## Bowers receives three 25-to-life sentences on child sex charges

A Soldier resident convicted in March of child sex crimes by a Jackson County District Court jury will likely spend the rest of his life in prison after receiving three consecutive 25-to-life sentences on the charges against during a Tuesday afternoon hearing.

District Court Judge Norbert Marek also denied a motion to grant Anthony Bowers, 50, a third trial based on an assertion that a prosecution witness should not have been allowed to testify as a "fact witness" and allegations of prosecutorial misconduct.

Bowers was convicted in March on charges of rape involving an adult and a child under the age of 14, aggravated indecent liberties with a child and aggravated criminal sodomy that reportedly stemmed from incidents that allegedly occurred in late 2012. At the time those alleged incidents occurred, the alleged victim in the case was only five years old, it was reported.

On Tuesday, Marek noted that since all three of the charges against Bowers were "Jessica's Law" felony offenses, Bowers would serve a life sentence on each conviction with no possibility of parole until 25 years of each sentence was served. On Marek's order that the sentences run consecutively, Bowers faces a minimum of 75 years imprisonment.

Defense attorney Sarah Swain of Lawrence had filed a motion for downward durational departure that would reduce Bowers' sentence to 77.5 months on each charge, with all sentences to run concurrently. That motion was also denied by Marek on Tuesday.

The motion for a new trial was based on Swain's argument that the court erred in allowing a prosecution witness, forensic interviewer Jill Shehi Chapman, "to testify as a layperson on subjects far outside her qualifications, knowledge and education." Swain also contended that

## Renovations to district court considered

Future renovations to district court, which is located on the third floor of the Jackson County Courthouse, continue to be discussed by the Jackson County Commissioners and Judge Norbert Marek.

During Monday's commission meeting, the commissioners and Judge Marek prioritized the needs of district court as they continue to work on the county budget.

Marek said that a conference room for attorneys to meet with clients is needed somewhere on the third floor, especially when there are several attorneys involved. He noted that there are two back offices for guest judges to utilize and

suggested that one of them could be turned into a conference room.

"I don't think we need more than one guest office for judges," he said. "I don't think we'd miss it if we lost that space."

Marek said other goals for improving district court include creating more room in the main courtroom for lawyers and spectators, reducing noise in the courtroom and modernizing the look of the court bench.

"I know we have to be mindful of the budget," he said.

The air conditioners in the main courtroom create ambient noise while court is in session, Marek said.

While microphones are used

during trials, Commissioner Janet Zwonitzer said it's still difficult to hear some people talking.

"We need to accommodate the families of everyone involved in these cases," Zwonitzer said. "We want the public to be able to hear everything."

Six portable headsets, which are directly hooked into the court microphone system, are available for those in attendance at court, it was noted.

In addition to the noise, the amount of traffic that flows through the third floor on court day is substantial and there are not many places for people to sit as they wait for a trial. It was noted that 27 court cases

were processed last Thursday.

"We know there is a tremendous amount of people that go in and out of there," Zwonitzer said. "I wish there was a waiting room."

Marek noted that if the main courtroom is not in session, members of the public waiting for court in the smaller courtroom can sit in the main courtroom.

"I try to spread my docket out so we don't have large groups of people waiting," Marek said.

The commissioners said they would consider the needs of the court as they prepare the county's budget for 2017.

## Projected enrollment numbers up at RV

With one week until the start of the 2016-2017 classes, preliminary enrollment projections at Royal Valley are up, especially at the middle school, the USD 337 Board of Education learned Monday evening.

RV Superintendent Aaric Davis outlined the estimated enrollment numbers, which included 22 additional students at the middle school in Mayetta compared to last year.

So far, 86 students are enrolled in sixth-grade this year, with an estimated average of 29 students per classroom.

Davis said RVMS Principal John Linn reported that the school's library assistant will be moved to the fifth and sixth grade classroom wing to assist the teachers in the classroom.

"Those three teachers in the sixth grade are seasoned teachers and have had larger classes before so it's not something they haven't handled before," Davis said.

In addition, during certain subject matters, several sixth-grade students may receive additional teaching services in other classrooms, it was reported.

Davis said that at the new student enrollment, 18 new students were enrolled at the middle school and 20 new students were enrolled at the elementary

school. At the elementary school, a total of 64 kindergarten students are expected to join the district this fall. As of Monday, only 48 students were enrolled in first grade, Davis said.

"That's probably one of our smallest numbers in a long time," he said. "But the growth at the middle school helped balance that out."

Davis said that headcount numbers at the high school are expected to "remain flat."

Davis said that the district's headcount is up eight students right now. The district's FTE (Full Time Equivalency) last year was 798, and Davis said he's expecting to exceed that this year. So far, the district's FTE is estimated at 797 but that does not include Fresh Start numbers, it was reported.

At 8 p.m., the board held a hearing and approved the proposed 2016-2017 school year budget.

The approved budget is funded by 47.396 mills, which is a half a mill less than last year's 47.897 mills.

