# Glory Days events set

There's plenty of activity planned this weekend as high school alumni from Holton and the surrounding area come home for Glory Days activities, including the annual festival, classic vehicle show and parade. But there's also plenty going on away from Holton's Town Square this weekend, it has been reported.

Glory Days activities will kick off the Memorial Day and alumni weekend with the Holton Lions Club's annual fund-raising hamburger feed from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. Friday on the Jackson County Courtyard. The Lions will be selling burgers, chips and soda for \$5 a plate. Starting at 6 p.m., Gary Bell and Friends will provide a free concert at the courtyard gazebo, and those attending are encouraged to bring lawn chairs.

On Saturday, Glory Days activities on the Square start at 9 a.m. with craft and food booths, as well as the annual Glory Days Antique and Hot Rod Car Show. Classic cars, trucks and motorcycles from all around the area will be featured, and prizes will be given to the best vehicles starting at 1:30 p.m., it was reported.

### Amid budget cuts, RV B.O.E. considers eliminating the high school golf program

Royal Valley Board of Education members reviewed a list of proposed budget cuts – including the elimination of the high school golf program during their meeting Monday eve-

ning.
Three of the five board members in attendance (Pat Tuck, Jeff Stithem and Ann Kelly) voted in favor of eliminating the golf program while board members Linda Hegemann and Rusty Douglas voted against the

The motion to eliminate the program did not pass since four votes which is the majority of the quorum of the seven-member board) are required by state regulations to pass any motion or resolution.

Board members Boone Smith and Jim O'Toole were absent from the

meeting. The issue is likely to be revisited at the school's next board meeting, which is set for June 8.

At the start of the spring season, the roster for the RVHS golf team included five students. Only two students, both sophomores, remained on the team at the end of the season and played in the regional tourna-ment, according to Superintendent John Rundle.

The cost to operate the program, including coaching salary, entry fees, travel and equipment, is about \$5,000, it was reported.

"Our athletic director needs to know as soon as possible if we are going to keep the golf program," Rundle said. "He hasn't put together a schedule yet. He's sitting and waiting for direction on that.'

Some of the additional budget con-

siderations for the 2016-2017 school year include reducing the following expenses:

instead of mailing it (\$5,000). "This means we are going to get by with less," Rundle said. "I've looked at all those budgets, and we

can make those cuts."



This year, three military veterans' groups from Jackson County will visit the county's cemeteries on Memorial Day for the annual salute of fallen military men and women.
Holton VFW Post 1367 and

American Legion Post 44 will make the rounds on Monday, as will the recently-created Mayetta American Legion Post 423, to honor those in America's armed forces who were killed in the line of duty. The public is invited to attend the cemetery ceremonies, as well as a 12:30 p.m. Memorial Day luncheon at the Veterans Club in Holton.

The Holton VFW and Legion posts will also hold a joint service at

11 a.m. that day in Holton Cemetery, then close their tours with an 11:55 a.m. ceremony at the Fallen Soldier Memorial on the southeast corner of Holton's Town Square, it was reported.

Weekend activities honoring fallen military personnel will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday with a flag-raising ceremony near the old cannon at the southwest corner of the Square. Volunteers will descend on Holton Cemetery that morning to raise the Stars and Stripes along the cemetery's Avenue of Flags, where the flags will remain in place until the afternoon of Memorial Day

On Saturday, a biscuits and gravy

breakfast will be held at the Vets Club from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m.

On Memorial Day, VFW Post 1367 will leave from the Veterans Club in Holton to begin its cemetery tour at 7:30 a.m., arriving first at Denison Cemetery for a 7:50 a.m. ceremony. From there, VFW representatives will go to cemeteries at Larkinburg at 8:35 a.m., Thompson-Burns cemetery at 9:10 a.m. and Pleasant Grove cemetery at 10 a.m.

Holton's Legion representatives will depart from the Veterans Club at 7 a.m. to begin their first ceremony at 7:10 a.m. at the Mount Calvary Catholic Cemetery. That will be followed by stops at Olive Hill Cemetery at 7:50 a.m., Buck's Grove Cemetery at 8:25 a.m., Soldier Cemetery at 9 a.m. and Circleville Cemetery at 10 a.m. before meeting the VFW team at Holton Cemetery.

### Should the county establish a Teacher Hall of Fame?

As more and more long-standing Jackson County teachers continue to retire each school year, different ways to recognize those educators are being discussed.

Currently, none of the three districts in Jackson County – Jackson Heights, Holton or Royal Valley have established a Teacher Hall of Fame or a Wall of Fame in their districts to honor retiring or outstanding

Before it disbanded this past fall, members of the Holton Optimist Club would award a Secondary Teacher of the Year Award and an Elementary Teacher of the Year Award to teachers at either Jackson Heights or Holton schools. Each recipient would receive a plaque and have their picture published in The

Holton Recorder. Holton Superintendent Dennis

Stones said that he and Holton administrators are looking for ways to honor their staff.

