



## New AmeriCorps team at work today

■ Homestead hosting fifth NCCC group

Starting today, a new team of AmeriCorps volunteers will be serving Holton and Homestead Affordable Housing, Inc. for 13 weeks, it has been reported.

A team of 10 young adults from the AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps) have been assigned to Holton through July 6. This is the fifth team that has served in Holton since November 2015.

"The NCCC are young men and women who come prepared to help change the world here in the Holton, Jackson County area," said Tom Bishop, president and CEO of HAH, a Kansas non-profit housing assistance organization.

AmeriCorps NCCC informed HAH recently that the team is coming to help rehabilitate homes, build wheelchair ramps and complete a variety of service assignments that will bene-


fit those in Jackson County. The team arrived over the weekend.

HAH is based in Holton and is a state certified Community Housing Development Organization serving rural Kansas.

Members from this AmeriCorps team represent 10 states, from Maine to Washington, and include graduates with degrees in criminal justice, biology, legal studies and sociology.

## Indian Artifact Show set

The Kansas Archaeological Society will host the 21st annual Kansas Indian Artifact Show in Holton on Saturday, April 14.

The event is scheduled from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. that day at the Northeast Kansas Heritage Complex, located two miles south of Holton on 214th Road.

Steve Kaighen, an avocational archaeologist from Kansas City, will be the featured exhibitor at this year's event.

Kaighen purchased his first metal detector when he was 13 years old and has been fascinated with artifacts for more than 37 years. He focuses primarily on finding early military camps near his home.

He has spent many hours researching, finding, identifying,

documenting and preserving artifacts in Kansas. Kaighen is also fascinated with the fur trade period of the early 1800s and has found many artifacts from that period.

During the artifact show, Kaighen plans to display artifacts that will cover the fur trade up to the Dragoon period of the 1830s in order to provide the public with a better understanding of early military presence on the frontier prior to the Civil War, it was reported.

The show will also have thousands of prehistoric authentic Indian artifacts and related items, and collectors are encouraged to come and display their Prehistoric artifacts.

## County has a "special place" in Penner's heart

For Marci Penner, eight is a magic number.

Penner, who founded the Kansas Sampler Foundation in 1993 with her father, the late Mil Penner, told those present at this year's Jackson County Historical and Genealogical Society's annual Founders Day dinner that each and every one of Kansas' hundreds of communities has eight things that sets it apart.

That, Penner said, is what led to the Sampler Foundation's "Eight Wonders Of Kansas" guidebook that was designed to spotlight those eight facets — architecture, art, commerce, cuisine, customs, geography,

history and people.

Jackson County, she added, is no exception, spotlighting several of the county's communities in her presentation, "Exploring The Nooks And Crannies Of Kansas," on Thursday at Holton's Trinity Lutheran Church.

"Jackson County has a special place in our hearts because of the number of things we've done in this county," Penner said. "Holton is always just a nice place to go. We've enjoyed coming here many times with our group."

Penner said that when she and her father began to put their first Kansas travel guidebook together in 1990, they would visit towns and ask their residents what their respective towns had

to offer for their guidebook. All too often, she said, they got the same response.

"We don't have anything," they were told. "Go to another town."

With that in mind, they devised the list of "eight things that every town has, no matter how small it is," Penner said. Those eight qualities of Kansas' 625 incorporated towns and cities — as well as the roughly 200 incorporated communities that they visited — flowed into the "Eight Wonders Of Kansas" book.

"Sometimes, we can't see what's right under our own eyes," Penner said, promoting the Sampler Foundation's latest

"Kansas Guidebook 2: For Explorers."

The "architecture" facet includes regional attractions such as St. Mary's Church at St. Benedict and the "painted lady" houses in Belleville and Seneca. Locally, it also includes the likes of Soldier's former bank building, now a post office, as well as the Park Place loft that Dennis and Joni White remodeled into a residential space.

"Lofts all over the state are just a wonderful thing," Penner said. "There are so many great creations."