The new proposed budget includes levying 20 mills for the general fund, 19.396 mills for the Local Option Budget (LOB) and 8 mills for capital outlay.

## Fish fry fund-raiser set to mount historic bell

So far, a Holton Boy Scout has raised about a third of the amount he is trying to raise for his Eagle Scout project, the mounting of a historic bell at Holton's Public Safety Building.

This Friday, area residents will have the opportunity to help 14-year-old Kyle Figge in his quest to raise the funds to mount the bell that dates back to the old S.K. Linscott Farm in 1889 at the home of Holton's police and fire departments — and enjoy some fish and "mountain oysters" in the process.

The fish fry and mountain oyster feed will be held from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. that day at the Holton Fire Department. Free-will do-

lations will be accepted to help Figge with his project, which also includes the construction of a mounting base for the bell and the placement of two flagpoles near the bell.

Figge said he is looking to raise \$3,000 to \$4,000 in order to fund the project. His father, Holton Boy Scout Troop 64 Scoutmaster Craig Figge, said that so far, he has raised about \$1,100 of that amount.

The project originated when the Holton Fire Department contacted the elder Figge about the possible placement of some flagpoles and a bell that the fire department wanted to have removed from the back of the fire station. Craig suggested Kyle

look into the bell's history.

He found out that the bell, crafted in 1889 at the L.M. Rumsey Manufacturing Company in St. Louis, Mo., was used at the old Linscott farm in the 1890s, when horse races were held at the farm, it was reported.

After the races were discontinued, the bell was reportedly used at Holton's fire station as a "fire alert" in the early 20th century, then was later stored in a barn until it was moved to a newer barn that had stood at Linscott Park.

Kyle devised a plan to build a three-foot high brick monument for mounting the bell, similar to another bell mount that can be found at Evangel United Meth-

odist Church in Holton. The difference between Figge's planned bell mount and the bell mount at EUM, he said, is that the new mount will have an entirely concrete top.

The bell mount will be placed near the front of the Public Safety Building, but not directly in front of it, Figge said, so that signage on the front of the building will not be obscured. Plans also include the placement of flag poles on either side of the mount, he added.

Donations for Figge's project may also be mailed to the Holton Fire Department at 301 W. Fourth St., Holton, KS 66436, with a reference to "Eagle Scout Project."

## Used syringe found in Burger King restroom

The discovery of a syringe reportedly used to inject methamphetamine into a person's body at a Holton restaurant has prompted the Holton Police Department to caution anyone who finds drug paraphernalia to report it to police rather than handle it themselves.

"It's better not to handle them, especially if you suspect drug use or anything else of that nature," Holton Police Chief Gale Gakle said. "Call law enforcement officers when you find something like this, because we have ways to safely dispose of drugs and paraphernalia."

Gakle said that at about 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 2, a customer at Holton's Burger King restaurant discovered a syringe that

apparently was used to inject a substance into the body while in a restroom at the restaurant. The customer was suspicious as to why the needle was left behind and called police to report the syringe.

A presumptive test showed that the substance inside the syringe was indeed methamphetamine, Gakle said. Police officers then removed the syringe and its contents from the restaurant before securely disposing of it.

"There was no way to determine who had left it in the restroom," he added.

Gakle said anyone who finds any object that looks like it may have been used to inject or ingest





# 'Wienermobile' to visit Holton Friday

## Soil workshop set

This Friday, the legendary Oscar Mayer Wienermobile, which is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year, will make a stop in Holton, it was reported.

The hot dog-shaped vehicle will be "hauling buns" into town for a visit from noon to 5 p.m. that day at the Holton Walmart, where kids of all ages can get their photos taken in front of the vehicle, ride "shot-bun" in the Virtual Reality Wienermobile Ride and receive their very own Wiener Whistle.

The first Wienermobile was created in 1936 by Carl G. Mayer, nephew of Oscar Mayer, and with the exception of World War II — when gas rationing kept the Wienermobile off the road — it's been evolving and traveling around the country ever since.

Today's Wienermobile is 27 feet — or 60 hot dogs — long, eight feet (18 hot dogs) wide and 11 feet (24 hot dogs) tall. It features a custom-made, fiberglass hot dog and bun, a Chevrolet W4 series chassis and a 6.0-liter V8 engine, and there's enough storage space for 11,000 Wiener Whistles.

Chocolate Chiffon Cake

- Ingredients:**  
7 large eggs, separated  
½ cup baking cocoa  
¾ cup boiling water  
1¾ cups cake flour  
1¾ cups sugar  
1½ teaspoons baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ cup canola oil  
2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
¼ teaspoon cream of tartar
- Icing Ingredients:**  
1/3 cup butter  
2 cups confectioners' sugar  
2 ounces unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled  
1½ teaspoons vanilla extract  
3 to 4 tablespoons hot water  
Chopped nuts, optional

**Procedure:**

Let eggs stand at room temperature for 30 minutes. In a bowl, combine cocoa and water until smooth; cool for 20 minutes.

