

## Local Relay for Life delayed

■ Cancer Society fund-raiser is on hold for training of new volunteers

The date of the Jackson County Relay For Life is being pushed back as new volunteers step forward to help organize the event, it has been reported.

In June, Melissa Easterberg, community manager of development for the American Cancer Society Relay For Life, put out a call for more local volunteers to organize the relay, which had originally been set for Saturday, Aug. 6.

Easterberg said Thursday that two additional volunteers had emailed her with interest in planning the annual event.

With the relay quickly approaching and much planning still left to complete, Easterberg said that the Aug. 6 date is now "off the table."

"We're going to reevaluate our options and make a decision for a new date soon," Easterberg

said.

The Jackson County Relay For Life, which benefits the American Cancer Society, has been held in the county for more than 20 years.

The original plan was to hold the survivor's dinner and then a condensed version of the relay from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. that day at the Jackson Heights High School track.

Three teams have already registered for the event online and have raised more than \$2,000 so far, Easterberg said.

## Denison opens new public library

A group of volunteers have opened a public library at the community building in Denison.

A grand opening for the library was held on Friday, and volunteer Vickie Wold said that, to start, the new facility will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to noon on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

Wold, who serves on the city council in Denison, said a family approached the council about the possibility of utilizing the community building, which is located at 203 Central Ave., for family-oriented activities.

"We decided to start with a very primitive library," Wold said. "There's no Dewey Decimal System, and it's not even in alphabetical order right now, but we've received several donations of books."

The community building previously served as a senior center for the town. In January, the Jackson County Commissioners decided to no longer provide meals to the seniors at that center due to low participation numbers. Denison seniors were encouraged to attend the center in Holton.

The Denison Community Association previously owned the

building, but after the senior site closed, it was given back to the city. The building is also used as a polling location during elections.

Wold said she and volunteers have been cleaning up the building and the books prior to the opening of the library.

"We just want a place where people of all ages can come," she said.

The library includes books for primary ages to adult, she said.

"We have a lot of books for high school students and young adults," she said. "We need more donations for preschool-level books, but it's just a start."

Currently, the library offers books and movies to check out, as well as a selection of board games to play. Wold said that volunteers have also developed a "wish list" of items for the library.

Those items include beanbag chairs, games, books and more shelving.

"We'd also like to get the Internet to the building and have a computer or two," she said.

The needs of the community will also be better determined once the public visits the library.

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## 'Soft, muddy' ground postpones horse show

Soft and muddy" ground in the horse arena at the Northeast Kansas Heritage Complex moved one of the Jackson County Fair's first big events, the horse show, back a week, according to Meadowlark Extension District 4-H Program Manager Cara Robinson.

The horse show, originally scheduled for this past Saturday at the Heritage Complex, will now begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, July 23 at the complex's horse arena.

The horse show's starting time may be moved forward

due to expected hot temperatures, Robinson said.

"We will just wait and see what the middle of next week brings us," she added.

Moving the horse show to this coming Saturday is not expected to have an effect on the Saturday rodeo, which will also be held at the complex's horse arena, but not until later in the evening, it was reported.

## Buchheit gets 226-month sentence

A Netawaka resident convicted in February on a rape charge involving a minor will spend the next 17 years in prison after his motion to withdraw a plea that led to the conviction was denied in Jackson County District Court.

Scott Buchheit, 37, was sentenced to a total of 226 months, or 18 years and 10 months, in prison — the maximum sentence on the charge of rape, a

Level 1 felony — during a two-hour sentencing hearing on Friday that included action on Buchheit's motion to withdraw his February plea.

With credit for time already served at the Jackson County Detention Center, the sentence will be 17 years and five months, with the possibility of 15 percent "good time" credit on the sentence, District Court Judge Norbert Marek said.

Buchheit had filed the mo-

tion to withdraw his no contest plea to the rape charge, which stemmed from alleged sexual activities between between August of 2008 and January of 2015 involving a girl who is now 17 years old and was filed minutes before a jury trial on that and 10 other charges was set to begin in February. He was arrested on the charges in February of 2015.