Jackson County is also home to many places that are spotlighted

## Olympic gold winner visits Jackson Heights

Olympic gold medalist bobsledder Curt Tomasevicz challenged Jackson Heights students on Friday to face their fears and set and surpass their goals as they go through life.

"Winning doesn't mean having the most points on the scoreboard," Tomasevicz told grade school students Friday morning. "It's doing the right things even when no one is watching."

Tomasevicz, who also spoke to Cobra middle school and high school students later in the morning, is a native of Shelby, Neb., a town of 690 people. His graduating class had 25 students.

"Growing up, my mom wouldn't buy me a Nintendo because she wanted me to be the best version of myself," he said. "She wanted me outside or reading."

Tomasevicz excelled in sports in high school, but a broken collar bone stopped him from receiving a football scholarship to any college. Nevertheless, he received a full-ride academic scholarship to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to study electrical engineering.

"Once I was in college, I wasn't satisfied with just playing intermural sports so I talked to the football coaches," he said.

Tomasevicz was one of three players selected from 120 athletes to fill a few open spots on the team. From 2000 to 2003, he played running back and linebacker for the Nebraska Cornhuskers.

At the age of 23, Tomasevicz was encouraged to try out for the national bobsled team by a

former UNL track athlete.

"She described bobsled athletes as strong, fast, powerful and a little crazy," he said.

He was selected for the national team and learned to run on ice while pushing a 500-pound sled.

"For some reason, pushing a sled came naturally to me,"

he said.

In 2004, Tomasevicz began his first season of bobsledding; a full-time career that spanned 10 years.

But his journey towards qualifying for the Olympic team looked like it was over almost before it began.

"I was broke," he said. "I

had to pay for all my travel, training and food and my bank account was almost empty."

Tomasevicz said the small town of Shelby rallied around him and his dream. In one day, the town raised \$25,000 for him to continue his Olympic journey.

The support help him qualify for the 2006 Olympics in Italy where he took sixth place in the four-man competition. For most of his career, Tomasevicz served as a "pusher" and brakeman in the back of the sled.

Four years later in Vancouver, Canada, he and his team raced their sled "Night Train" to Olympic gold, breaking a 62-year gold medal drought for the American team in four-man bobsled.

"We were considered the favorite going into the Olympics," he said. "I have the map of the track memorized so I know when to pull the brakes. When I looked up on our last run, I saw our coach leaning over onto the track holding up one finger, and I knew we'd had won."

Tomasevicz qualified for a third Olympics in 2014 in Sochi, Russia, and his team battled and won a bronze medal.

"Between 2010 and 2014, I got older and my body started falling apart a bit," he said. "I had to learn how to train smarter so the bronze medal meant so much to me in Russia."

He retired from competition in 2014, and through his career, Tomasevicz estimated he completed 1,000 "runs" down bobsled courses all over the world and was involved in 20 to 25 crashes.

## Miller enters plea on December standoff

A Holton resident charged with three counts of attempted capital murder in a December armed standoff with area law enforcement officers has pleaded no contest to a reduced set of charges and will face sentencing in late May.

During a Friday morning hearing in Jackson County District Court, Patrick Wayne Miller, 31, entered the no contest pleas to a charge of attempted first degree murder and two charges of aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer in connection with the Dec. 3 incident.

District Court Judge Norbert Marek accepted the plea and set a sentencing hearing for Friday, May 25 in district court. Miller will remain at the Jackson County Detention Center until the hearing date.

The plea deal, brokered by Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller and Holton defense at-

torney J. Richard Lake, was announced during a scheduled preliminary hearing where Patrick Miller agreed to waive the hearing and proceed to arraignment.

Patrick Miller was originally charged with three counts of attempted capital murder, attempted first-degree murder, four counts of aggravated assault on law enforcement, aggravated assault, criminal discharge of a firearm at an occupied vehicle, criminal threat, six counts of endangerment and unlawful discharge of a firearm in a city in connection with the armed standoff.