In large bowl combine flour, sugar, baking soda and salt. In a bowl, whisk the egg yolks, oil and vanilla; add to dry ingredients along with the cocoa mixture. Beat until well blended. In another large bowl and with clean beaters, beat egg whites and cream of tartar on high speed until stiff peaks form. Gradually fold into egg yolk mixture.

Gently spoon batter into an ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Cut through the batter with a knife to remove air pockets. Bake on lowest oven rack at 325 degrees for 60-65 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Immediately invert cake onto a serving plate.

For icing, melt butter in a saucepan. Remove from heat, stir in the confectioners' sugar, chocolate, vanilla and water. Drizzle over cake. Sprinkle with nuts if desired.

The Reserve Champion Cake recognition was awarded to Mary Broxterman of the Hoyt Livewires 4-H Club. She also had the Senior Woodworking Champion exhibit. Mary will be a sophomore at Royal Valley High School. She was on her school's FCCLA team that received a gold at STAR national competition in San Diego in early July.

Chocolate Peanut Butter Swirl Bundt Cake

Ingredients for the chocolate batter:

- 1 cup sugar
  - 1 egg
  - ½ cup milk
  - ½ cup + 2 T cocoa powder
  - ½ tsp baking soda
  - ½ cup boiling water
  - ¼ cup oil
  - 1 tsp vanilla
  - ¾ cup + 2 T all-purpose flour
  - ¾ tsp baking powder
  - ½ tsp salt
- For the peanut butter batter:  
¼ cup butter, room temperature

- 1 cup sugar
  - 1-1/3 cups self-rising flour
  - ¾ cup peanut butter
  - 1 egg
  - 1 cup buttermilk
- For the peanut butter ganache:  
8 oz peanut butter chips  
½ cup heavy cream
- For the chocolate drizzle:  
3 oz semi-sweet chocolate chips  
2 T heavy cream

**Procedure:**  
Pre-heat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9-inch bundt pan. Set aside.

To make the chocolate batter:  
1. Cream sugar and oil together in a large bowl until light and fluffy.  
2. Beat in egg, vanilla and milk.

3. In a medium bowl mix together flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, baking soda and salt.  
4. Slowly add flour mixture to oil mixture until well combined.  
5. Carefully stir in boiling water.

To make the peanut butter batter:  
1. In a large bowl cream to-

gether butter, peanut butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

2. Beat in egg.  
3. Carefully add in 1/3 of the flour, followed by 1/3 of the buttermilk. Continue alternating flour and buttermilk mixing well between each addition.

To make the cake:  
1. Pour a small amount of chocolate batter into the prepared bundt pan. Dot large spoonfuls of peanut butter batter, and top with more chocolate batter. Continue alternating until all batter is in the pan.  
2. Remove from pan and cool completely.

To make the peanut butter ganache and chocolate drizzle:  
1. Pour peanut butter chips into a medium bowl. Set aside. Pour chocolate chips into another bowl.

2. Heat heavy cream in a small saucepan just until the bubbles form along the edges.  
3. Pour ½ cup cream over the peanut butter chips and whisk until smooth. Pour ganache over cooled cake.

4. Pour the remaining 2 T cream over chocolate chips and whisk until smooth. Pour chocolate into a small zip top plastic bag. Cut off one corner and drizzle chocolate over the cake.

# Heights board sets agenda for Monday

The 2016-17 school year budget at Jackson Heights and a proposal to refinance the district's bond and energy lease are two of the items that the USD 335 Board of Education will address as part of the agenda for its monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Monday at the Jackson Heights High School Library.

The evening's agenda is scheduled to begin with a public hearing on the upcoming school year's budget, which includes a proposed tax levy of 53.125 mills, down slightly from the 2015-16 budget levy of 53.181 mills. The district's 2014-15 levy was 53.347 mills, it was reported.

The coming year's levy is expected to generate \$1,064,481 in local taxes based on the district's valuation of \$20,735,913, it was reported. The 2015-16 levy generated \$998,902 on a valuation of \$19,485,128, while the 2014-15 levy generated \$811,320 on a valuation of \$18,161,230.

Following the hearing, the board will hold its regular monthly meeting, held a week

later than usual to accommodate the budget hearing. The board will first consider action on the 2016-17 budget, followed by a public forum.

The board is then scheduled to take action on the meeting's consent agenda, which includes minutes from the board's July 11 meeting, monthly bills and activity account reports, a bond payment of \$177,017.50, an energy lease payment of \$133,416.25 plus a \$750 service fee and a donation of \$3,070 from the Dave Henry Memorial Fund.

An update on the JHHS press box and concession stand project will follow, along with consideration of refinancing the district's bond and energy lease. The board will also hear a presentation on baseball and softball and take action on the district coaches' handbook for 2016-17.