"I have been visiting with the principals and have started a district Teacher of the Year process that will compete for the Kansas Teacher of the Year process," he said.

Stones said he is also in favor of looking into starting a countywide Teacher Hall of Fame.

Jackson Heights Superintendent Adrianne Walsh said that a Teacher Hall of Fame at USD 335 hasn't been discussed and that she's appreciated the past efforts of the Optimist Club to recognize local teachers.

Walsh also said that the Kansas State Department of Education offers several awards for teachers, such as the statewide Teacher of the Year award, and she has nominated staff members for those honors.

Royal Valley Superintendent John

Rundle said that in his 39 years at Royal Valley, a countywide Teacher Hall of Fame hasn't been discussed in conversations he's been involved with but noted it's an interesting

"I think establishing one locally would potentially cause issues when someone gets selected and other retirees don't," Rundle said.

In each district, retirees are personally recognized in front of staff members and/or the student body before the end of the school year. Holton also hosts a community-wide reception for retirees prior to its May

board of education meeting.

A Kansas Teachers' Hall of Fame

has been established in Dodge City at 603 Fifth Ave. It is dedicated to the early and present day teachers throughout the state who have devoted their lives to teaching. The museum includes a Hall of Fame Gallery, which displays photos and stories of the 386 teachers that have been named to the Hall of Fame.



This year we celebrate the great class of 1965 on its 50th class reunion year!

Class reunions are a fun time to reflect, to reminensce about those "Glory Days."

To help jog some memories about the year 1965, and to educate younger readers too, we've reviewed the months January to June in our newspaper files from 1965 and listed some of the news-makers of the time.

The year 1965 was a turbulent one in the United States. Lyndon Johnson was our president and news about the Civil Rights Movement and race riots were featured on the television news regu-

\*The Holton missile site closed. Established three years earlier, the Forbes Atlas Missile Site located north of Holton was deactivated and the missiles removed. Eventually, the site became the home for the Jackson Heights schools.

\*Donald Swisher was hired as the new business education teacher at HHS for the 1965-66 school term. Swisher continues today as coach

of the HHS golf team. \*The Soldier girls won the grade school bas-

ketball league with a 21-1 record.

\*The Netawaka community is planning a

"Ferne Grove Day" on May 16 to honor the longtime primary teacher in the community.

\*Kaelyn Wagoner, a junior at HHS, was named to the All-Kansas Lions Club Band.

\*John Trupper of Holton caught a three-pound bass at Holton's Elkhorn Lake.

\*Stan Buss was one of 137 Kansas Future Farmers of America members to be recommended for the State Farmer Degree.

\*Dick Geis, a 6-3 senior at Circleville High School, was named the most outstanding player in Class BB basketball by the Wichita Eagle newspaper. Geis averaged 16 points per game over a four-year varsity career. In his senior year, he averaged 22.1 points and 10 rebounds per game on his Bombers team that finished 25-2. He was also named to the Topeka paper's All-

\*Douglas Christensen led the Holton High basketball team in the 1964-65 season with 311 points (14.8 points per game) and 138 rebounds. The Wildcats posted a 15-6 record in the Big

\*The HHS drama club presented the courtroom drama "The State vs. Maxine Lowe."

\*Gilk's Potato Chip factory in Holton was sold to Guy's Potato Chips of Kansas City. The longtime local factory employed 13 people for many

\*Ticket chairman for the Holton Alumni Banquet was L.D. Fletcher.

\*Keith Gilliland was named a retail sales rep for the Des Moines, Iowa region of Standard Oil. A Holton native, Keith was previously a Standard Oil dealer for six years in his hometown.

\*(Sheriff) Don Collins nabbed Donald Collins, 19, of Fayetteville, Ark. on vagrancy charges.

\*Warrant Officer Carl F. Nelson of Mayetta was awarded the Army's highest shooting award - the Distinguished Marksman Badge - for scoring in the top 10 percent of a national military shooting competition.

\*Holton High School's track team won the Big Six track title by winning the league meet at Hiawatha. It was the first league track crown for HHS since 1951. The Wildcats won four track events and four field events. Notable names on the team included Christensen, Hutcheson, Mc-Gee, Maxwell, Sawyer, Proctor, Mannell, Clark, Law, Arnold, Ogilvie, Beatty, Hollenbeck, Bernasek, Watkins and Plankinton.

\*After several years without one, Holton plans to field an American Legion baseball team this

\*W.T. (Will) Beck, longtime editor and publisher of *The Recorder*, was named the first Outstanding Alumnus of the Year by the Holton Alumni Association. A total of 520 Holton alumni were on hand for the banquet this year.



