## Hall of Fame seeking names

No new nominations have been received so far for the 12th round of Holton/Jackson County Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame inductees, according to Chamber Administrative Assistant Beth McManigal.

However, McManigal noted that there are 30 applications for Hall of Fame induction left over from previous years, and those applications are still active.

"Those applications don't need to be resubmitted," McManigal said. "But if anyone wants to tweak the applications a little bit, they're welcome to do that at this time."

## Chili Cook-Off to benefit Banner Science Center

The Great Saturday Sampler Chili Cook-Off is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 8 around the Holton Town Square and will be held in conjunction with the Chamber's Fall Fest activities planned for the same day.

The local chili cook-off has been a fun, fall tradition in the community since 1999. Except for one year (2014), there has been a chili cook-off on the Holton Town Square for the past 16 years.

The Holton Rotary Club started the chili cook-off as a community event in 1999. Since

then, groups like the Friends of Downtown, the Holton/Jackson Chamber of Commerce and *The Holton Recorder* newspaper have all sponsored the event at one time or another.

*The Recorder* sponsored the event last year and will sponsor it again this year.

Last year, proceeds from the chili cook-off totaling \$1,000 were donated to the Holton Fire Department.

This year, proceeds from the chili cook-off will be donated to the Banner Creek Science Center.

To further promote the science center on the day of the event, chili cooks this year are

being asked to name their chili, and chili booths, using astronomy-related decorating themes and music.

It is also hoped that promotional materials about the activities offered at the science center, and displays explaining it, can be made available to chili tasters and other Fall Fest visitors to the Town Square on Saturday, Oct. 8.

Rules for the 2016 chili cook-off will be as follows:

\*The cost to participate in the chili cook-off as an individual or team will be just \$5 per individual or team.

\*All chili cooks participating

agree to be at their place around the Holton Town Square by 10 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 8, with a minimum of two gallons of their chili.

\*Chili cook-off participants are responsible for securing their own booth locations around the Town Square, along with electricity service. If assistance is needed, contact *The Recorder* at 364-3141.

\*Chili cook-off participants can either prepare their chili at home and bring it to the Square on the day of the event, or prepare and cook their chili at their Town Square booth.

\*The *Holton Recorder* will

provide a team of judges for the chili cook-off.

\*The chili tasting will start at 11 a.m. and end at 1 p.m.

\*Photos of each chili booth will be taken by *Recorder* staff and published in the newspaper.

## Garber seeks re-election to Kansas House seat

Incumbent Randy Garber (pictured), 65, of Sabetha is running unopposed for the 62nd District seat in the Kansas House of Representatives during the Nov. 8 general election. Garber, a Republican, has served in the House since 2011.



The 62nd District represents Jackson County townships north of 286th Road, including the cities of Netawaka and Whiting, as well as Nemaha and Brown counties and western Atchison County.

"I have worked hard the last six years to understand how our government works," Garber said. "While I have made mistakes, I have learned a lot and feel I can continue to represent the constituents of the 62nd district fairly and honestly. I will strive to make Kansas a better place to live."

Garber has lived in northeast Kansas for 39 years. He graduated from Sabetha High School in 1969 and attended various electronics and leadership schools during his naval career. He served in the U.S. Navy from 1969 to 1989.

He and his wife, Kay, have five grown children and 12 grandchildren.

**Would you vote to eliminate the LLC income tax exemption?**

"I would not vote to elimi-

nate the LLC exemption for a couple of reasons. First of all, I am not an advocate for income tax. Our citizens should get to keep what they earn. The 2012 tax cuts put us on the road to income tax elimination, which is a good thing," Garber said. "I have heard people complain that it is not fair. There are many areas of our tax structure which are not fair. Secondly, it would not solve our budget problems. The LLC exemption is only about 20 percent of the total tax cut. The other 80 percent gave hard working taxpayers relief. I would eventually like to see the state income tax be completely abolished, and the tax cuts started us down that path."

**Do you think we have a state spending problem or a state tax problem?**

"When individuals or families see a reduction in income, they have to decide where to reduce spending. Taxpayers don't have the option of getting into someone else's pocket to make up the difference," he said. "Our state economy is not doing well. Agriculture, aeronautics and gas and oil sectors are underperforming. Since these three make up a sizeable portion of our tax base, we have seen a decrease in revenue in those areas for the last 36 months. Everyone likes the lower gas prices, but we must remember when the prices go down, revenue follows. We have a spending problem not just at the state level but all levels of government."

