Winters named 2015 Alumna of the Year

During her years at Holton High School, Doris Hill Winters made it a point to stay active.

Winters served as vice president of the HHS Student Council, was a cheerleader, a member of the massed chorus, the girls' glee club and the orchestra, and she sold advertising for the school newspaper, The Holtonian.

That was before her graduation in 1940. Even today, Winters makes it a point to stay active — no easy feat for someone who's 92.

"I'm very active in Fullerton," said Winters, who was named this year's Holton High School Alumna of the Year during this past weekend's HHS alumni activities. "I've been on the St. Jude Medical Center board, I'm a director with the Fullerton Civic Light Opera Company, and I belong to the local Baptist church, I'm on the finance committee and I'm still active in the choir."

Winters still gets back to Holton at least once a year, usually staying with her cousin, William Hill. She also still attempts to keep in touch with the few members of her class that remain.

"I think there's still one or two more of us left," she said. "I heard that two of us passed away recently."

Winters was born on a farm about five miles outside of Holton, the daughter of John and Harriet Fricker Hill.

"My father taught school for a little while," Winters said. "He decided he didn't go for that, so he went into farming."

She grew up on that farm with her brother, Joe Hill, and she attended



Lone Star Country School for eight years, then went on to Holton High School, where she kept busy with a myriad of activities before graduating in 1940.

Following her graduation from HHS, she moved with her mother and brother to Santa Ana, Calif., where they lived with Winters' grandmother, Clara Fricker. Winters began her college career at Santa Ana College, then transferred to the University of California at Los Angeles, or UCLA, where she majored in business administration.

"I also did some graduate work at Long Beach State," she said.

Business was the focus of Winters' career, having worked for an uncle for a year as an office manager at his fertilizer business before going on to work for a prominent Fullerton

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Deghand to be inducted into division Hall of Fame

Master Sgt. Bernard Lee "Bernie" Deghand of Mayetta, who was killed in action in 2006 while serving with the Kansas National Guard in support of the War on Terror in Afghanistan, will be posthumously honored in September by his fellow members of the 35th Infantry Division with a place in the division's Hall of Fame.

Deghand is one of five former members of the 35th Infantry Division who will be inducted into the 35th Division Hall of Fame during a special ceremony set for Saturday, Sept. 12 at the Kansas City Airport Hilton Hotel in Kansas City, Mo. The ceremony is part of the 2015 35th Division Association Annual Conference, it was reported.

Deghand, who was Jackson County's first casualty in the War on Terror, will be the second Jackson County to be inducted into the 35th Division Hall of Fame. The first was the late Capt. Elwin I. Shopteese, a 2013 inductee and

member of the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation who served during World War II and participated in the D-Day invasion at Normandy.

Other former members of the 35th Division who will be inducted into the Hall of Fame include Sgt. Lawnie Coffman, Pfc. Murray Leff, Capt. Samuel G. O'Brien, Pfc. Halbert Edward Olson and Staff Sgt. Jack L. Ulmer. In addition to Deghand and Shopteese, other notable members of the Hall of Fame include former President Harry S. Truman and former Arkansas governor Orval Faubus.

The 35th Division Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have had or have a service connection with the 35th Division at any time, beginning in 1917 with the initial activation of the 35th Infantry Division. The Hall of Fame is located in the 35th Division Museum at the Museum of the Kansas National Guard in Topeka.

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Our Lady of the Snows parish to note 100th year

A special mass is being planned for Sunday to mark the 100th anniversary of the Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church, located on the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation in Mayetta.

Laura Thackery, one of the organizers of the celebration and a member of the church for 28 years, said that Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann will conduct a special mass at 3 p.m. Sunday at the church, located at 5971 166th Road.

Members of the public are invited to attend the mass, as well as a potluck meal and celebration planned afterwards. Soup and sandwiches will be provided, Thackery said.

About 50 people attend the weekly mass services at the church, Thackery said. Mass is held at 8:30 a.m. on the first, third and fourth Sundays

of the month and are conducted by Father Duane Reinert. Mass is held at 1 p.m. on the second Sunday of each month by Father Christopher Rossman.

According to a history of the church, the Prairie Band Potawatomi people came to Kansas in 1838. Before building their own church, the Potawatomi traveled by team and wagon to Emmett and St. Marys to attend mass some Sundays, especially at Easter and Christmas.

When Father Murphy arrived at Emmett in 1911, the Catholic Indian community held services in the Blandin schoolhouse. Funds were collected to begin building a church at that time.

Ground was donated by Mitchell Battese, and the first spade of earth

Farm Bureau members get discount on stroke screenings

Everyone has risks associated with stroke, it has been reported. Knowing your risk and getting a fast and painless stroke screening are your best defenses against a life-threatening or life-altering event.