### Garber: Legislature not to blame for declining enrollment at USD 113

Decreasing student numbers appear to be playing a significant role in the financial problems Sabetha/

Wetmore's Prairie Hills USD 113 is facing. If the district had the same number of students as it had in the first year consolidation (2009-2010) and the total expenditures per pupil was \$13,588, as in the 2013-2014 school year, the district would have had

\$1,915,000 more revenue for that school year. The school funding decisions made by the Legislature had nothing to do with USD 113's declining enroll-

The following quote is from USD 113 Superintendent Todd Evans printed in the May 13, 2015 issue of The Sabetha Herald: "Regardless of the finance formu-

la that we are following, if there is not an adequate revenue stream for the state, unlike the state's constituency, the state does not have to pay its bills. This has happened multiple times in recent history when the fi-

nance formula has not been funded, \$8,033 per pupil caused by legislative poor planning and an unwillingness to make unpopular taxation decisions.' There were other statements/com-

ments that could be addressed, however, it would make this article lengthy and the point can be made using this portion of Evans' quote. Remember this is for USD 113 only as each school district is unique. Since I am not sure what is meant

by recent history, I will use statistics from the KSDE.org website starting with USD 441 and USD 488 consolidation. The first year of consolidation (2009-2010) USD 113 student

• Total revenue increased by \$1,727 per pupil

Student enrollment is a factor in determining funding. When there is a decrease in student count, there will be a corresponding drop in revenue. The Legislature cannot control student count. I hope that USD 113, as well as other school districts experiencing declining student population, will be able to find a solution for these unfortunate circumstances and that all concerned can work together for our children. 

# Offensive well runs dry for RV softball in regional title game

Like a Blue Moon or Halley's Comet, there was a rare occurrence in Tuesday's regional championship game between the Royal Valley and Rock Creek softball teams.

The Panthers, who have scored 244 runs this season (11 per game) and won 18 straight games going into the final in St. George, were held to one lone run in a 3-1 loss to the Mustangs. It was only the fifth time this season that RV was limited to single digits in scoring and the first time it happened in consecutive games.

"Every team has those off nights and I thought Holton was that off night," RV coach Corey Katzer said. "I thought going in that it was probably, for our offense, a better match-up going into that second game.'

Championship action got off to a shaky start for Royal Valley as Rock Creek got a leadoff single in the top of the first inning. While the Panthers recorded two quick outs after that, Brynn Hammett continued her big day (she had a home run and four RBI in the second semifinal against SFT) in the next at-bat with an RBI single that gave the team a 1-0 lead.

Royal Valley looked poised to strike back in the second inning, as Caitlin Burns led off with a single and Masey Lafferty then came up with a one-out double down the right field line. With runners on second and third and one out, RV couldn't quite capitalize as an innocuous fly out and groundout ended

A pitcher's dual had broken out in what Katzer predicted could turn into an offensive shootout, but RV starter Kaileigh Gray-Milligan seemed to be settling into a rhythm for the Panthers in the pitcher's circle, inducing two more quick groundouts in the top of the third,

Hammett continued to be a thorn

in her side though. This time, she followed another teammate's single with a two-run home run that gave Rock Creek a 3-0 lead.

"In my regard, Kaileigh made a great pitch. It was down and low to the knees," Katzer said. "It's usually the type of pitch that if you do hit it, it doesn't go out of the ball park. It usually is a line-drive base hit, maybe a ball in the gap, but to hit that pitch to dead centerfield and out of the ballpark; that's just a tremendous at-bat."

Jaycee Worrell then led off with a single in the bottom of the third for RV and while she was recorded out two batters later, Sarah Beam traded places with her after reaching on a fielder's

Kaylie Parker and Burns then delivered with two outs, connecting for back-to-back singles, with Burns driving in the first run for Royal Valley to make it a 3-1 ball game.

The Mustangs were threatening again in the fifth following a leadoff double and single but a double play and groundout to second squashed that and kept the Panthers within two runs.

By that point, the rain that persisted at the start of the game had let up and all that was left was the bitter cold. For the Panthers, that cold spell seemed to carry over at the plate as RV went down in order in the fourth and fifth innings. While his players were making solid contact, Katzer credited Rock Creek for making plays when they needed to in the regional final.

There's a reason Rock Creek was in the championship game. They're a very good softball team and you don't become a really good softball team by not being able to play defense. They made a lot of really good plays,

Royal Valley and Rock Creek both scattered a hit in the sixth, but it wasn't until the seventh and final inning when the drama picked up again.

One hit batter was the only blemish for Gray-Milligan in the top half of the inning, otherwise she did her job to a tee for the Panthers. Then, in the team's last chance at the plate, she started the Panthers off by reaching on an error to lead off the bottom of the seventh.