Following administrative and board reports, the board is scheduled to meet in executive session to discuss matters related to non-elected personnel, then return to open session to take possible action based on that discussion

before adjourning. The meeting's agenda is subject to change. For more information, or to be placed on the agenda of an upcoming board meeting, call the district office at 364-2194.



## PLAINS FOLK: The infamous corn sleds crippled both man and beast

Raising corn for forage a century or so ago often involved use of an extremely hazardous implement: the corn sled.

The thing is, everyone knew corn sleds were a crippling danger to man and beast, but people kept buying them, using them, and suffering the consequences.

Nowadays I have to explain what a corn sled was. It was a platform on which one or two persons could stand, pulled down a corn row by a single horse.



Sometimes it was on runners - a sled - but most manufactured ones were triangular, with a single wheel in front and two in back.

From one side or both extended a sharp, steel blade that cut the corn. The person or persons on the platform caught the falling stalks and, now and then, stopped the horse to shock them.

The horse had to start and stop and move pretty briskly; a binder horse served well.

You can imagine the hazards of sharp blades, starting and stopping, getting on and off, and handling a spirited horse.

If you research "corn sled" in old newspapers, you find two

types of items: advertisements to sell the machine, and little news stories detailing severed tendons of operators and inoperable injuries to horses.

A medical doctor from Wichita, D. W. Basham, wrote about corn sled accidents and their treatment in a 1904 issue of the Interstate Medical Journal.

"The corn sled," he wrote, "is the most dangerous of agricultural implements, and is productive of many wounds of a serious nature every autumn."

"Corn sled injuries generally involve the lower part of the leg, and the foot. They are generally the result of accident, as slipping of the leg in front of the knife while the sled is in motion. The muscles and other structures of the calf may be divided down to the bone."

"The bleeding is often profuse, and these wounds are often seriously infected and treated in the very worst manner possible by a fellow-laborer or other unskilled persons in the effort to render assistance in arresting hemorrhage."

Basham goes on to describe, from experience, the difficulties of repairing tendons severed by corn sled blades.

Meanwhile, the papers kept running notices like this one from the *Eureka Messenger* in 1897: "Milo Cline slipped on his corn sled last week and cut his right ankle quite severely,

one of the leaders being cut square in two. Dr. Grove did a neat job of dressing, which fact, coupled with the magnificent constitution Milo carries around with him will no doubt ensure a speedy recovery from the injury."

Some fellows were two-time victims, as recorded by the *Coldwater Western Star* in 1939, referring to local farmer Neal White: "Four years ago he was standing in front of a team hitched to a corn sled, when the team ran away and the Achilles tendon on Neal's left foot was cut nearly in two. Twenty years ago the tendon of his right heel was severed when a corn sled knife struck him. So Neal has a perfect right to limp a little."

Mr. White no doubt had a lot of pain and a lifelong limp; for horses such wounds were a death sentence.

The many newspaper items telling of fine horses ruined are too sad to relate.

#### AN ORDINANCE REGULATING OPEN BURNING WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HOYT, KANSAS.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Jackson County, Kansas have adopted Resolution No. 2015-19 regulating open burning within the unincorporated areas of the County; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hoyt, Kansas, desires to regulate open burning within the corporate limits of the City in the same manner and upon the same terms as those in effect in the unincorporated areas of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, be

it ordained by the governing body of the City of Hoyt, Kansas that:

1. **INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE.** Except as otherwise provided below, the Jackson County, Kansas Resolution No. 2015-19, Open Burning Resolution, is hereby incorporated by reference, to be effective within the corporate limits of the City of Hoyt, Kansas.

2. **PENALTIES.** The Municipal Court of the City of Hoyt, Kansas, shall have jurisdiction over violations of this Ordinance. Persons convicted of violation of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$500.00. In addition to fines, the violator, if convicted, shall be responsible for the payment of Court costs. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to limit or otherwise impair the right of any person to damages or other relief on account of injury to persons

or property and to maintain any action or other appropriate proceeding therefore.

3. **ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT** herewith are hereby repealed.

4. **THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT** from and after its publication once in the official City newspaper.

## Sheriff's Office hosts Kid's Camp

In order to create a positive experience between local youth and Jackson County law enforcement and emergency personnel, a Kid's Day Camp has been held annually for 15 years in Holton.

Despite the heat and the rain, a record-setting 275 children attended the Jackson County Sheriff's Office Kid's Day Camp, which was held at Banner Creek Reservoir last Thursday and Friday.

During the morning hours on Thursday, the kids rotated through several demonstrations by law enforcement, including a vehicle extrication by the Holton Fire Department and the landing of a Kansas Highway Patrol helicopter.

Hoyt firemen demonstrated the various equipment used by firefighters, and campers were able to walk inside the back of a Jackson County EMS ambulance. Holton Fire Department personnel also taught children how to properly use a fire extinguisher.

The Topeka Shawnee County SWAT team showed the kids some of the special equipment that is used during an emergency situation, including an armored SWAT truck. A K-9 illegal drug detection demonstration was also held.