## Plea deal near for man in three-county chase

An Atchison man charged with attempted second-degree murder of a Jackson County deputy during a March 2015 chase through three counties may enter a plea on reduced charges, it was reported in Jackson County District Court.

Friday's arraignment hearing for Ryan M. Brownfield, 25, who has also been charged in Jackson County with aggravated battery on a law enforcement officer, obstructing official duty and fleeing or attempting to elude a law enforcement officer in connection with the March 2015 incident, was continued for two weeks at the request of his attorney, Christopher Etzel of Onaga.

Etzel said that a plea negotiation with Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller was "close to a resolution" and asked District Court Judge Norbert

Marek to delay the hearing for two weeks "to hash out a plea." Marek granted Etzel's request and rescheduled the hearing for Friday, Sept. 9.

The charges against Brownfield stem from a chase that reportedly occurred on the afternoon of March 12, 2015, when an Atchison County deputy attempted to pull over a vehicle that had been reported stolen from an Atchison dealership. Brownfield was later identified as the driver of the stolen vehicle, which he drove into Jefferson County.

At that point, a Kansas Highway Patrol trooper took over pursuit of Brownfield and the vehicle, and the chase reportedly continued toward Topeka with speeds often exceeding 100 miles per hour. Valley Falls police reportedly attempted to

## Myers enters plea on reduced charge

An Ozawkie man originally charged with attempted second-degree murder in connection with an alleged shooting incident in Holton last fall has pleaded no contest to a pair of reduced charges on Friday in Jackson County District Court.

During a Friday afternoon hearing, Joshua J. Myers, 24, entered no contest pleas on charges of aggravated assault and criminal discharge of a weapon at an occupied building in the alleged Oct. 23, 2015 incident in which he reportedly fired a handgun at a Holton resident.

Jackson County District Court Judge Norbert Marek accepted Myers' pleas and set a sentencing date of Friday, Sept. 23 in district court. Marek also accepted Topeka defense attorney Thomas G. Lemon's request for modification of bond and told Myers it is possible that he may receive probation rather than a prison sentence on the charges.

"You'd have to be crazy to do anything to mess things up," Marek told Myers, noting that a three-day trial on the attempted murder charge, originally set to

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**"Bucks for Buckles" activity planned**  
 Thousands of vehicles will be traveling the Kansas roadways during the Labor Day weekend. Many families will head out on one last camping trip or getaway as the school year begins.  
 Safe Kids Kansas, State Farm and the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) want to encourage families to buckle up and drive safely to protect their most valuable asset, their families.  
 This year, Aug. 28 through Sept. 10, a safety belt awareness campaign called "Bucks for Buckles" is being held in 49 cities across Kansas. One dollar bills are being distributed by local volunteers to drivers who have all occupants buckled up securely in their vehicle.  
 Those riding unrestrained will receive educational materials about the effectiveness of seat belts and child safety seats in saving lives and reducing injuries.  
 "No one can predict when they will be involved in a motor vehicle crash, yet almost all of us will be involved in an automobile crash in our lifetime. In 2014, 384 people lost their lives on Kansas roadways and 54 percent of them were unbuckled," said Cherie Sage, state director for Safe Kids Kansas. "The single most effective means of protecting the lives of you and your passengers is wearing seat belts and using appropriate child restraints every time you ride in the vehicle - even short distances."  
 According to the 2015 KDOT Seat Belt Survey, 82 percent of those surveyed were wearing their seat belts. This compares to the national average of 89 percent.  
 Kansas ranked 39<sup>th</sup> in belt use in 2015, among 50 states and the District of Columbia. An average of 90 people die each day in motor vehicle crashes nationally; that's an average of one death every 16 minutes.  
 "Seat belts are the single most effective device you can use to save your life during a vehicle crash," said Sage. "They also reduce your chances of having a serious injury by as much as 50 percent. It's such a simple thing, so take your life into your own hands and buckle up."

John Kennedy of Jackson Heights High School, serving as Northeast District secretary, and Tel Wittmer of Holton High

School, serving as district sentinel, took part in the conference with an Olympic theme, "Light the Torch." The theme encompassed the key elements of finding individual strengths, identifying team visions and goals and creating a dialogue using values throughout the conference.

Just as each of those ideas is necessary in any business or organization, district officers learned, they are expected to serve with these key themes in mind as they impact the lives of FFA members. Throughout the year, they will serve FFA members across the state and build leadership skills that will make them capable, responsible citizens in life.