## Not guilty plea entered in murder case

A Holton man charged with second-degree murder in the October death of his wife will stand trial in January 2017 after pleading not guilty to the murder charge Jackson County District Court.

During an arraignment hearing on Friday morning, George E. Fleshman Jr., 66, stood silent while defense attorney J. Richard Lake of Holton entered the not guilty plea on his behalf. Fleshman also waived his right

to a speedy trial after District Court Judge Norbert Marek said scheduling a trial in mid-to-late December would inconvenience the court.

Instead, Judge Marek set a five-day jury trial to begin Monday, Jan. 30, 2017, after Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller said the number of witnesses expected to testify in Fleshman's case, both for the prosecution and for the defense, would require "a solid five-day trial." Fleshman is currently free on bond.

Fleshman was charged in March of this year with second-degree murder following an investigation into the death of his wife of 25 years, Elizabeth Fleshman, by the Jackson County Sheriff's Office. During Fleshman's preliminary hearing in June, witnesses testified that his wife's death was due to a ruptured spleen that reportedly could have been caused by "a blow" to her body.

## Huff sentenced for road rage shootings

Just before receiving a 26-month prison sentence on two charges of firing a gun at an occupied vehicle on New Year's Eve 2014, Cory Huff of Topeka turned to face a man who was in one of the cars he was reportedly firing upon that evening and offered an apology.

"That's not good enough," said the man, Wayne Wenger. "You could have killed us."

Huff, 52, received the prison sentence on Friday afternoon in

Jackson County District Court after a plea deal in which four charges of attempted second-degree murder were exchanged for the two criminal firearms charges. District Court Judge Norbert Marek told Huff his prison sentence — which will actually be about 19 months with credit for time already served applied — was to begin immediately.

Huff was arrested and taken to the Jackson County Detention Center on Dec. 31, 2014, after it was reported he had "tailgated"

a vehicle into Jackson County after a supposed incident at the 46th Street roundabout at U.S. Highway 75 in north Topeka, Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller said. Along the way, Miller said, Huff "fired shots at two different vehicles... for no apparent reason."

As a result of that evening's events, which found Huff "intoxicated" at home after their conclusion, Miller recommended the maximum sentences available on each of the two charges — 13 months per charge — to run consecutively, saying that presumptive prison

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### Purple Heart Profiles

## Eulert and crew shot down during Austrian air battle

*Editor's note: This is the 22nd in a series of stories about past and present Jackson County residents who earned the Purple Heart Medal, which is awarded to military personnel wounded or killed in the line of duty.*

*The names of those profiled in these stories will be placed on a special monument for Purple Heart Medal recipients to be built soon in Holton's Linscott Park.*

In early April of 1944, Sgt. Frederick H. Eulert, a Jackson County native serving with the Army Air Forces in Europe, was shot down with his crew during an air battle over southern Austria.

Eulert and his crewmates were taken by the Germans as prisoners of war, but unlike his crewmates, Eulert did not survive the German POW camp. He earned a posthumous Purple Heart Medal for his bravery, it was reported.

Born in 1922, Eulert left Jackson County to join the Army Air Forces, where he was trained as a member of Lt. Col. Ernest "Perk" Chumley's air crew in the 347th Bomber Squadron, 99th Bomber Group. He had trained and served at Davis Monathan Field near Tucson, Ariz., and at Biggs Field near El Paso, Texas, among other places.

In a letter home that was summarized in the Aug. 19, 1943 edition of *The Holton Recorder*, Eulert wrote that his plane "now has a full crew" and that his position was as a tail gunner in the lower ball turret, "which he thinks is the best turret on the plane, al-

though a little lonesome."

Eulert and his crew, flying a B-24 bomber, were being trained to fly "a new crew's first missions," according to one of his crewmates, Lt. Jim Koehne, in a letter to Eulert's parents that was printed in the July 19, 1944 *Recorder*. It was on one of those missions over southern Austria that the crew was shot down.