Shawna Miller recounted the alleged events of the Dec. 3 standoff, in which law enforcement officers were dispatched to Patrick Miller's residence on a report of a domestic dispute between him and Erica Bell, who has been identified as his wife.

## Trial slated in rape case

An August trial date has been set for a resident of southern Mexico who has been charged with sex-related crimes related to an alleged February incident involving a former co-worker in Holton.

During an arraignment hearing on Thursday in Jackson County District Court, Antonio Ramirez-Garcia, 38, stood silent as Holton defense attorney

Jason Belveal entered not guilty pleas on charges of rape, aggravated criminal sodomy and aggravated sexual battery.

District Court Judge Norbert Marek accepted the pleas and set a three-day trial to begin Wednesday, Aug. 1 in district court, with pre-trial motion hearings set for Thursday, May 10 and Friday, June 29.

Farm country targeted

## American agriculture takes hit when trade wars erupt

A trade war with China is now in progress and as always, it seems, American agriculture is being used as a major pawn.

President Donald Trump's decision to impose tariffs on imported steel and aluminum, plus \$50 billion in additional products, has reportedly provoked two waves of retaliation by China against American farmers who export pork, beef, soybeans and sorghum.

The Wall Street Journal newspaper reports those measures are deliberately aimed at hurting Trump's base, and they are succeeding.

Sen. Pat Roberts, a Kansas Republican who chairs the Agriculture Committee, reportedly responded in anger when asked about the effects of the president's actions.

"These are the people who voted for the president," Sen. Roberts said. "These are his people. One county in Kansas even voted for him 90 percent, and they're not going to be happy at all about this."

With global prices dropping and competition rising, notes Zippy Duvall, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), "This could not be happening at a worse time for American agriculture."

The farm sector is alarmed because it is so export-oriented.

AFBF calculates that

\$135.5 billion worth of agricultural goods were sent abroad in 2016, or about one-quarter of total farm output.

But for some products, the rate of exports is much higher. For cotton, the figure is over 75 percent; rice is over 50 percent, and soybeans are calculated at "one in three beans" going to China.

Hog farmers sent more than \$1 billion worth of pork to China last year, it was reported. Jim Monroe, spokesman for the National Pork Producers Council, told *The Wall Street Journal*: "Exports are the lifeblood of the industry."

When exports decline, it's not just farmers who suffer. Packers and truckers, dockworkers and merchant mariners, seed and equipment dealers — they all take a hit, too.

Farm country helped elect Trump the first time. Will those voters support him again if his trade policies continue to jeopardize their economic future?

I don't think so. President Trump needs to do some quick dealing to show support for American agriculture.

Yes, we all know that China does not trade fairly with the U.S.

But there has to be another way to solve the problem. No other president has solved it. Can Trump? *David Powls*

## PLAINS FOLK: New book good read on hot day

This column is written during the Good Friday Blizzard of 2018 on the northern plains, where the only person who still likes snow is my Labrador retriever.

She has a coat like a bear, about two inches of body fat, and a serious case of cabin fever. (And yes, I realize I just referred to my dog as a person, what of it?)



Being a Great Plains guy, I follow the news and weather up and down the plains, reading reports from Texas to Alberta—which means that I read this new book, *Operation Snowbound: Life Behind the Blizzards of 1949*, with immediate interest.

The book is by David W. Mills and published by North Dakota State University Press.

Full disclosure: Dave was my first PhD student. I directed his dissertation, about the Cold War on the plains, which became his first book, *Cold War in a Cold*

Land.

So Dave has a cold thing going in his work. Also a military thing, which is appropriate, since he has a teaching position at the U.S. Army Command School and General Staff College, in Leavenworth.

The military part of *Operation Snowbound* is that in 1949, with the horrific natural disaster of multiple blizzards pounding the western states, the U.S. Army stepped in with a campaign of relief—the Operation Snowbound of the book's title.

Somewhere among my late mother's effects is a photo album containing a bunch of photographs of snowdrifts and snow removal on our farm in Barton County, snow like I have never seen there in my life.

