 a.m. on Saturday that the sheriff's office was attempting to locate Adams, who was last seen heading southeast on foot.

Adams is described as having dark brown hair and red facial hair, including a goatee, glasses and was last seen wearing black pants, a black ball cap and a red shirt tied around his waist. He also has several tattoos. He is six-foot tall and weighs 190 pounds.

Morse reported that two major searches were conducted Saturday in dense heavily wooded areas after Adams was sighted, but he fled again and was not captured.

On Sunday, Morse reported that Adams was suspected to be enroute to or in the Meriden, Topeka or Dension areas.

While Adams remains at large, Morse advises residents to keep their

doors locked and their keys out of their vehicles.

There has been no indication that Adams is dangerous, however, if sighted do not approach and contact law enforcement immediately, Morse said.

Adams had also been in the news in recent months as the victim of assault from another inmate at the Jackson County Jail while Adams was an inmate there in August of 2014. Bradley A. Stanley received a 20-month prison sentence for the reported assault of Adams.

Many of these companies are trying to lure you into signing up for a credit monitoring service that is not free, but federal law does require the three major credit reporting agencies to provide you with a free copy of your credit report once a year.

The only trusted website to obtain a truly free credit report is [www.AnnualCreditReport.com](http://www.AnnualCreditReport.com), which is operated by the three credit bureaus. You may also request a report by calling any of the three credit bureaus.

Why is it important to check your credit reports every year? The information contained on your credit report can affect many aspects of your financial life, not just your ability to borrow money. Employers may check your credit report before offering you a job. Insurance companies often factor your credit score into your insurance rates.

So, it's important to make sure the information on your report is accurate and up-to-date. Requesting a copy of your credit report does not affect your credit score.



The city gets most of that purchased power from the EMP3 power pool through the Kansas Municipal Energy Agency, along with three megawatts "around the clock" from Oklahoma's Grand River Dam Authority. Harrison said. The city also gets power allotments from the Western Area Power Administration and Kansas City Power and Light, he added.

"With all of that baseload stuff coming in," Harrison said, "it's somewhere around 4,600 kilowatts. Anything between that and 8 megawatts is what we purchase from the EMP3 marketplace, which has been a really good place to buy energy."

Once the load gets over that 8 megawatt mark, the city turns on its own generators, he said — a requirement of the city due to interconnection restrictions. During the summer, he noted, the city has an average daily peak of about 11.5 megawatts, which is less than the average daily peak of about 12.7 megawatts noted when Alamo Group Holton was in operation.

It's certainly a different type of operation from the way the city was running its power plant when Harrison started working there in 1983, he said. At that time, the city was generating all of its own electric power.

"Back then, we had some cooling issues with some of our generators," he said. "We had five units that we could run. Come summertime, we were stringing garden hoses out for the radiators just to get enough cool-

ing in. We had everything in the plant running."

Nowadays, the city usually just runs three of its eight generators, unless the plant needs to turn on more generators to handle an interruption of power from its outside sources. Harrison said that when the city loses its power, his crew can get the power back up and running in less than an hour in most cases.

"Our guys have a 30-minute response time, and I think some of our guys pretty much sleep with their eyes open," he said. "Sometimes, it could be 15 minutes. The worst-case scenario might take us two hours, but usually, we're up and running within the hour."

So far this year, Harrison said there haven't been any major outages in terms of outside power coming through the city's "tie transformer," although there have been times that the city's generators have had to run to handle scheduled outages from those outside sources.

Harrison's department is one of two that gets electric power to the city's utility customers, the other being Scott Frederickson's electrical distribution department. Harrison said his crew handles dispatch calls for Frederickson's crew, and while "they don't generate, nor do we do line work," the two crews work closely on making sure Holton doesn't go dark.

"It's a real good relationship between us. And you know what? It has to be," Harrison said with a laugh.

to be," Harrison said with a laugh.

The most important part of Harrison's job, he said, is "making decisions," although that's basically the most important job of anyone working at the power plant. His department employs a total of six full-time employees and three part-time employees, and some of them work at all hours of the night at the plant.