To kick the conference off, district officers attended an informative session about Supervised Agricultural Experiences (SAEs). ### Avoid credit card crises

You're heading to college for the first time or returning to campus, and you decide with your parents to get a credit card in your name. A University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences financial expert says you can use credit wisely by sticking to a few key points.



The two biggest mistakes college students make with credit cards are taking on too much debt and failing to make payments even if your credit card bill comes with a low amount due, said Michael Gutter, associate professor of family financial planning and associate dean for UF/IFAS Extension.

Here are some of Gutter's top tips for college students trying to stay financially savvy:

- Set a budget and communicate with your family so you can avoid pitfalls others might see. Communicating with your parents before buying items on a credit card is key.

"Research shows youth who had greater discussions about their personal finances were less likely to engage in risky credit behavior," Gutter said. "In addition, maintain a budget. Stay organized and be willing to ask for help or advice before it gets out of hand."

- If you're going to use credit cards, make sure you are growing your positive credit history and continue consulting with your parents.

- Avoid credit cards altogether, or get cards with low spending limits or limited use. Then, set rules such as only charging what you could otherwise pay for in cash.

## PLAINS FOLK: Abilene was the typical Kansas cowtown in movies

Abilene wasn't the first cowtown in Kansas.

Pre-Civil War Baxter Springs, in the southeast corner of the state, has that honor while Dodge City (Queen of the Cowtowns) is undoubtedly the most famous.

But Abilene is the prototype. That is, every cowtown you see in a Western movie or television show, from Cheyenne to Tombstone, pretty much follows the pattern set by Abilene: on one side of the railroad tracks are the stockyards, the saloons, the gambling houses, and the dance halls, and on the other side are the homes of the respectable citizens.



When the Civil War ended, Texas was overrun with cattle, while in the rest of the country, both North and South, the herds were depleted from feeding soldiers on both sides of the conflict.

Not many cattle had left the Lone Star State during the war, however, surrounded as it was by a foreign country to the south, Union territory to the west, Indian Territory and a free state to the north, and Union blockades on the Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico.

Joe McCoy (more about him in a bit) noted in 1875 that after the war a Texan's wealth was determined by the number of cattle he owned - the more he had, the poorer he was.

But when entrepreneurs determined that a \$2 steer in Texas would bring \$40 in Chicago, it didn't take long for them to instigate the big post-war cattle drives that created the cowboy.

The first big drive year was 1866 and the target town was Sedalia, Mo.

But Sedalia's reign as a cowtown was short lived. Texas cattle (as longhorns were called) carried a disease, Spanish fever, to which they were immune, but American cattle (as the British breeds in the rest of the country were called) died like flies after longhorns had passed through their pastures.

So the Missouri Legislature passed a law forbidding the entry of Texas cattle into the state.

In the meantime, Illinois stockman Joseph McCoy approached officials of the Kansas Pacific Railroad with the idea of establishing a shipping point along their line, which was building west along the Smoky Hill Trail.

They weren't all that keen about the idea, but told him that if he wanted to build stock pens at his own expense, they would run a side-track to them and pay him \$5 for every carload shipped east.

McCoy approached Salina and Junction City, which turned him down, but the hamlet of Abilene was too small to stop him, so he started building.

By late summer the pens were finished, a scout had been sent south to direct drovers to Abilene, and in early September the first carloads of Texas cattle were headed to market.

In two months, more than 30,000 steers left for the east, and during its five years as a cowtown a million head of cattle were shipped out of Abilene.

McCoy didn't get rich, though, because the railroad reneged on its agreement.

The cattle trade brought many new settlers to Abilene, and many saloons.

Where the town originally had only 12 houses, it soon had almost three times that many saloons.

And lots of noise. The young drovers, after three or four celibate months

on the trail with only themselves for company, really let loose when they hit town with all its diversions.

After three years with no official law (saloon keepers kept order; violence was bad for business), the city fathers finally decided to hire a marshal. And that's how Bear River Tom Smith became another prototype - the lawman without a gun.



**Would you vote to implement a flat state income tax on all state citizens?**

"No. I would vote to eliminate sales tax exemptions which is costing the state hundreds of millions in revenue every year," he said. "If we removed these exemptions, we could lower the sales tax and remove tax on groceries. If we want a fair tax structure, these exemptions need to be eliminated."