"On April 2, 1944, we were on a mission to bomb a target in Steyr, Austria," wrote Koehne, who was piloting the plane. "We were just leaving the target area, when anti-aircraft or rockets fired from attacking fighters disabled our controls, destroyed the efficiency of one of our engines and damaged the plane in other ways."

Chumley later remembered that the plane — nicknamed "Ole Mose" by the crew after a "Lil' Abner" comic strip character — sustained a hole the size of a basketball in its left wing, damaging the engine. Koehne put the plane on automatic pilot, but eventually ordered the crew to bail out while the plane was still operating on automatic.

"It flew on for a while, like it still had a pilot," Chumley said in 2008. "Then the engine blew up and it fell straight down."

Koehne wrote that all of the crew members, Eulert included, were able to parachute to safety before the plane exploded. The pilot, who was captured by German soldiers almost immediately after landing, was later taken to a farmhouse where Eulert was being held by other Germans.

"He was the only member of the crew that I saw that day," Koehne said of Eulert. "Fred had been wounded in two places neither of which seemed to be too serious. Two pieces of metal from exploding shells had struck him; one in the left heel and the other in the left buttock."

Eulert had apparently been given first aid by his captors and "seemed very strong," Koehne said, but noted that his stomach was bothering him. He requested some water to drink, but was refused for safety issues.

Eulert and Koehne remained together for about an hour while en route to a military post in southern Austria,

### CITY OF CIRCLEVILLE ORDINANCE NO. 201

A CHARTER ORDINANCE EXEMPTING THE CITY OF CIRCLEVILLE, KANSAS FROM THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 15-209, PROVIDING SUBSTITUTE AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS ON THE SAME SUBJECT AND REMOVING LIMITATIONS ON RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE CITY TREASURER

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF CIRCLEVILLE, KS:

Section 1. The City of Circleville, Kansas, by the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5 of the

Constitution of the State of Kansas hereby elects to and does exempt itself and make inapplicable to it the provisions of K.S.A. 15-209 which applies to this city, but is part of an enactment which does not apply uniformly to all cities, insofar as said statute requires that the city treasurer meet certain residency requirements.

Section 2. The governing body of the City of Circleville, Kansas shall be qualified electors of said city.

Section 3. City employees need not be qualified electors of the City of Circleville, Kansas, and may reside outside of the city limits of said city. Said officer must be a qualified elector of the State of Kansas.

Section 4. This Charter Ordinance shall be published once each week for two con-

secutive weeks in the official city newspaper.

Section 5. This Charter Ordinance shall take effect 61 days after the final publication unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed, requiring a referendum to be held on the ordinance as provided by Article 12, Section 5, Subsection (c) (3) of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, in which case this Charter Ordinance shall become effective upon approval by the majority of the electors voting thereon.

If you believe you are doing OK personally and/or professionally in your life, you may be more likely to consider not voting in the upcoming election.


But on the other hand, it may just take a strong opinion on one or two issues to help you decide to vote and who to vote for.

## "Being Mortal" documentary to be viewed here Aug. 25

Jackson County Caring Community Council, along with Jackson County Friends of Hospice and Holton Community Hospital, will offer a free, community screening of the documentary "Being Mortal" at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 25, at Evangel United Methodist Church Family Life Center in Holton.

After the screening, audience members will be invited to participate in a guided conversation on how to take concrete steps to identify and communicate wishes about end-of-life goals and preferences.

"Being Mortal" delves into the hopes of patients and families facing terminal illness. The film investigates the practice of caring for the dying and explores the relationships between patients and their doctors.

The film follows a surgeon, Dr. Atul Gawande, as he shares stories from the people and families he encounters. When Dr. Gawande's own father is diagnosed with terminal cancer, his search for answers about how best to care for the dying becomes a personal quest.

The film sheds light on how a medical system focused on a cure often leaves out the sensitive conversations that need to happen so a patient's true wishes can be known and honored at the end.

"Being Mortal" underscores the importance of people planning ahead and talking with family members about end-of-life decisions.