For lunch on Thursday, Holton Lions Club members cooked hot dogs and provided chips and a drink for the campers.

The groups also rotated through a variety of activities including archery, swimming, canoes, an obstacle course, fishing, nature walk, pedal carts and large inflatable games.

# Gardener's Corner

## Suffering from cucumber disappointments

 "Into every life a little rain must fall."



How true that is, but people say it as if it were a bad thing. However first coined that phrase must not have had a garden. Otherwise they would know that the trouble really starts when rain doesn't fall, or when only a little rain falls.

Of course, too much rain can cause problems. For the most part, though, a life without rain is much tougher than a life with "a little rain."

If you are searching for some other catch-phrase intended to mollify someone experiencing disappointment, the garden offers plenty of potentially disappointing situations much more difficult to face than rain canceling picnic plans.

Take cucumber beetles, for example. How about "Into every cucumber patch a few cucumber beetles must fly." That's real disappointment.

A few cucumber beetles aren't cause for alarm, until they become (which they will for

certain) lots and lots and lots and lots of cucumber beetles. Enough cucumber beetles to take down all of the cucumbers, and perhaps the trombone squash and melons, as well. At least I presume that the ills of the squash and melons are at least compounded by the presence of cucumber beetles, which, besides chewing holes into leaves, flowers and fruits, also transmit cucumber mosaic virus and bacterial wilt.

The first culprit I always finger in squash problems is the squash bug. Squash bugs are present today, but their numbers have not been high enough to devastate the trombone squash, which stands up to squash bugs better than many other squashes.

While I haven't been super diligent, I have frequently re-coonitered the squash plants, squished adults and nymphs, as well as scraped the copper-colored eggs from leaves. Early this summer I learned that the "glue" that holds squash bug eggs onto the leaves is water soluble. So when I find the eggs I wet them (yes, I've used spit) and they come off much more easily.

While the squash bugs certainly have had an effect, I believe the cucumber beetles are having the larger impact. The beetles

are far more numerous than I recall seeing in recent years. And this is the first year that I've had this much trouble with the cucumbers.

Cucumbers have always been such a reliable garden plant that I just take it for granted I will have an over-abundance at some point during the summer. I made plans to ferment cucumber pickles, as well as make jars and jars of vinegar pickles this year. I harvested dill seed for the vinegar pickles and fretted over whether I'd have any fresh dill "weed" to flavor the fermented cukes.

The cucumber vines have only just been able to keep up with our fresh-eating supply, however. The little pickling cucumbers I favor require more numbers to add up to the same volume of fruit. But they are crisper and less seedy than the large cucumbers.

Since cucumbers are more likely to be bitter on older vines, I make successive plantings, putting cucumber seeds in the ground three to four times in the season. The final planting is larger than the others because that's my pickle planting.

If the summer weather is mild, the first and/or second planting continues to produce sweet cukes as the final planting comes into fruit. Cucumber overload! I make pickles until I can't stand to make any more and then start calling people to please take some.

Don't expect any calls for cukes this year.

I used to cover my young cucumber plants with row cover to prevent cucumber beetles from laying their eggs at the roots, where the larvae feed, weakening the plant and potentially transmitting the viral or bacterial diseases. Leaving row cover on until the plants started to bloom

also prevented the adult beetles from feeding on the leaves.

Then I started training the cucumbers up trellises, which I erected at planting time. The trellis makes putting on row cover a bit tricky, so I dispensed with that step and had no trouble getting my cucumbers going.

Until this year.

We have two species of cucumber beetles, striped and spotted. The spotted cucumber beetle also is known as the Southern Corn Rootworm, as the larvae feed on roots of corn. The adults feed on leaves and blossoms of cucumbers and other squash family plants, as well as some other vegetable crops.

The striped cucumber beetle larvae feed exclusively on roots of the squash family (which includes melons), while the adults feed on the upper portions of the plants, including the fruit.

Prevention is the best cure, so it seems I'll be back to using row cover on my young cucumber/squash/melon plants. Pyrethrin and spinosad are two organic sprays that can be used against the adult beetles, but unless you get them before they transmit the diseases, it's just closing the barn door after the horse gets out. The second cucumber planting gave me fewer than half a dozen cucumbers before completely wilting. The earliest cucumber vine is still alive, but looking wilted.

I'm keeping my eye on the third planting. The plants are still young and growing, but I'm not holding out much hope.

One jar of vinegar pickles from last year sits on the shelf. That could be it until next year. We'll save it for a special occasion, a really special occasion. I'm not sure we'll share.

Life is full of cucumber beetles. We'll come through somehow.


Pastor Young Won led the congregational prayer, followed by silent prayer, pastor's prayer, the Lord's Prayer and the response, "Glory Be To The Father."

## Perseid Meteor Showing coming!

This Friday morning, get ready for one of the best meteor showers of the year! The Perseid Meteor Shower will peak on the morning, Aug. 12. However, lots of activity will also occur the day before and the day after the predicted peak. Meteor showers occur when Earth's orbit goes through a cloud of debris left over from passing comets. As the Earth moves through the debris, bright streaks appear across the sky. Most of this debris is about the size of a grain of sand.