When I asked Grandpa when that was, he said well, it must have been the winter of 1949.

I'm not so sure of that, because from what I have read, the worst blizzards of 1949 took a left turn after exiting Colorado and mostly hit Nebraska. Our photos, I suspect, might be from 1957, which was a tough one.

We may think we get some snowy winters in Kansas, but by the standards of prairie states to the north, we do not.

In Montana or North Dakota, the grip of winter is a defining thing in the rhythm of life. Not so in Oklahoma or Kansas.

The Great Plains historian Walter Prescott Webb labels the blizzard—the grizzley of the plains.

A Texan, Webb really new nothing about blizzards, or about grizzlies, for that matter, else he would have known that in the days of Lewis and Clark, the great bears were common on the northern plains.

I just reread Webb's classic, *The Great Plains*, and noticed that he says not one word about the Blue Winter of 1886-87.

Up north, we credit the fall of the open range cattle kingdom to that winter that Charlie Russell depicted in *Waiting for a Chinook*.

Webb instead chalks up the end of the glory days of cowboy life to homesteaders and barbed wire. (Sure, blame the farmers.)

Kansas folk reading *Opera-*

*tion Snowbound* will be amazed that people could soldier on under the conditions of 1949.

I can tell you, though, if you put a bunch of Norwegians from North Dakota to work on a trailer behind a baler in Kansas on a 100-degree day, they would drop like flies in a cloud of DDT.

What all parts of the Great Plains have, despite their regional variations, is continental-ity.

A continental climate is what people in real estate like to call a healthy, four-season climate.

It is defined by meteorological extremes—blizzards, drought, hail, tornadoes, extreme range of temperatures, sometimes in the same day.

So on a hellacious summer day in Kansas, *Operation Snowbound* would be a great book to read.

## HALLAUER: Things tomato growers should know

Early Tomatoes Anyone?

Almost everyone has a favorite vegetable crop they look forward to harvesting from the garden.

For some, it's new potatoes and peas.

For others, it's that first batch of sweet corn.

That anticipation can sometimes get us in a little bit of trouble.

Instead of waiting until soils are suitable for planting or temperatures have moderated, we try to speed up the process.

For those who love tomatoes, the desire to get a crop as early as possible results in setting out plants earlier than is recom-



mended with the hope they'll survive and do well. It can work, but there may be better options.

Any tomato grower knows that tomatoes can be a little particular about planting conditions.

Two of their requirements are 1) an acceptable soil temperature for root growth and 2) an acceptable air temperature for both plant growth and fruit set.

If done correctly, both can be 'altered' slightly to speed up the fruit harvest time frame.

From a root growth standpoint, remember that tomatoes prefer soil temperatures in the mid fifties and above.

Monitor temperatures with a soil thermometer to a depth of two and a half inches below the surface.

For best results check temperatures late morning. Can't be there at that time to do so? Check before you leave in the morning and after you get home

at night — averaging the two.

If you want to try to speed up the warming process, consider the use of plastic mulch. It may take a few days of sunlight 'collection' to warm it much, but in time, you can speed the rise in soil temperature faster than if soil is left bare.

If you are planning to fertilize or add any irrigation, make sure you do so before installing the mulch.

Air temperature 'regulation' is a little more difficult, with frost protection being the biggest hurdle.

To help, consider the use of hot caps or water tepees. When placed over young plants, they provide frost protection while increasing the average temperature around the plant, encouraging growth.

Protection will last as long as they adequately cover the plants, but air temperature damage doesn't always end there.

As plants grow and start to develop flowers, you may still not get fruit set.

This is often the case when daytime temperatures are higher and the plants are growing, but night time temperatures remain in the mid-50's or below.

When this occurs, the blossom will either not set fruit or fruit that is set may be misshapen.

How much time will these practices gain you? In all, you might gain a couple of weeks. For some, having the earliest tomatoes will be worth it. For others, waiting another couple weeks is no big deal.