Seventy percent of Americans say they would prefer to die at

home, but nearly 70 percent die in hospitals and institutions, it has been reported. Ninety percent of Americans know they should have conversations about end-of-life care, yet only 30 percent have done so.

## The threat of skin cancer is very serious

I recently read a public-service ad circulating by the American Academy of Dermatology that lists five ways to die on a golf course.

The five ways include hit by a golf ball, run over by a golf cart, whacked by a golf club, struck by lightning and forgot your hat.



While none of these possibilities is pleasant to contemplate, the threat of skin cancer is real and should be considered carefully. This is especially true of farmers, ranchers and construction workers who are in the sun much of the time.

Every year one million new cases of skin cancer are detected, according to the American Academy of Dermatology. One out of five people in this country develops skin cancer during his/her lifetime.

All across America, folks are gearing up for vacations with their families — many of these trips include stops at the beach, national parks, state lakes or outdoor amusement parks. Many others work for long hours in the sun during the summer months — farmers, ranchers, construction workers, amusement park attendants, etc.

If you spend several hours in the sun, protect yourself. Avoid the midday sun if at all possible. Cover up. Always wear a hat. Work in the shade whenever possible. And don't forget to wear sunscreen.

Melanoma is the deadliest form of skin cancer. One person dies every hour from this disease in the United States, according to the American Academy of Dermatology.

Fortunately, melanoma can be cured if it's caught early enough. Dermatologists advise us to examine our skin regularly.

If you find a blemish larger than a pencil eraser, multi-colored, asymmetrical or irregular at the edges, you may have melanoma and should see a dermatologist.

While we should protect ourselves from potential skin cancer, we must be every bit as aware of this danger for our children. Overexposure to sunlight during childhood will affect children for the rest of their lives.

Studies show that damage from the sun to a child's skin can actually increase the odds that he/she will develop skin cancer as an adult.

American Academy of Dermatology estimates indicate 80 percent of a person's total lifetime sun exposure occurs in the first 18 years.

Protect your children. Cover them up. Teach them to wear long-sleeved cotton shirts that breathe. Make sure they wear head protection at all times.

Make wearing sunscreen part of the ritual for gearing up for the sun.

While skin cancer can kill you, it's much more likely to disfigure you. Each year, thousands of Americans lose chunks of their skin to this disease, according to the American Academy of Dermatology. Some people lose their nose; others may lose their ears, while others may escape with only the loss of an eyebrow.

Examine your skin regularly, at least once a week. Look for warning signs. If you find anything bleeding, crusting or not healing, see your dermatologist immediately.

Remember, you can enjoy the sun and spend time outside, and don't forget these common-sense suggestions: have fun, and like everything else in life — enjoy the sun in moderation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City of Hoyt governing body that a levy of property taxes in support of the 2017 budget exceeding the amount levied in 2016, as adjusted pursuant to K.S.A. 79-2925b, as amended, is hereby approved.

Emporia State University will be hosting the 2016 Kansas Shrine Bowl football game on Saturday, July 30.



## Denny Ashcraft and his dog, Shine, bring home National Cattledog Association title

A local Border Collie named Shine was just doing what she loved most: working cattle with her owner/trainer Denny Ashcraft of the Holton area in a field on the outskirts of the beautiful Colorado mountain town of Meeker last month.

When their five-day visit was over, they had earned a shiny new trophy buckle that proclaimed the four-year-old ranch dog a National Champion.

The 2016 National Cattle Finals were held June 15-19 in Meeker, about three hours west of Denver.

Sanctioned by the National Cattledog Association, based out of Greeley, the finals were well-attended by the top handler and dogs teams from all across the United States and Canada.

Each competitor earned the right to be there either by accumulating points throughout the year by defeating other dogs at

trials across the country, or by winning a regional finals.

Shine, a smooth-coated Border Collie, earned the right to compete at this year's finals by winning the South Central Regional Finals last October in South Coffeyville, Okla. Winning a championship was already in her resume.

Meeker has become a household name among dog handlers as they have hosted one of the premier sheepdog trials in the United States for the past 30 years.