"All the guys are on the same page," he said. "My newest operator has been here for probably around six months, and the next in line has been here for 14 years. They're still training them at this point, but everybody's been here long enough to know what we've got going on here."

What's most important to them, especially in emergency situations, is keeping a cool head at all times, even when the high temperatures inside the power plant prevent crew members from staying cool in terms of the heat. Still, being mindful of "all the little bits and pieces" that keep the plant in operation is of highest importance, Harrison said.

It's what helped him make the transition from operator to production supervisor when Gene Williams retired at the end of 2011.

"Gene was just a really good guy to work for, and following in his footsteps just made it easy for me to fill his shoes," Harrison said of Williams. "His calmness, in any situation, just made it an easy work environment for

all of us, because it's a stressful place, especially in emergency situations."

Again, Harrison said, rising above the stress is a necessity, particularly in such "emergency situations." And that's something he noted his crew is capable of doing.

"We haven't had any big issues so

far this year, but we have in the past," he said. "Sometimes, you have to go out and work alongside an engine that's running. You have to run it just to find out what the problem is sometimes... Keeping on top of things before it gets to that point is always an issue."

**LETTER:** A mother shares how the Lake Pomona Ski Club helps her son

Dear editor,  
This story began when our son was two. At a doctor's office we were given news that our son had Cerebral Palsy (CP) because of some brain damage due to complications during pregnancy.

This doctor told us to raise him like any other child because he will experience plenty of "disappointments" in his life. At this point I didn't understand what he meant. We have an otherwise healthy boy, just a little broken, simple enough. Gayle had to be one of the happiest kids I have ever seen.

When you meet him, the first thing you will see is his ear-to-ear smile that welcomes you. Most of his pre-K years were utilizing different therapies. He did make a few friends.

Then the big day arrived – his first day of kindergarten. Oh, how excited he was! He was going to get to ride the bus and make more new friends. For a six-year-old, he was unstoppable, and things were going to be great.

Until one day Gayle came home, very excited his friend was having a birthday party. Oh, how fun his party was going to be. I looked for his invitation but couldn't find it, so I figured I would give his friend's mom a quick call.

I called and asked about the birthday. Gayle wasn't sure where his invitation was and I figured he misplaced it. I never imagined what I would hear next.

Well, they had the party last weekend at the roller-skate rink. She would have liked to invite Gayle but "Well, you know, he is different."

I quickly thanked her and let her go. The pain that shot through me was unreal; my heart just shattered. Hearing the words from the past about "disappointments" and knowing I was the one who had to tell my little guy.

So I began to explain to him that the party was last weekend and it was at the roller skating rink. Through his smile and him trying to hide the hurt, I could see the biggest tears in his eyes.

Gayle said, "But mom, I could have went and just watched, that way I could have had cake and ice cream with my friends, too."

A few more parties went by with plenty more "disappointments" for Gayle.

As you can imagine, there was no joining T-ball, soccer or much of anything as a young child. So the search was on for something that Gayle could do. This search was very difficult and in the back of my mind I kept hearing the words repeated, "Well, you know, he is different."

Finally we got a break and some nice folks introduced us into showing miniature horses. Gayle enjoyed this and he did well, but it just wasn't his thing. This turned into his sister's passion, for she is the animal lover of the two.

So here we go again; so many times he heard he can't do something. As his mother, this gets very hard to take at times. He found wrestling and absolutely loved to wrestle. He may not have won any matches, medals or trophies but he still loved the sport. He attended all the practices and matches and loved the physical

exercise. Boy, that ear-to-ear smile was back.

Now fast forward to the end of his junior year in high school. One day we were chatting with his Mema (grandmother), realizing there's not much time left for his wrestling. We were thinking about his future.

As he was getting his senior pictures taken, the photographers, Mike and Mardi Weber, invited him to go water-skiing with them. They knew of a free water skiing clinic (Pomona Lake Ski Club) for people with disabilities.

Well free, they were talking my language, as most people may not know medical insurance does not cover the cost of most equipment needed – crutches, canes, walkers, etc. – and because of that, family budgets can get a little tight at times.