As it enters the Earth's atmosphere at 60,000 miles per hour, it heats up and then produces light. From the ground, the meteors will appear as bright streaks zipping across the sky! Some of this debris will produce very bright streaks called fireballs. The best time to view the Perseids will be after 2:30 a.m. This is the time in which the Earth's orbit is turned more toward the debris. The optimum viewing will be to the northeast, when the constellation of Perseus, the Warrior, begins to rise. During this time of the night, the fall constellations begin to come into view. The Perseids are associated

with the Comet Swift-Tuttle, which revolves around the Sun once every 130 years. As it passes by Earth, it leaves clouds of dust. To view the Perseids, there should be fairly dark skies and no obstructions for viewing. You don't need a telescope to enjoy this celestial fireworks show. Banner Creek Science Center and Observatory will be open beginning at 2 a.m. on Friday if skies are clear, and will stay open until sunrise. 



# Holton school board approves auditorium seat purchase

The Holton school board on Monday evening approved the purchase of 418 new seats for the lower level of the high school auditorium at a price of \$56,676 from Heartland Seating of Shawnee, it has been reported.  
Other bids for the seats totaled \$66,454 from Heartland

for a different style of seat and \$81,567 from the Carroll Seating Company of Kansas City.

School officials plan to have district staff remove the 548 seats that are currently located in the auditorium and make them available for purchase

from school patrons and others.  
The 169 seats in the balcony area of the auditorium will not be replaced at this time, it was reported.  
The HHS auditorium seats were refurbished about 20 years ago, and at that time, school patrons and others make donations to that project. The names of donors for that refurbishing project

were honored by having their names placed individually on the back sides of the chairs.  
Rod Wittmer, principal of HHS, told board members that the names of those people will now be transferred to a plaque that will be displayed on a wall in the auditorium.  
The new auditorium seats are made wider and bigger than they

were when the original seats were made in 1930-31, Wittmer reported to the board.  
Also, he said, the rows of seats in auditoriums are required to be at least 34 inches apart these days. The original rows of seats in the HHS auditorium were 26 inches apart, he said.  
Wittmer added that the seats in the balcony area of the auditorium are different than the ones on the first floor and may have been

added sometime after the school was constructed. Originally, he said, people in the balcony area of the auditorium may have sat on concrete as the balcony area was formed with steps.  
More information about how to purchase the old auditorium chairs will be announced later in *The Holton Recorder*.  
More information about the school board meeting will also be published Monday.

## Fall webworm feeding has begun in some areas

As I travelled south this last week, I noted a bunch of fall webworm feeding. Have you seen them as well?



Fall webworm feeds on almost all fruit, shade and deciduous ornamental trees. This insect is present more often on trees located alone. The larvae begin by constructing small webs near branch ends with the size of the web increasing as the larvae's need for food increases.

Mature caterpillars are yellowish with black and brown markings and have many tufts of long hair. As larvae mature, they crawl down the tree and spend the winter as pupa in the leaf litter under the tree.

High populations of fall webworm can completely defoliate

host plants, but do not kill them. On ornamental plants, control is optional.

Pruning and destroying the infested portions of branches is a good control option while webs are small. You can also use a stick or pole with a nail inserted crosswise to snag individual webs. Twisting the pole after insertion will cause the web to wrap around the pole where it can be removed and destroyed. A toilet brush might be a good option as well.

Insecticides can also be used for control, but a commercial quality, high-pressure sprayer is needed to penetrate the webs. Numerous products can be used for control including spinosad (Conserve; Fertlome Borer, Bagworm, Leafminer and Tent Caterpillar Spray; Captain Jack's Dead Bug Brew), cyfluthrin (Tempo, Bayer Vegetable & Garden Insect Spray) and permethrin (numerous trade names).

Fall webworm damage is typically purely aesthetic, and control is not needed to protect the health of the tree.

## Foods and Nutrition: Top pie recipes

It's hard to believe but the 2016 Jefferson County Fair is down in the books. I want to take this opportunity to thank the many, many volunteers that made this year's fair a success. We couldn't have done it without all of you!



One of the reasons we do this is for the youth and the many lessons that they learn by doing. So with that thought in mind, I would like to share the Overall Grand and Reserve Champion food recipes that were selected at this year's fair. It's always a pleasure to highlight these 4-Hers and a little bit about them. In fact, it has become a yearly fair tradition. I hope you enjoy these recipes and the young people who shared them with you.

Our first recipe was named the Overall Grand Champion and was made by Andrew Noll. He is the son of Matthew and Sara Noll of Winchester. He is 15 years old and a member of the Lucky 4 4-H Club. He has been in 4-H for eight years and was recently named State 4-H Poultry project winner. This fall, he will be representing Kansas at the National 4-H Congress in Atlanta, Ga.