This year, the local Meeker folks decided to try their hand at hosting the biggest cattle finals in the world.

A total of 145 dog/handler teams came together to compete in five different classes to determine the top dogs in Open, Open Horseback, Intermediate, Intermediate Horseback, and Nursery.

Two hundred head of replacement heifers were brought in from a local ranch. Each competing dog had two runs in their respective dog classes and their combined scores determined which teams came back for the Final championship go-round at the end of the week.

A different course was set up for each run, and it was up to the handlers and dogs to negotiate four-head of cattle through various chutes, panels, gates, pens and sorting exercises within a time limit.

For each head of cattle that negotiated the obstacles correctly, points were earned. Ties were broken on time.

Denny and Shine completed all three runs with perfect scores to win the title of 2016 NCA Intermediate Champion.

## Divide iris clumps every 3 to 5 years

 Well adapted to Kansas.  
 Multiply quickly!

All those traits make the bearded iris easily one of the most popular of our landscape plants. They don't thrive without a little care once in a while, however, and now is one of those times for a little TLC.



If you've ever noticed the centers of your iris clumps becoming less vigorous with flowering only on the outside, it might be time to consider dividing them.

Doing so every three to five years will help rejuvenate them and increase flowering. The optimum window for iris division is late July through August. Start by digging up the entire clump. Their root system consists of thick rhizomes and smaller feeder roots. Use a sharp knife to cut rhizomes apart so each division consists of a fan of leaves and a section of rhizome. The best divisions are made from a double fan of two small rhizomes attached to a larger one, forming a Y-shaped division. Double fans are preferred as they produce more flowers the year after planting. Single fans take a year to build up strength.

If rhizomes show signs of damage, it could be from iris borer or soft rot. Unless you want to physically remove the borers or try to treat mild cases of soft rot, it is typically best to discard those damaged rhizomes.

zomes.

Before replanting, cut the leaves back by two-thirds, then prepare the soil by removing weeds and applying fertilizer. If you have a soil test, great! If not, apply a complete fertilizer, such as a 10-10-10, at the rate of one pound per 100 square feet (avoid fertilizer if the area has been heavily fertilized in the past). Mix into the soil to a six-inch depth.

Iris division not only helps the plant, but also offers a great opportunity to evaluate the health of the clump. Beyond that, sharing your favorite colors with a friend is a great way to spruce up yet another landscape with this popular plant!

KSU Soybean Crop Yield Calculator App  
 Soybean yield estimates prior to harvest are a great way to see how your crop has fared. The conventional approach has included determining the plant population, counting pods per plant and seeds per pod, and estimating a seed size. A few calculations later and you've got a yield estimate!

Smart phone users can also check out an Android application from K-State Research and Extension called KSU-SoyYieldCalc. It helps with yield estimation of soybeans using plant population, pods per plant, seeds per pod and seed size (if conditions until harvest will be favorable, the seed size component should be a lower number - e.g., 2,400 seeds per pound. If conditions are likely to be unfavorable, resulting in a short seed-fill period, this factor should be higher - e.g., 3,200 seeds per pound).

# Gardener's Corner

## This herb loves the summer heat

**Basil!** This spicily pungent herb is one of the great blessings of summer.

Today I snipped a basketful of warmly fragrant basil, stuck it in a blender with olive oil, lime juice, garlic, salt and pepper and whirred it into a flavorful sauce. Some of it will get smeared on the next salmon we bake, the rest went into the freezer.

Last year I had a lovely stand of basil at the end of one row of tomatoes. As basil grew tall, I told myself that it was time to make pesto whenever I would pass by. However, at one point all yellowed and the plants looked sickly. I pulled them out and mourned the loss. If only I'd gotten to it before the sudden blight.

Later I learned that some disease out of Georgia had attacked multiple basil plantings. That didn't make me feel better. However, this year I vowed to have plenty of basil.

And I might have overdone it a bit.