Worrell followed two batters later with a perfect bunt single right in front of the plate, but a fielder's choice in the next at-bat got the lead runner and left the Panthers with just one out to

try and complete their rally. Sarah Beam stepped to the plate representing the winning run, but once again Royal Valley couldn't quite convert as a she was retired to end the threat and secure a 3-1 victory and a spot in the 4A-DII state tournament for the Mustangs.

That loss doesn't take away from what the Panthers achieved this spring, Katzer said, as RV finished 19-2 overall to set a new school record for wins in a season. The senior class also leaves behind a legacy as the winningest group in program history and set the foundation for future success as well as just creating a positive atmosphere around Royal Valley softball.

"They're one of the most talented groups that I've ever coached. They're one of the hardest working groups that I've ever coached and at the same time they're one of the most fun groups that I've ever coached," Katzer said.

## Holton baseball drops tight regional final with Rock Creek

Playing for their postseason life, the Wildcats put up quite a fight against the top-seeded Mustangs of Rock Creek in the championship game of the 4A-DII baseball regional in Hoyt on Monday.

It wasn't quite enough though, despite another strong effort from ace pitcher Justin Rieshcick, who held Rock Creek to three runs in the title game. Holton could manage just two runs over seven innings, allowing the Mustangs to hold on for a 3-2 victory and advance to the state tournament.

Rieschick was dealing early, but Rock Creek's Shilo Schaake was doing the same on the mound for the Mustangs and retired the Wildcats in order through the first three innings.

Holton, meanwhile, had to get out of a couple early jams. After an error put the leadoff runner on in the second inning, the Wildcats picked him off at third base for the final out of the inning to end the

"Justin's been a good player for us all year. I think there's a little bit of confidence when he's on the mound. I think he gives our kids confidence that we're not going to have to go out and score 10 runs to win the game," HHS coach Joe Purcell said.

The Mustangs couldn't be kept off the scoreboard forever, though, and Connor Greening seemed to open things up for Rock Creek with a leadoff single in the bottom of the third. Following an error in right field, the Mustangs had runners on first and third with zero outs.

A strikeout for Rieschick and lineout to Derek Haverkamp at second base looked like it would get the Wildcats out of a jam once again, but Rock Creek's Nick

Meyer delivered a two-out RBI single to put his team ahead 2-0 before Holton could get out of the inning for good.

Holton would quickly get one run back though, as Rieschick drew a leadoff walk in the top of the fourth and advanced to second base on Jordan Booth's sacrifice bunt. After taking third on a wild pitch, Rieschick scored on an RBI groundout from Brady Mulroy to make it a one-run

Rock Creek managed a scare in the fourth inning, but a harmless grounder ended the threat after back-to-back infield singles with two outs.

Offensive issues continued to plague the Wildcats, as the team's bats remained mostly silent, while the Mustangs continued to pile on in the bottom of the fifth inning.

Following a leadoff walk, Meyer then reached on an infield single that was quickly disputed by Purcell. The umpires ruled that first baseman Mason Alford missed the tag (after the throw pulled him off base) on what would've been the second out of the inning. Alex Feldkamp then hit a sacrifice fly in the next at-bat to add to the Mustang's lead and make it a 3-1 game.

"That's the routine play you have to make," Purcell said of the would-be second out. "Sometimes those things happen in the first inning that allow a run to score and then that's the run that beats you. It's hardly ever something that happens in the seventh that kills you. It's the things that you don't do in the first, second and third inning.

Rieschick, who had a big night for Holton, seemingly would not be denied as he came through with a two-out single Booth then slapped a chopper down the first base line that was misplayed by Rock Creek. That allowed Rieschick to score and bring the Wildcats within one run, 3-2, once again.

In the seventh inning, Allen got the best of Rock Creek relief pitcher Caleb Rogge to start things off by drawing a leadoff walk. Purcell then made the tough decision to put on the sacrifice bunt with Haverkamp at the plate to avoid the double play and advance Allen at the same time.

Then, Justin Pool had a marathon at-bat that signified the high stakes of the game. In the end, after fouling off several potential third stirkes, Pool just couldn't put the ball in play. Luis Butto did what his teammate couldn't quite do in the next at-bat, but his fly ball sailed right into the glove of Mustang right fielder Zach Nider to end the game in a 3-2 victory for Rock Creek.

"It's hard to get beat 3-2 because then you think, 'man, we had a chance.' We felt like we let one slip away," Purcell said. "It's bittersweet. You want to win that game, but on the other hand we played well."

The last time the Holton and Royal Valley baseball teams met on the diamond, the end result was a lopsided win for each and a split in a league

In regional action in Hoyt on Monday, the result was drastically different as the semifinal game mirrored the similarities between the Wildcats and Panthers. Both teams manufactured some runs when given the opportunity and HHS took advantage of the last opportunity, holding on for a 5-3 victory.