His winning food entry was an apple pie that was also named Champion for the Senior Advanced division that is for members 15 years and older.

### Apple Pie

1 recipe for double crusty pastry (see below):

6 cups thinly sliced peeled cooking apples (Andrew used a combination of Granny Smith and Gala apples.)

1 Tablespoon lemon juice, optional  
3/4 cup sugar  
2 Tablespoons flour  
1/2 Teaspoon cinnamon  
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg  
Milk, optional  
Egg wash, optional  
Sugar, optional

### Directions:

Prepare and roll out pastry and line a nine-inch plate with half of the pastry. If desired, sprinkle apples with lemon juice.

In a large bowl, stir together the 3/4 cup sugar, flour, cinnamon and nutmeg. Add apple slices and gently toss until coated.

Transfer apple mixture to the pastry lined pie plate. Trim bottom pastry to edge of pie plate. Place pastry on top of filling and seal by crimping edge as desired. Cut slits in top pastry to vent. If desired, brush top pastry with milk or egg wash, if desired.

To prevent over browning, cover edge of pie with foil. Bake at 375 degrees oven for 40 minutes. Remove foil and bake 20 minutes or more until fruit is tender and filling is bubbly. Cool on a wire rack.

### Perfect Pie Crust

12 Tablespoon (1 1/2 sticks) very cold, unsalted butter  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
1 Tablespoon sugar  
1 teaspoon kosher salt  
1/3 cup very cold vegetable

shortening  
1/2 cup ice water

### Directions:

Cut the butter in 1/2 inch dice and return to the refrigerator while you prepare the flour mixture. Place the flour, sugar and salt in the bowl of a food processor fitted with a steel blade and pulse a few times to mix. Add the butter and shortening. Pulse eight to 12 times, until the butter is the size of peas.

With the machine running, pour ice water down the feed and pulse the machine until the dough begins to form a ball. Dump out onto a floured board and roll into a ball. Wrap in plastic and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

Cut dough in half. Roll each piece on a well-floured board into a circle at least one inch larger than the pie pan, rolling from the center to the edge, turning and flouring the dough so it doesn't stick to the board. You should see bits of butter in the dough.

Fold the dough in half, ease it into the pie pan without stretching and unfold to fit the pan. With a sharp paring knife, cut the dough one inch larger around the pan. Fold the edge under and crimp the edge with either your fingers or the tines of a fork.

Our second member to share her winning recipe is Brooklyn Correll who exhibited the Overall Reserve Champion with a Peach Pie. She is the daughter of Susan

and Bill Correll of Valley Falls. Brooklyn is 13 years old and a seven-year member of the Prosperity 4-H Club. Her main 4-H projects include Fiber Arts, Foods, Visual Arts, Plants Science and Shooting Sports. Brooklyn's Peach Pie was also named Champion in the Advanced age group, which is for members ages 12-14.

### Peach Pie

#### Crust:

3 cups flour  
1 cup butter flavored shortening  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 Tablespoon vinegar  
1 egg  
5 Tablespoons water

#### Filling:

4 cups peaches, sliced  
1 cup sugar  
3 Tablespoons cornstarch

#### Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Mix flour, shortening and salt with a pastry blender until dough is the size of small peas. Add egg, vinegar and water. Mix well.

Form into three balls. Roll one ball with a rolling pin until it will fit the bottom of pie plate. Shape into pan. Put peaches, sugar and cornstarch into bowl. Mix well.

Top the bottom crust with peach mixture. Roll out another ball of dough for top. Shape top crust to your personal liking. This can be one piece, lattice or design. Bake in oven for 45 minutes or until crust is golden brown.

With an increase in assessed valuation, the total local taxes levied for the coming year are estimated at \$1,413,012, compared to \$1,373,819 last school year.

Prior to the start of the regular meeting, board members met for a quick tour of all three school sites to review maintenance work completed during the summer.

One of the most notable changes was the entryway to the elementary school in Hoyt, which now includes an interactive touchscreen display.

Digital projects, videos and pictures of students' work in the classroom will be uploaded for visitors to view easily.

In other business, the board:

\* Approved consent items.

\* Received an audit report from Jim Long of Karlin & Long LLC of Lawrence. Long gave a "clean opinion" regarding the district audit.

\* Discussed the results from the primary election with Davis, who reported that he is going to invite local Kansas House and Senate candidates to attend a future school board meeting to introduce themselves.

\* Was reminded by Davis about Senate Bill 22, which states that any communications regarding school board busi-

ness are subject to the Kansas Open Records Act.

\* Reviewed the spring and summer maintenance list with Davis. At the elementary school, a new heat pump is being installed before the start of school. Repairs are also being made to a concrete drainage area at the school.

Davis is also seeking prices for side and back speakers to the stage at the school for possible purchase this fall.

At the middle school, a sink and vanity in the girls locker room is expected to be replaced soon. At the high school, new lights have been installed at the gym, but they still need to be programmed.