When the big ski day got here, Gayle was so excited; we all were. When we arrived at the clinic, the people were so nice. This is one day that I will never forget.

This day, I realized that this was Gayle's first birthday party or ball game. It was here where Gayle and the other participants get to do and not just watch. This day is for them to have "well, you know, he is different" completely disappear.

The experiences that this group offered were fantastic and it's all done by donations, sponsors and volunteers. Please check out the website or Facebook page to see the pictures and read articles about their clinic. These people have now become Gayle's "summer family."





There are three major credit reporting bureaus, which means you actually have three credit reports. Much of the information contained on these reports is the same, but the reports may vary somewhat based on what lenders have reported to the credit bureaus.

While you can certainly check all three reports at the same time, it might be a good idea to rotate between the three bureaus and check one every four months so that you can more quickly catch errors on your report. It's also important to check your reports before applying for credit for major purchases, like a home mortgage or car loan.

Once you get a copy of your report, review it for anything you don't recognize. Any accounts that you did not open or addresses where you have never lived listed on your report can be signs of identity theft. You have the right to dispute any information on your credit report you believe to be inaccurate.



# Circleville gearing up for annual rodeo

Circleville is gearing up to host its third annual rodeo.

With annual horse shows, "rae-ces," and occasional team roping jackpots, and the like, the Circleville Saddle Arena has hosted horse events for decades.

"For the last two years, we've hosted full legged rodeos that were so successful, we're planning our third annual Circleville Rodeo, Friday and Saturday, Aug. 7 and 8, starting at 8 each evening," according to Susan Rollins, rodeo chairman for the Circleville Saddle Club.

"The rodeo is again going to be double sanctioned by both the United Rodeo Association and the Interstate Rodeo Association with contestants expected to participate from throughout the Midwest," Rollins said.

"There is added money to every event in the rodeo which will help increase the number and quality of

contestants," she said.

Rodeo Rose Productions, owned and operated by Brent and Stella Larreau, Hershey, Neb., will again produce the rodeo, with Brent Larreau also to serve as one of the pickup men.

In addition to wild bull riding, and both categories of bronc riding, bareback and under association-saddle, there will be steer wrestling, and five divisions of roping: team heading-heeling, breakaway for youth and women, open tie-down and over-40 calf roping. Cowgirls' barrel racing is also on tap for all ages.

"In order to get all of the younger generation involved in the rodeo, there will again be a mutton busting, really a sheep riding contest, with entries open both nights," Rollins said.

"Youth are the future of rodeo, and

there's nothing more exciting than watching young cowboys getting more involved in our sport. So, this year we decided to add youth steer riding to the each evening's events. There's been considerable interest, and this could be the major attraction for our rodeo this year, and in the future," Rollins said.

"Only the best will win, though," the rodeo promoter verified.

"We're really excited to have Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association rodeo clown Todd Pedigree, better known to rodeo audiences as Smiley, as our funnyman. It'll be worth the ticket price just to watch and hear Smiley, let alone all of the other exciting Western action," Rollins said.

It will all be family entertainment at the Circleville Saddle Club Rodeo, and further verification of that is Rollins' invitation: "We'll have concessions on site, so bring your lawn chairs and enjoy the action. Camping

is welcome, too, in order to make it a full weekend of family fun and relaxation."

For a small community saddle club like Circleville to put on such a major attraction is no small endeavor and requires considerable support and cooperation from a wide area, along with the many local volunteers.

"We really appreciate all of that support, and we especially want to thank Jackson County Tourism for financial support," Rollins said. "This is our third year, and based on the two previous rodeo successes, we're confident this will be even bigger and better. We're going to have a great rodeo with large attendance."

## Colored powders have their public safety risks

On June 27, at Formosa Fun Coast in New Taipei City, Taiwan, about 500 people were injured and burned when a fireball engulfed a crowd of patrons.

The sudden burst of flames was caused by the ignition of colored powders that were sprayed over the crowd.

With a number of similar events planned in Kansas, the Office of the State Fire Marshal would like to offer information and safety tips to help ensure these events are safe and fun for the participants.