"Royal Valley, they're a team a lot like us. They're going to have to play well to win and it was a pretty close game. We were just able to execute some situations, get some key hits and come out on top," HHS coach Joe Purcell said.

Early on, it was the Panthers who jumped ahead of the Wildcats to take a 1-0 lead thanks to the base-running of Derrick Barger. After drawing a leadoff walk in the bottom of the first passed ball and a groundout advanced him to third base and he then scored on another passed ball to give RV the upper

Both sides were retired in order in the second inning before the Holton offense finally started to make some noise in the top of the third. After Barger and Zack Lux drew walks, the former managed to score on a double steal. Schultz then doubled in the next at-bat to put the Panthers back ahead

Holton answered immediately as Rieschick led off the sixth inning with a single while Booth was hit by a pitch in the next at-bat. Following the first out of the inning, Indie Allen was also hit by a pitch to load up the bases.

The Wildcats made the most of the opportunity with three straight RBI singles from Derek Haverkamp, Justin Pool and Luis Butto, with Pool dropping down a squeeze bunt for his RBI. That hit put HHS ahead before Butto's single gave the team a 5-3 lead.

Jaycee Worrell drew a leadoff walk for the Panthers and quickly advanced to third thanks to a passed ball and a groundout by Leslie Schuetz. Sarah Beam then drew a walk and Kaylie Parker followed with a bloop single that scored Worrell and knotted the game up at 1-1.

While runners remained at first and third with one out after Parker's RBI hit, RV could not make any more out of it as HHS pitcher Sarah Bond got a strikeout and a fly ball to center field to get out of the inning.

Following a quiet second inning, the Weilerts got Holton going again in the third inning. This time it was Taryn Weilert coming through with a leadoff single. Brianna Boyett then reached on an

error to put runners at second and

third with zero outs and Ali Morris followed that by getting on base thanks to another Panther error. That allowed Weilert to score and Casi VanAusdall followed with an RBI infield single to put HHS ahead 3-1. Royal Valley couldn't tie the game

## Wildcats send two to state golf

With the way things played out in regional competition at Abilene on Monday, the Holton golf team needed to have its best performance of the season to have a chance of qualifying for the 4A state tournament.

Considering the regional champions from Buhler saw five of their six individual golfers place in the top 10, the Wildcats were clearly fighting an uphill battle. It was tougher for some than others, but the HHS squad is still sending two golfers (Braden Sides and A. J. Haussler) to the state tournament. The team finished sixth overall.

"We were hoping to qualify as a team like everybody else does. We knew it was going to be tough and we'd really have to play our best," Holton coach Don Swisher said. "We thought we might do a little bit better as a team, but we'd have had to shoot crazy team scores to have gotten in the top two. Overall, it was nice to qualify two individuals."

Of the two golfers to qualify for state, one came as little surprise while the other continued to come on strong and shot his best 18-hole score of the season by four strokes to qualify for postseason play as a

That freshman, Haussler, continued trending upward and turned in one of the most consistent performances for the Wildcats. Shooting a 42 on both trips through the nine-hole course in Abilene, Haussler finished 11th individually and continued his improvement as a golfer.

I'm really happy for him. He's progressed throughout the year and you could see him gain confidence at each tournament and gaining the tournament experience," Swisher said. "It was just a matter of time and I think that gaining the experience throughout the season is what benefitted him the most."

Similarly, Garett Beecher turned in a pretty consistent effort at the regional tournament that both the player and coach were happy with when all was said and done, but some of the Wildcats' other contenders weren't so lucky.

Parker Sides has come on strong in the last few tournaments, while Hayden May has been a solid number two for Holton all season, but both struggled on the second nine holes and that was enough to derail their state chances.

For Holton's other state qualifier, Braden Sides, it was the first nine holes that proved to be a hindrance, but Swisher noted the senior was determined when he came through at the turn.

Sides boldly predicted he would finish the tournament scoring in the low 80s and finish under 40 strokes on the second nine holes. Sure enough, he shot an 84 overall to finish 12<sup>th</sup> individually and carded a 39 on the final nine holes.

"He's a battler and he had some bad luck in the first round and some penalty strokes that cost him. Consequently, that put him in a hole, but he dug out of that hole and survived it," Swisher said.

Now, "The Mentor" and "The Kid," as Swisher nicknamed Sides and Haussler due to the quick bond they've formed this season, will prepare for one final tournament

Šides has really been a mentor for this whole team and Swisher said he was glad to see his dedication pay off in a trip to state, while Haussler is continuing to learn to help build for the future with a small nucleus of returning golfers.

All that is left for both now, though, is to enjoy the experience and try to make a splash at the state tournament in McPherson starting at 8:30 a.m. next Tuesday.