In new business, the council discussed the need for artists to be represented at some of the businesses that want to participate in the Art Walk.


Morris demonstrated how to do monoprinting, and members plan on providing a community workshop at Quilting on the Square on June 9. This concluded the business portion of the meeting.

in the "art" category, she said. There's the Mayetta train mural, the artwork on the restroom at Hoyt City Park, the collection of WPA dolls at the Holton museum and the entrance to Prairie Peoples Park on the Potawatomi reservation.

"This arch at the front is so artistic and beautiful. It's a grand entrance," she said of Prairie Peoples Park.

The "commerce" aspect includes several of the county's

businesses, but Penner focused on a handful of businesses in northeastern Kansas, including the Oz Winery in Wamego, the Moon Marble Company in Bonner Springs and Dodson's International in the Franklin County community of Rantoul.

Whiting Cafe — a business that the Sampler Foundation had a hand in "making over" in recent years, Penner said — is part of the county's contribution to the "cuisine" aspect, which she said also includes such eat-

eries as The Kettle in Beloit, Beethoven's in Paola and Buster's in the south central Kansas community of Sun City.

Under "customs," Penner cited the "shoe tree" near Wetmore — as well as Jerry Kissel, who maintains the tree and who received an ovation during the dinner for his efforts — along with the Delia resident who has airplane parts mounted on the roofs of his house and garage as contributing to the county's uniqueness in that regard.

Penner also noted the likes of the Arikaree Breaks in Cheyenne County, the Gyp Hills in Barber and Comanche counties and Mount Sunflower, the highest point in Kansas, in Wallace County in the "geography" section.

And in addition to such attractions as the "Freedom Rings" at Clinton Lake west of Lawrence or the old Haddam city jail, Penner noted she was especially fond of the old hitching rail at the Circleville city cemetery.

"It's the longest hitching post left in the state," she said. "I doubt they still have horses tied up there, but if you're from Circleville, please don't tear this down. I just love it."

Jackson County is certainly no exception when it comes to

the "people" aspect, Penner said, whether it's the story of U.S. Medal of Honor winner Danny Petersen, Circleville's baseball-playing Barnes brothers, Lyle Campbell's "dead ringer" gravestone in the Holton Cemetery or Bruce Shaw at Jayhawk TV and Appliance.

"He'll give you a full taste of the history of the area," Penner said of Shaw. "He's a great ambassador of the history of the area."

Those and many other reasons are beneficial to "explorers" who are planning visits to Jackson County and other parts of the state, she said. It's one thing to see interesting places and people in Kansas depicted on a slide show, but it's something else entirely to visit those places and talk to those people face to face.

"Exploring makes every town rich," Penner said. "There's something to see in every town."

Penner also reminded those present at Thursday's dinner that the mission of the Sampler Foundation remains the preservation and sustaining of rural culture in the state.

"Guidebooks are a good way to help people get around the state," she said.





## Lady Wildcats win two at Riverside

The Holton Lady Wildcat softball team came ready to play Thursday as they swept a double-header against Riverside on the road.



### CITY OF HOYT

#### CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 10

A CHARTER ORDINANCE REPEALING CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 2 OF THE CITY OF HOYT, KANSAS AND PROVIDING SUBSTITUTE PROVISIONS EXEMPTING THE CITY FROM THE TERMS OF K.S.A. 12-4112 IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE 12, SECTION 5 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HOYT, KANSAS:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 12, Section 5 of the Kansas Constitution, hereinafter referred to as the "Constitution," cities of the State of Kansas, hereinafter referred to as the "State," may by charter ordinance elect, in the manner prescribed in the Constitution, that the whole or any part of any enactment of the State legislature applying to such city shall not apply to such city unless such enactment is of statewide concern applicable uniformly to all cities, is otherwise applicable uniformly to all cities or unless such enactment prescribes limits of indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Constitution, no charter ordinance shall take effect until sixty (60) days after its final publication; provided, however, if within sixty (60) days of its final publication a petition signed by a number of electors of the city equal to not less than ten percent (10%) of the number of electors who voted at the last preceding regular city election shall be filed in the office of the clerk of such city demanding that such ordinance be submitted to

a vote of the electors, such charter ordinance shall not take effect until submitted to a referendum and approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon; and