Just maybe. I planted basil in a large tub, where it flourishes and provided this morning's harvest. More than a week later, I planted a long row in front of one row of tomatoes. The seed sprouted thickly and the plants are racing to catch up to their siblings in the tub. I probably should thin it. Otherwise, the plants won't get as large. Which might be a good thing, considering how much basil is in that row.

If I thin it soon, before the plants get too large, I can carefully dig and pot up some to give away. I might also put some in a pot to bring indoors when cold weather arrives, so I can snip fresh basil for as long as it can stand the indoor light... if I don't already have enough basil



stashed in the freezer.

I planted the basil in early May, although typically I would wait until at least mid-May. Basil likes warm soil and hot growing conditions. Since I kept it watered, the basil did not seem to mind the blistering heat we had in June - not as much as other things minded it, anyway.

To improve your success with basil, keep the soil moist after planting the seeds. Mother Nature did a good job of this for me this year, with all the rain in May. Basil prefers loose, rich soil. I mixed horse manure with the soil that filled the basil tub. Once the plants get going, water regularly but don't keep the soil water-logged. The basil in the garden soil does not need water nearly as frequently as the potted basil.

A few weeks ago someone bemoaned the fact that her basil had curled up and died for some reason. June certainly is not too late to plant basil from seed, I told her.

Mid-July might not even be too late to plant basil seeds. However, plant it in a medium- to large-size pot instead of in the garden. This will make it easier to keep watered and you can bring the basil indoors when chilly weather arrives. Basil does not like the cold and will burn with the slightest hint of frost.

I put clear plastic over my seeded pots, securing it with tape or rubber bands, to keep the potting soil moist until the seeds sprout. Put the newly seeded pot where it won't receive the intense late morning to afternoon sun, or it might get too hot beneath the plastic and bake the seeds instead of sprout them.

You also can loosely attach the plastic to the pot, leaving some places where the heat can vent. Within a few days, you will see basil sprouts and can remove the plastic. Don't let them dry out, but give it sun. Basil is a sun worshipper and requires at least six hours of direct sunlight each day.

If you aren't sure where to plant your basil next year, scatter

plants among the beans, beets, cabbages, peppers, eggplants, potatoes and tomatoes, as it supposedly helps those grow. Some people plant basil and tomatoes together because they supposedly make each other taste even better. I don't know about that, but I do know that they taste really good together on my plate.

When you get that abundant basil crop going, use it a lot. The goal is to prevent the basil from flowering, as that will channel all the plant's energy into seed production and reduce leaf size. Frequent clipping will delay flowering and make the plants bushy and even more productive. If the basil does happen to flower, go ahead and use the flowers.

Done right, two or three bushy basil plants might be all that you need. Which begs the question: What am I going to do with all my basil? One can eat only so much spaghetti sauce... right?

Tomato sauces aren't the only thing you can season with basil. After all, the Italians knew and used basil long before they were introduced to the tomato, as did many other cultures.

Snip basil leaves into soups and stews, meaty dishes or vegetarian dishes. Chop it into egg dishes. Sprinkle chopped basil into your next salad. Soak basil leaves in vinegar, strain and blend with olive oil for a delicious dressing.

Snip basil into anything and everything, maybe even your ice cream. OK. That's probably a little silly... but they make garlic ice cream. Why not basil ice cream?

And do not worry. Modern science has refuted the claim that frequently smelling basil will cause scorpions to hatch out in your brain. I know. I didn't believe it at first, either, but science has proven it. Sniff away.

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# Asphalt millings purchased for parking lot at new county shop

More items continue to be purchased for the county's new road and bridge shop located three miles north of Holton.

Approximately 2,500 tons of asphalt millings are being purchased and delivered at a cost of \$33,875 for the parking lot at the shop, it has been reported.

The millings will be laid over the loose, dry rock and dirt on the main drive at the new shop in order to reduce dust.

During a recent Jackson County Commission meeting, the commissioners approved the purchase of the millings, which cost \$13.55 a ton, according to Eric Fritz and Earl Bahret, the road and bridge co-directors.