Brandon Hart was the lone golfer representing Royal Valley at the regional tournament in Abilene and while he may not have had his best performance of the season, RV coach Willie McClane noted he still

saw progress being made.

Hart started on hole nine on Monday and while he struggled out of the gate, he did settle down in his second nine holes.

"I was glad to see that. As frustrated as he was, he still got better throughout the day, not worse," McClane said.

After one particularly difficult hole, McClane noted the sophomore rebounded well with a bogey and a par on the next two holes.

By the end of the season, the Panthers were down to just two golfers and while Max Hennis did not join Hart in regional competition, McClane did note he was pleased with how the two handled themselves over the course of the season and hopes that is a good sign for the future.

"They stepped up and they competed. I'm proud of what they did. Hopefully, they'll play a little bit this summer and next season we'll see where we go," McClane said.

## Jackson County area alumni competing at high level

With such high stakes in the championship stretch, Jackson County high school athletes have been turning in some of their best performances.

Unsurprisingly, so too have some former Cobras, Panthers and Wildcats who are now competing at the collegiate level. On the track, especially, several area alumni

have recently hit some top marks to

qualify for postseason competition. Just this past weekend in Ames, Iowa, RVHS alum Aaron Blevins set a new personal best by clearing 17' 34" in the pole vault at the Big 12 Conference championships. That put the current Jayhawk in a tie for second and also qualified him for NCAA Regional competition in Austin, Texas.

Similarly, former Cobra Cory **Keehn** is preparing for championship competition in Division II after qualifying in the 10,000m run for the Tigers of Fort Hays State University.

Keehn earned a spot in the Division II Outdoor Championships after recording the seventh best time (29:44.68) in the nation this spring. That time is also a new FHSU school

In addition, Keehn recently earned All-Region honors from the USTFCCCAA in both the 5,000m and 10,000m runs. He is the twotime defending MIAA champion in the 10,000m run.

Also at the Division II level, Royal Valley alum Elizabeth Blevins (Aaron's sister) has been competing for the Emporia State University track team this spring.

Blevins has done a little bit of

everything for the Hornets and recently competed in both the long jump and as a member of the women's 4x400m relay at the MIAA Conference meet. Blevins and her relay team members ended up medaling in sixth place at the MIAA Championships.

Another former Panther, Thomas Broxterman, just recently finished his track season at Allen County Community College after competing in the NJCAA Track and Field Championships.

Broxterman qualified, but did not medal, in the men's 800m run (finishing 32<sup>nd</sup>) and he was also part of the Allen County 4x800m relay team that took sixth place at the national championships.

Jackson Heights alumnus Eric Mellenbruch was also at the NJCAA national championship competition, competing for Highland Community College and while he did not medal like Broxterman, he was part of two qualifying relay teams in the 4x800m relay and the 4x400m relay.

The college softball season recently wrapped up and while no area alumni were a part of as much team success as the track and field athletes, some individuals still wrapped up some stellar seasons.

Wildcat Cassidy Former Merriman made a strong debut with the Washburn University softball team (27-24), finishing among the team leaders in batting average (.341, second), runs scored (48, first), doubles (12, second), home runs (12, second) and RBI (33, fourth).

With those numbers, Merriman was recognized as an honorable mention pick for the All-MIAA softball team.

At the junior college level, a couple other Holton alumni made a big splash as well as **Emmy McManigal** and Christa Merriman (Cassidy's

sister) had strong seasons as well at Allen County and Fort Scott

community colleges, respectively. McManigal finished with a .341 average and was third on the team with 18 RBI. She also went 2-2 with a 3.41 ERA in the pitcher's circle. Fellow former Wildcats Amber Searles and Jordan Barber also

contributed in more minor roles. Meanwhile, Merriman did a little bit of everything for the Greyhounds finishing second on the team with a .374 batting average and third with 18 RBI. She, too, was solid in the pitcher's circle with a 9-13 overall record and a 3.03 ERA. RV alum Ashley Lake also made some appearances for Fort Scott this past

On the links, Holton grad Tavin Dugan competed with the Washburn golf team and in his last tournament of the season he finished tied for 42<sup>nd</sup> with a three-round score of 233 (+20) to help the Ichabods finish fifth as a team at its home invitational.

Finally, one former Wildcat continues to pursue his dream of an NFL career as Forrestal Hickman is trying to make it as an undrafted free agent and recently tried out with the San Diego Chargers at a rookie minicamp this past weekend. He is also currently getting set to work out for the Green Bay Packers.





### Montgomery County's Erbe continues Memorial tradition

Every year in preparation for Memorial Day, Wilma Jean Erbe visits the three cemeteries where her relatives are buried. She goes to spruce up the grounds and place flowers on the graves.