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 12-4112 is an enactment of the State legislature which is applicable to the City of Hoyt, Kansas, hereinafter referred to as the "City," but not uniformly applicable to all cities; and

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 12-4112 is not: 1) an enactment of the legislature of statewide concern applicable uniformly to all cities; 2) any other enactment of the legislature applicable to all cities; or 3) an enactment of the legislature prescribing limits of indebtedness; and

WHEREAS, the City passed Charter Ordinance No. 2 on May 7, 1991 exempting itself from the provisions of K.S.A. 12-4112 and establishing alternative court costs; and

WHEREAS, a Charter Ordinance can only be amended or repealed by subsequent Charter Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City now wishes to repeal Charter Ordinance No. 2, exempt itself from K.S.A. 12-4112 and adopt certain substitute provisions, which in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, may be accomplished only upon the adoption of a charter ordinance.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HOYT, KANSAS THAT:

**Section 1.** The Governing Body of the City of Hoyt, Kansas hereby repeals Charter Ordinance No. 2.

**Section 2.** The Governing Body of the City of Hoyt, Kansas, by the power vested in it by Article 12, Sec-

tion 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas hereby elects to and does exempt itself and make inapplicable to it K.S.A. 12-4112, which applies to the City but does not apply uniformly to all cities.

**Section 3.** The following is hereby substituted for the provisions of K.S.A. 12-4112, as amended:

**Costs.** The Governing Body shall provide by ordinary ordinance for the assessment of costs for the administration of justice in any municipal court case, above and beyond those costs required by state statute.

**Section 4.** This Charter Ordinance shall be published once each week for two (2) consecutive weeks in the official City newspaper.

**Section 5.** This Charter Ordinance shall take effect sixty-one (61) days after final publication unless a sufficient petition for a referendum is filed. In that event, a referendum will be held on this Charter Ordinance as provided in Article 12, Section 5, Subdivision (c)(3), of the Kansas Constitution, in which case this Charter Ordinance shall become effective if approved by a majority of the electors voting therein.

PASSED AND APPROVED by the Governing Body of the City of Hoyt, Kansas, not less than two-thirds of the members elect voting in favor thereof, this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of April, 2018.







The early church started a rumor that Christ had risen from the grave. However, the religious leaders paid the tomb guards to tell the people that Jesus' followers had stolen His body from the tomb during the night. We need to nip those rumors in the bud!

The gospel centers around Jesus Christ. He willingly died on the cross for the sins of every man, woman and child that has ever lived. He was buried and "On the third day, he rose again."

That statement is the key to our Christian faith. It declares that three days after Jesus died on the cross, He was resurrected. It's the promise of eternal life for Christians. If Christ did not rise from the dead, our faith is useless.

## Rape trial slated...

Ramirez-Garcia has been held at the Jackson County Detention Center on \$50,000 bond since Feb. 15, five days after a Holton woman alleged that he raped her at a party at a Holton house. Initially, he was only charged with rape, but the charges were expanded following a March 27 preliminary hearing where the woman testified about what reportedly occurred that night.

During that hearing, the woman testified that Ramirez-Garcia was "touching and grabbing" her while she was lying down after consuming alcohol at the party. She said she attempted to convince him to stop, but he refused and eventually "had intercourse with" her — an allegation that prompted Jackson County Attorney Shawna Miller to request additional charges against Ramirez-Garcia.

Marek noted that both the rape and aggravated criminal sodomy charges carried a presumptive prison sentencing range of 147 months (12 years and three months) to 653 months (54 years and five months), while the aggravated sexual battery charge carried a presumptive prison sentence range of 31 months (two years and seven months) to 136 months (11 years and four months).