The "combustible dust" used in

these events is commonly colored cornstarch, which isn't normally combustible, but they can burn or explode if the particles are the right size and in the right concentration in the presence of an ignition source.

Possible ignition sources include open flames and sparks, electrical equipment, hot surfaces and static electricity.

There are four elements needed for a flash fire/dust explosion - combustible powder, oxygen (air), ignition source and a dispersion of dust into a cloud above the minimum explosion concentration (MEC).

The fire marshal's office contacted The Color Vibe, the organizer of the Color Vibe 5K Run in Wichita on Aug. 1. The company representative offered these safety measures and

protocols that they implement with each of their events to ensure participant safety:

\* No electrical devices to distribute the powder.

\* The powder has been tested for safe public use.

\* A gap is required between stages and the public.

\* Smoking is prohibited in the festival area.

Event organizers should take the necessary precautions to ensure their events are as fire-proof as possible so that Kansans will not experience a tragedy such as the one in Taiwan.





## Several attend historical cookbook program here

The Jackson County Historical Society hosted a "Community Cookbooks of Kansas" program on Saturday, July 25. The speaker, Louise Hanson, noted how many of the community cookbooks were printed by women's organizations that "needed cold, hard cash to transform their world."

The earliest books were hard bound, like library books. In the

1940s, the books were filled with art, and the 1950s saw spiral binding, a more economical way to publish.

From there, the cookbooks progressed to glossy covers and stock art with spiral bindings continuing. Social change is reflected in the cookbooks.

In the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, there was a glut of oysters on the east coast so there was a proliferation of recipes

using oysters. The railroads shipped oysters in barrels to the Midwest.

Knox gelatin was introduced in 1891, and there was an increase of sugar in recipes in the 1950s following the deprivations of World War II.

Jackson County Historical Society President Suzette McCord-Rogers introduced the speaker. The program committee was Shelly and Dan Rob-

inson, Layne Hunley and Steven Banaka.

The tablecloths were part of Shelly Robinson's collection, and the wildflowers and cookbooks on the tables were from Hunley.

Society members enjoyed a pot-luck luncheon prior to the program. The program was made possible through a grant from the Kansas Humanities Council.





The Derby City Council is expected to review Homestead's plans on Tuesday, Aug. 11, according to the Informer. The council could vote at that time to hold a public hearing on Tuesday, Sept. 8, then vote on a resolution which Homestead would submit to state officials for consideration.

The proposal, as Derby Development Manager Taylor Tedder told the Informer, would give Homestead a 10-year, 100-percent tax break and industrial revenue bonds from the state, as well as giving the city a 4-percent return on its investment. Tedder noted that while the return rate is lower than city policy would recommend, the Derby council can make exceptions based on the benefit the proposed development would bring the city.

Tedder also noted that having affordable housing for seniors is a priority for the city. Bishop agreed, adding that Homestead staff in the area "certainly knew that it was a need."

Even before the initial proposal to Derby city officials was complete, Bishop said that Derby residents who had already expressed concern about the lack of available senior housing had already asked to be placed on a waiting list for housing at the complex there.

## Pilot walks away from plane crash

A crop-duster pilot walked away from a crash around noon on Friday just two miles east of Emmett.

According to the Kansas Highway Patrol, Curt Robert Strathman, 28, Axtell, was flying a 1986 Grumman G-164A west near 142<sup>nd</sup> and A Roads when the plane lost altitude, struck the ground and then flipped onto its top into some timber.

Strathman was able to free himself

from the wreckage and was the only person in the plane during the time of the crash. He was treated by Pottawatomie County EMS and then was transported to St. Marys Hospital for treatment of injuries, according to KHP.

Strathman was working on behalf of Nemaha County Co-op and was believed to have been applying chemicals to a cornfield east of the

crash site, it was reported.

Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse said that witnesses saw the plane go down and heard the crash.

Fire officials from Emmett and Hoyt, the Jackson County Sheriff's Office and KHP responded to the scene.

The KHP headed up the investigation into the crash before turning it over to the Federal Aviation Administration.