What's different about Erbe's annual pilgrimage is she makes the rounds to Harrison, Cherryvale and Altoona the first or second weekend in May. Erbe makes certain the grass rounding each tombstone



clipped and groomed. Even the foundation is brushed clean and any weeds that may have sprung up since last year are pulled by hand.

I met the 94-year-old Montgomery County lady May 2. Her daughter, Aprile, the German spelling, was chauffeuring her mother 61 miles round trip to manicure the three cemeteries. The back seat and floorboard of Aprile's car was filled with buckets of flowers, clippers and other tools for their task.

As we walked to the tombstone bearing her husband's name, Alfred Ernst Erbe, also clearly etched in the granite was Wilma Jean Erbe's name and birthdate on the left side of the grave marker. Wilma Jean (Estes) was born April 30, 1921. God willing, she'll live to be 100 years old.

"People can't believe I'm as old as I am," Erbe says. "I'm the eldest member of my church in Neodesha. and I'm still going strong.

On May 30, 1868, soldiers who died in the Civil War were honored for the first time on Decoration Day. Mourners honored the Civil War dead by decorating their graves with flowers.

By the late 19th Century, many communities across the country had begun to celebrate Memorial Day and after World War I, observers began to honor the dead of all America's wars

In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be celebrated the last Monday in May.

As a farm girl, Erbe grew up milking cows. Every year on "Decoration Day," her dad would load the family in the wagon and travel to the Harrison chapel and cemetery located in the country approximately 15 miles northeast of Neodesha.

When they arrived at the cemetery, the children were lined up next to one of their relative's tombstones and Erbe's father would tell them a





### Holton's water watch lifted after recent rains

To Public Wholesale Water Supply District 18 officials, the most positive effect felt in the Holton area from recent rains is the significant rise in pool levels at Banner Creek

According to Holton City Manager Bret Bauer, enough rain has fallen in the reservoir's area to lift the lake level from four feet below normal pool to "somewhere between a foot below normal pool and full capacity," as Bauer told the Holton City Commission on Monday. As a result, commissioners voted to lift a water watch in place on the city since June of last year.

Under the water watch, city water customers were asked — but not ordered — to cut back on outdoor water use while the lake levels were down. Bauer told commissioners that for PWWSD 18 to issue water restrictions, the lake must be at least three feet below normal pool levels.

For the first three months of the year, the lake level was 48 to 52 inches below normal, according to

data provided to commissioners. But between readings taken on April 21 and May 8, the lake level rose by two feet — from 49 inches down on the former date to 25.5 inches down on the latter date.

Another reading taken May 11 showed the lake level had risen even further, standing at 21.5 inches below normal pool. With rains received since then, Bauer noted that the lake level had risen to within a foot of normal — and with more rain on the way this week, he said, it is possible that the level may rise to

As a result of the rising lake levels at Banner, Bauer said PWWSD 18 officials will likely discuss lifting their restriction soon, and Jackson County Rural Water District 3 — which, like Holton, purchases water from Banner via the PWWSD 18 treatment plant — will also likely consider lifting its restriction in the near future.

PWWSD 18 issued a voluntary water watch in September of 2013 after lake levels at Banner dropped

down to four feet below normal pool level. But since Holton takes its water from more sources than just Banner — including Prairie Lake, which Bauer said was at full capacity on Monday — it was determined that the city would not have to participate in the water watch.

However, dry conditions in recent years prompted the city to issue its own voluntary water watch last June, in conjunction with a water warning issued by PWWSD 18. For Holton customers, a water watch is triggered when the city's storage falls below 85 percent capacity, groundwater levels are five feet below normal seasonal levels, and/or lake or reservoir elevation is three feet below seasonal level.

At that point, the city encourages its water customers to curtail some outdoor water use and be more efficient with indoor water use, offering tips to cut back on such use. Cutbacks are not mandated or enforced, city officials noted.

Under the "water warning," the city's storage is below 70 percent

capacity, groundwater levels are 10 feet below normal, and/or lake or reservoir levels are five feet below normal pool. Outdoor water use is scaled back even more but not entirely prohibited, and conservation education efforts are increased.

A "water emergency" is triggered when storage is below 50 percent capacity, groundwater levels are 15 feet below normal, and/or lake or reservoir levels are seven feet below normal pool. Outdoor water use is banned, and the city may choose to seek additional emergency supplies from other users, the state or the federal government.

The city has utilized Banner as its water supply since mid-2001, when temporary lines from Banner to the city's water treatment plant were installed to help alleviate a similar situation at Prairie Lake, which was the city's primary water source until the changeover to water from Banner.

Banner Creek Reservoir is located 1 1/2 miles west of Holton on Kansas Highway 16 and encompasses 535 surface acres, it was reported.

are expected to generate \$7,500 additional funds. Also, he is recommending that the driver education program fees be increased from \$125 to \$175 for the summer of 2016, which would raise an additional \$1,750 for the dis-

"This will still make us a cheap driver's education program among school districts," he said.