\* Heard a report from Susan Pfrang, director of curriculum and instruction, on one-stop enrollment, which was held on Aug. 2 for all returning students. It was estimated that 60 to 70 percent of students enrolled that day.

"It seems like it was steady all day," Pfrang said. "We had some people ask if the district could offer enrollment online in the future."

\* Approved the PBP/Early Childhood Education school year calendar.

\* Approved a district propane contract with Prairie Band Pro-

pane of Mayetta. The initial fill estimate of 5,000 gallons will be purchased as a rate of 87 cents per gallon, and the base contract estimate of 30,000 gallons will be purchased at a rate of 97 cents per gallon. Last year's price was 99 cents per gallon.

\* Approved a district policy update from the Kansas Association of School Boards regarding student emergency safety interventions, such as seclusions, restraints or monitoring.

Definitions to the policy were updated and the district will put the policy online. Davis noted that parents have to be notified within 24 hours if their child is involved in an incident regarding a safety intervention.

Davis said that all Kansas districts are required by law to have this policy in place.

\* Agreed to offer employment contracts to Claudia Biss as an Early Childhood Education paraprofessional and Katie Davis as the assistant high school volleyball coach.

\* Noted that the RVMS open house on Aug. 16 has been pushed back from 6:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

\* Adjourned the meeting at 8:25 p.m. No executive sessions were needed.

Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller "committed prosecutorial misconduct by misleading the court and defense counsel about the nature" of Chapman's testimony.

Swain argued on Tuesday that Chapman's testimony in Bowers' first trial — held in 2014 and ending with a hung jury — differed from her testimony in the second trial this past March. As a result, she said, "the bulk of Chapman's testimony should not have been allowed" as evidence and contributed to a "trial by ambush" against the defense, which Miller denied.

Marek said that while Chapman could not qualify as an "expert witness" in the case, she was qualified to give opinions based on her training and experience as a forensic interviewer. He also stated that there was no prosecutorial misconduct involved on Miller's behalf in the case.

## No arrests made in Pokemon Go confrontation noted here recently

The popular "augmented reality" game Pokemon Go has generated interest in the Holton area, but in at least one recent incident, it's also generated conflict between players.

Holton Police Chief Gale Gakle recounted one recent incident in Holton involving an "online battle" that led to a confrontation between two local Pokemon Go fans. The incident included threats of violence between the two gamers, but Gakle said the situation was resolved peacefully and without incident or criminal charges.

The game involves the use of GPS (global positioning system) applications on cell phones or other wireless devices that enable players to locate, capture, battle, and train virtual creatures ("Pokemon") who appear on the screen as if they were in the same real-world location as the player.

Pokemon Go has reportedly

Swain said she had sought records on former Jackson County Sheriff's Office detective Al Dunn, who investigated the initial claims against Bowers. She argued that Dunn's employment record there raised "credibility issues."

Despite filing a Kansas Open Records Act request to obtain those records, Swain said she did not obtain them from state officials and got no response to "repeated inquiries" to the sheriff's office. But prior to Tuesday's hearing, Marek issued an order stating that he had reviewed Dunn's records and found nothing that would have been "material" to the case.

Swain also targeted the court for permitting "the testimonial hearsay" of Bowers' alleged victim to come in through Chapman and Jackson County Deputy Travis Spiker when the alleged victim "later proved unavailable for cross-examination." She argued that Bowers was entitled to face the alleged victim in the trial, rather than hear secondhand testimony, due to state and national constitutional law.

Shortly before Marek pronounced sentence against Bowers — who chose not to address

the court prior to receiving his sentence — the alleged victim's mother, Amber Wade, told the judge that her daughter, who is almost 9 years of age, still struggles with "angry outbursts" and anxiety because of the alleged incidents between her and Bowers. Wade asked Marek to "show no leniency" toward Bowers when pronouncing sentence.

Bowers' sister, Sonya Bowers, was also given a chance to address the court, saying that her brother "was accused with no evidence whatsoever" in the case. She added that "a man's life is being taken without the proper evidence" and asked Marek to consider the durational departure motion.

Marek said Bowers will begin serving his prison sentence at the conclusion of another, six-month sentence stemming from a 2013 misdemeanor domestic violence case, adding that Bowers had already served "about two-thirds" of that sentence. The prison sentence includes six days of jail credit, he added.

Marek also gave Bowers 14 days to appeal his sentence, which Swain indicated she would do if the motion for a new trial was denied.

New carpet will be added to the offices in order to absorb sound, Reith said.

Capital City Flooring of Topeka bid \$15,207.50 for the same work and installation. Carpet One of Topeka bid \$11,292 to just install the new flooring.

If a plumber needs to be hired to fix the moisture problem or if the issue is revealed to be bigger than originally thought, Reith said she will contact the commissioners before any additional funds are spent.

illicit drugs into the body should contact law enforcement immediately, as such objects may be contaminated with those drugs and cause bodily harm to people who handle them.

"Most of that stuff, you don't want to handle it," he said.