Updates and renovations continue to be made to the building, which was purchased last fall.

Bahret also reported that 214<sup>th</sup> Road was bladed last week since several rock ledges were sticking out. It was noted that chip-and-seal work will begin next week, weather permitting.

In other business, according to the approved minutes from July 5, the commission:

\* Met in executive session for 25 minutes with Fritz, Bahret, Scott Hewitt, road and bridge employee; and Jackson County Clerk Kathy Mick to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Appointed Commissioner Rob Ladner as the voting delegate for the Kansas Association of Counties board and Commissioner Bill Elmer as the first alternate.

\* Learned from John Kennedy, Banner Creek Reservoir director, that revenue for the week of June 26-July 2 was \$47,382, which included a \$40,000 reimbursement for the new docks from the state of Kansas.

Kennedy said he would like to use the reimbursement to purchase a cabin that could be rented by visitors at the reservoir. No action was taken on the issue.

He also reported that the reservoir is within one inch of being considered "full pool."

\* Met in executive session with Kennedy for 10 minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Met in executive session for

five minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Met with resident Scott Misenhelter to discuss the condition of 214<sup>th</sup> Road. Misenhelter said he was under the impression that funds were set aside for the road to be chip-and-sealed.

Commissioner Janet Zwonitzer said the road had been placed on the list of roads to be rebuilt two years ago. It was decided, however, that the county will only be maintaining current chip-and-seal roads this year.

The commissioners explained that due to the state imposed tax lid, all projects that were previously planned will now need to be reviewed more closely.

\* Sign a request and petition for Rural Water District #3 to trench a portion of Q.4 Road to install a service line. The commissioners also signed a request and petition to allow Rural Water District #1 to bore under 142<sup>nd</sup> and Q Roads.

\* Signed a payroll change notice for Derek Tuck, a new hire at the Jackson County Jail.

\* Adjourned the meeting at 4:30 p.m.

He had filed the motion to withdraw the plea, which set aside all but the rape charge, two days after the plea deal was accepted, citing "ineffective counsel" from his former defense attorney, J. Richard Lake of Holton, and stating that he was "under psychological pressure" to make the deal.

On Friday, Judge Marek, however, said he saw Buchheit's motion to withdraw the plea as a last-ditch gambit from "a sophisticated consumer" who was experiencing "buyer's remorse" about the plea deal.

The motion to withdraw, the judge continued, was not the result of "a lot of deep thinking," but attempts at "delay and manipulation" that began at the start of the investigation against Buchheit and went through three attorneys — Russell Roe of Onaga, then

has included Sarah Phillips, Mary Phillips, Jim Dodson and Mary Montgomery.

"They've been very instrumental in getting the library ready," she said.

Lake, and now Buchheit's present attorney, John Kurth of Atchison.

Taking the witness stand on Friday for the first time, Buchheit repeated his assertions that Lake had not made himself available enough to properly represent him in the months leading up to the trial. And at the time of the trial, Buchheit argued, he accepted the plea deal "because I felt it was the only option I had."

Lake, on the other hand, testified that he had given Buchheit "as much time as I could and, I believe, all the time that he needed" in preparing for the trial. He also told Judge Marek that he did not threaten or trick Buchheit into entering the no contest plea.

Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller told Buchheit in cross-examination that by pleading no contest to a Level 1 felony rather than an "offgrid" felony,

"you saved yourself a life sentence." Miller also asserted that Buchheit told the court that he understood what he was doing in filing the motion to withdraw.

"You're wanting to set aside this plea because you changed your mind?" she asked Buchheit.

"Yes," Buchheit replied. After the motion to withdraw the plea was denied, Buchheit's ex-wife, Crystal Buchheit offered a final statement to Judge Marek before sentencing was pronounced.

"Keep him away from the public as long as possible," Crystal Buchheit told the judge.

In addition to the prison time, the sentencing handed down by Judge Marek requires Buchheit to register as a sex offender and be subject to post-release supervision, both for the rest of his life, after his release from prison.