One of the items being considered for reduction is \$3,000 from club-related field trips.

"We just need to hold ourselves more accountable, and if it's a necessary trip, then we'll go," Rundle said. Board member Ann Kelly requested a list of club field trips and their expenses to review at the next meeting.

Due to two retirements and one resignation, three staff positions are open but will not be filled next year, which is expected to save the district \$98,840, Rundle said.

Board members agreed to review all the proposed budget cuts in the next few weeks in preparation for the next



# Leak at Holton's pool won't slow the upcoming swimming season

While Holton's parks and recreation department looks toward Saturday's grand opening of the Holton Municipal Swimming Pool, the department is also looking for a leak in the pool, the Holton City Commission learned on Monday.

Holton City Manager Bret Bauer said a possible leak has been located at the historic pool, which Bauer said is losing between an inch and an inch and a half of water a day, or as City Clerk Teresa Riley calculated, about 3,000 gallons a day. However, he also noted that there may be more than one cause of a leak, and the city may have to look at an increase in water and pool chemical costs for this year.

"This summer, I think we can get by, by limping along," Bauer told commissioners. "But we're going to need to discuss future options, what we want to do, and if we want to do

anything.'

The pool itself, built in the 1930s as a WPA project, was last remodeled in 1986, commissioners noted, with some touch-up and paint work done along the way. Over time, parks and recreation employees have had to work on the pool's stone bath house, which has been recognized as a historic structure.

Concerning the leak, Bauer said that the city's water and wastewater department "might have found where some of the leak is coming from" in a 2 1/2-inch valve that was put in place with the 1986 remodel. A new valve has been ordered and will be installed, he added, but "we're not 100 percent sure that's where all the leak is com-

There is a possibility that the leak's origin is underneath the pool, as Water and Wastewater Superintendent Dennis Ashcraft has estimated, and if that is the case, Bauer said, "we're going to have a problem." The leak cannot be found near the top of the pool, he

said, and with recent rains saturating the ground under and near the pool, it is hard to tell if there is a leak closer to the surface.

"We're going to hope, pray and keep our fingers crossed that this valve is either the problem, or at least a majority of the problem," Bauer told commissioners.

Holton Mayor Robert Dieckmann urged Bauer to contact the Kansas State Historical Society to see if there are any funds available to repair the pool, since it has been recognized as a historical structure.

The pool, located in Rafters Park north of Seventh Street and Nebraska Avenue, will open at noon Saturday with a free swim. The pool is scheduled to be open from noon to 9 p.m. daily, it was reported.

In other business on Monday, commissioners approved a "development agreement" with Walmart that Bauer said "lays out everything that Walmart is responsible for and everything that we are responsible for" in connection with the upcoming construction of a new Walmart store at the intersection of U.S. Highway 75 and Banner

Bauer said the agreement includes two "points of contention" that have been negotiated between City Attornev Dennis White and attorneys for Walmart, which has had a presence in Holton since 1981. One, which White and Walmart's attorneys agreed upon just prior to Monday's meeting, is an indemnity clause; the other is a "construction inspection" document.

Concerning the latter, Bauer said the document "would have taken dollars out of our budget that were not budgeted" for construction of the new store, so Walmart is covering the cost of the document at its expense. Bauer also noted the document is required by the Kansas Department of Transportation as "a part of our duties and responsibilities for receiving funds"

from KDOT for extension of Banner Road onto the new store's parking lot.

No firm date has been set for a groundbreaking for the new store, although Walmart representatives have stated that it will be in "late spring or early summer."

Commissioners also:

■ Noted the absence of Commissioner Erich Campbell until about 7:45 p.m.

■ Approved minutes from the May 4 meeting

■ Approved budget appropriations made since the May 4 meeting.

■ Heard a complaint from Holton resident Guy Cameron about residents in his neighborhood who are operating all-terrain vehicles on their property and creating "a muddy, filthy mess." Holton Police Chief Gale Gakle told Cameron that he had received some calls about the ATVs and suggested 'alternate places to ride, somewhere out in the county" to family mem-

■ Approved the purchase of dashboard video cameras for the city's police patrol cars from Watch Guard of Allen, Texas, at a cost of \$35,140. Of that amount, only \$12,451.74 would come from the city's equipment reserve fund, while the remainder would come from the police department's 'seizure fund" and a private donation, it was reported.

■ Approved the lifting of a voluntary water watch for city water customers (see related story).

■ Approved a zoning change on a property in the 700 block of New Jersey Avenue from I-1 (light industrial) zoning to R-2 (two-family dwelling) zoning. Bauer said Developmental Services of Jackson County owns the property and plans to build a duplex on it. The zoning change had been recommended by the Holton Planning Commission, it was noted.