**Would you vote to expand Medicaid?**

"No. Many states that have expanded Medicaid are facing budget shortfalls because they underestimated the high cost of the program," he said. "Healthcare reform is necessary, but I do not feel expanding Medicaid is the answer. The Affordable Care Act (Obamacare) is on life support. Healthcare premiums are increasing dramatically every

year, and healthcare providers are opting out of the system. So why would we want to expand Medicaid?"

**Do you think the state needs to provide more funds for public education?**

"K-12 funding is more than 50 percent of our state general fund. Every year since I have been in the Legislature, we have increased funding, and it is currently at an all-time high," Garber said. "While I believe in providing a good education for our children, I also believe we must not mortgage the future by leaving following generations with debt from any source (education, highways, healthcare, social services, etc...) We must be good stewards today to ensure our children and grandchildren are not burdened with having to pay for our lack of restraint."

**Would you favor using KDOT funds to solely build**

**safer roads and create jobs rather than to prop up the state general fund?**

"Currently approximately 17 percent of general sales tax collected goes directly to KDOT," he said. "If you purchase band aids, copy paper, diapers etc... a portion goes to KDOT. I am in favor of using gas tax and any revenue tied to road use going to keep our roads well maintained. The dollars taken from KDOT every year is the general sales tax dollars, which belong in the general fund anyway."

If re-elected, Garber said he plans to make a stand against abortion.

"I believe life begins at conception and should be protected," he said. "If we ignore the atrocity of abortion and other moral issues, we are doomed to failure. I will be presenting the Personhood amendment to the Legislature and hope to get

it through committee and to the floor for a vote. The people of Kansas should get to vote on this important matter."

Garber serves as adjutant for a local American Legion Post. He previously served as state chaplain for the Gideon's International and served as pastor for Trinity Church of the Brethren. He helps manage an American Legion baseball team.

"I do my best to research issues and do what I feel is right for the people. My faith plays an important role in these decisions," he said. "I will do my best to represent the citizens of the 62<sup>nd</sup> District with fairness and humility."

During the last session, Garber served on the following committees: Vision 2020, General Government Budget, Social Services Budget, Children and Seniors and 2016 Special Committee on Foster Care Adequacy.

 use "stop sticks" to deflate the Nissan's tires, but it was reported that Brownfield avoided them by driving into a ditch and back onto Kansas Highway 16 toward Denison.

A Jackson County deputy - reportedly Dillon Frederick, according to Brownfield's court file - placed another set of "stop sticks" on K-16 east of Denison, but Brownfield drove the Nissan off the road again in an apparent attempt to strike the deputy's patrol car. The deputy was able to get out of the way and avoid injury, it was reported.

According to KHP, Brownfield turned the Nissan back onto K-16 toward Valley Falls, striking the pursuing KHP patrol car in the process. It was reported that the trooper driving the patrol car did not appear to

be injured but was taken to Holton Community Hospital for examination and later released.

As the Nissan crossed back into Jefferson County, a deputy from that county was able to force it off the roadway, and Brownfield bolted from the vehicle, which had reportedly been damaged from the crash with the KHP patrol car.

A KHP canine unit was able to apprehend Brownfield shortly afterward, and he was taken to the Atchison County Jail, where it was reported he was held on theft charges in lieu of \$20,000 bond in connection with another incident that same day in Atchison. He was transferred the following July to the Jackson County Detention Center, where he is currently being held on \$250,000 cash or surety bond.

 begin Tuesday, Sept. 13, has been "taken out of setting."

The attempted intentional second-degree murder charge stemmed from the October 2015 incident in which Myers reportedly fired a gun on the Holton resident.

Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller said Myers, in what "was certainly a reckless act," later indicated to law enforcement that he did fire the gun at the resident.

Lemon replied that the victim said he did not believe himself to be in danger and also "said he thought it was just a warning shot." He also noted that Myers, who was employed in Holton and in the National Guard at the time of the incident, was no longer employed or in the Guard.

"He doesn't have any connections to Holton, and frankly, he doesn't want to come up here," Lemon said.

Myers, who was freed on a \$250,000 own recognizance bond three days after the incident, was also ordered to wear an electronic ankle monitoring bracelet and remain on house arrest as conditions of his bond. Marek granted Lemon's request to throw out the last two bond conditions, with Lemon noting that Myers "has been perfectly compliant for 10 months" with the conditions.

Both the criminal discharge and aggravated assault charges are listed as level 7 person felonies, with sentencing ranges of 11 to 30 months in prison, as well as eligibility for presumptive probation, Marek said.