# KDHE boil order ends for Netawaka

A boil water advisory for Netawaka water customers has been rescinded, according to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

KDHE made the announcement on Friday that the boil advisory, issued on May 19 and expected to last for at least two months, had been lifted after tests of the city's water supply turned up no evidence of contamination, it was reported.

The advisory was originally issued because of a water line repair project that resulted in repeated losses of water pressure. KDHE officials expressed concern that inadequate water line

pressure would result in a loss of chlorine residuals and more bacterial contamination.

Public water suppliers in Kansas take all measures necessary to notify customers quickly after a system failure or shutdown, KDHE officials said. Regardless of whether it's the supplier or KDHE that announces a boil water advisory, KDHE issues rescind orders following successful water sample testing at a certified laboratory.

All other conditions that placed Netawaka's system at risk of contamination had been deemed to be resolved, KDHE officials said.

and they were separated after that, the pilot wrote. Eulert was taken to a hospital for care of his wounds, while Koehne was taken to a cell.

Koehne woke up the next morning to find out that Eulert had died during the night.

"No details were given me but it is my opinion that his internal (stomach organs) were injured by the piece of metal that entered his buttock," Koehne wrote.

Eulert was the only member of the crew who died after being captured by the Germans, it was reported. The other members of the crew were eventually taken

to Stalag Luft I, a German Luftwaffe prison camp where they would spend the remainder of the war — about 13 months, Chumley recalled.

In addition to his Purple Heart, Eulert was also awarded the Air Medal. He was buried in the Lorraine American Cemetery and Memorial in Saint-Avold, France.

Last August, Eulert was honored with a special ceremony at Netawaka Cemetery that was organized by Holton VFW Post 1367. A folded flag was presented to Eulert's sole surviving sister, Phyllis Upchurch of Mountain Home, Ark., during the ceremony.

Sheriff's officers opened the investigation based on what it called "suspicious circumstances" and concluded that Fleshman was a key player in the death of his wife. Fleshman was arrested in March but released on \$75,000 bond in May, it was reported.

Miller said that if convicted of the charge of second-degree murder, a Level 2 person felony, Fleshman would receive a presumptive prison sentence ranging from 109 months (eight years and one month) to 493 months (41 years and one month), depending on his criminal history.

During Friday's hearing, Judge

Marek scheduled two pre-trial motion hearings based on anticipation that attorneys in the case would have "more motions than normal" in what he described as "an extraordinarily serious case."

The first pre-trial motion hearing, which Miller said would focus on "more complex" motions related to Fleshman's case, was set by Judge Marek for Friday, Nov. 4 after Miller requested a 60-day window for such motions. A filing deadline was set for Friday, Oct. 14 for motions to be heard then.

The judge also set second pre-trial motion hearing for Friday, Dec. 9 for "standard motions" involved in the trial.

sentences were "more than appropriate." She also asked Judge Marek to impose "strict conditions" on the bond by which Huff was released from jail on Aug. 15 of last year.

Huff's attorney, William Rork of Topeka, told Judge Marek that Huff, who admitted being under the influence of alcohol at the time of the incident, was "clean" and has been speaking to alcohol and drug treatment groups about his experiences. Rork asked for a "non-prison sanction" so that Huff could continue his treatment.

After apologizing to and being rebuffed by Wenger, Huff admitted he had made "a very, very bad decision" at the time of the incident and told the judge he had been working "clearly on rehab and recovery" from an alcohol

addiction. Miller, however, responded to Huff's comments by saying she was "not hearing an acceptance of responsibility" for the incident.

Wenger agreed with Miller, disputing Huff's claim that Wenger was trying to run him off the road at the time the incident began.

"There's no excuse for what you did," Wenger told Huff.

Judge Marek also agreed, telling Huff his account of the incident was "crap" and that blaming alcohol for his actions was a "flimsy excuse," even though the judge commended Huff for his efforts at rehabilitation. Those efforts, the judge told Huff, "can continue in prison."

Upon Huff's release from prison, Judge Marek ordered him to register for 15 years as a violent offender at Miller's suggestion.