Many people go through their daily routines without realizing how close they are to suffering a life-threatening stroke. And, unfortunately, most people don't have symptoms or signs before a stroke occurs. That's why stroke is commonly referred to as the "silent killer," ranking as the third leading cause of death in the United States.

But new mobile technology is available today to help individuals determine their stroke risk in advance so they can take steps to improve

their health.

A stroke screening will help to identify these blood flow blockages. Stroke Detection Plus, a mobile vascular screening company, uses ultrasound technology to find blockages in the body's blood vessels that could lead to a stroke.

"Ultrasound technology is something that's been around for more than 50 years. Medical professionals have used the visual, non-invasive technology in many applications. Pregnancy is probably the most well-known application of ultrasound," Scott McGlothlen, Stroke Detection Plus president, said.

Ultrasound can also help doctors see blocked blood vessels without performing an angiogram, an inva-

sive procedure in which a tiny catheter tube is inserted into a blood vessel.

Patients remain fully clothed as the technician moves an ultrasound probe over specific areas of the body to detect potential blood vessel blockages.

"In five minutes, we can tell people if they have blockage. And they get these results confidentially, so it doesn't affect their health premium," McGlothlen said.

During a Stroke Detection Plus screening, a certified ultrasound technician performs four tests.

"If the ultrasound test discovers a

potential health problem, an on-staff nurse for Stroke Detection Plus will follow up with a phone consultation to encourage patients to visit their doctor for diagnosis and treatment," McGlothlen said.

People over the age of 40 are encouraged to get tested, especially with one or more of the following risk factors: high blood pressure, diabetes, more than 20 pounds overweight, smoke, have high cholesterol, inactive lifestyle or have a family medical history of heart disease or stroke.

Stroke Detection Plus will be screening at the St. Dominic Catholic Church in Holton from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Friday, June 12.

Holton graduates in running for election to state FFA office

Two recent Holton High School graduates are among the 18 candidates running for a state office position to represent more than 8,850 Kansas FFA members for the 2015-16 term, according to a news release from the Kansas FFA organization.

Dean Klahr and Karl Wilhelm will complete an intense process of interviews, tests and public speaking demonstrations this week as part of the 87th Kansas FFA State Convention on the Kansas State University campus in Manhattan. An appointed nominating committee of former state officers and agricultural education instructors will interview the candidates.

Ten nominated candidates will be submitted to the state convention delegates, consisting of two members from each of the 176 chapters in the state. After hearing the candidates present a final prepared speech, the delegates will elect the six members who will serve as the 2015-16 state officer team. The new team will be announced and installed at the final session of the convention Friday afternoon.

The committee evaluates the candidates on their applications, a written test, writing exercises and five rounds of interviews. These include one-on-one interviews, delivering a speech, facilitating a workshop, round-robin interviews and a personal interview round. Once elected, the officers will travel across the state promoting agricultural science education and FFA.

A four-year FFA member, Klahr has served as HHS chapter president and North Central District Vice President. His Supervised Agricultural Experience Program (SAE) focuses on work with the Jackson County Conservation District and his cattle operation. He plans to attend Kansas State University next fall and later work in the animal feed industry. He is the son of Dennis and Eunice Klahr.

Wilhelm has served as a chapter vice president and been involved in various Career Development Events (CDE) during his four years in FFA. His SAE is in sales and service. He plans to attend KSU next fall with the career objective of becoming a chemical engineer with a focus on crop va-

riety development. He is the son of Kevin and Brenda Wilhelm.

Their advisors are Alex Bartel and Jason Larison.

STATE NEWS: Child support obligations under review

Every four years, an advisory committee reviews Kansas' child support guidelines to ensure that the roughly \$35 million mothers and fathers pay in support each month is equitable for the parents and appropriate for the day-to-day essential needs of the children they support, it has been reported.

As a result of the most recent review, started in June 2014, child support obligations could increase by an average of about 3.5 percent across all income groups beginning January 2016.

Child support pays for housing, clothing, transportation, recreation, health care, child care and other ex-

penses that would have been shared by the parents had the family remained intact.

A 14-member advisory committee spent nearly a year reviewing the guidelines and making proposed updates, which are now open for public review and comment until 8 a.m. Monday, June 22. Comments can be made through an online survey accessible from the Kansas judicial branch website at www.kscourts.org under the heading "What's New."

Federal law requires states to review their child support guidelines every four years, and Kansas has reviewed and revised its guidelines nine times since they were initially established in 1989.

Reviews are by an advisory committee that has included parents who either pay or receive child support, and attorneys, judges and tax professionals with expertise in child support. Economists are also enlisted to help with the review. Committee members are identified in a report posted on the web page where the survey is accessed, along with the economists' report, the proposed guidelines and other useful documents.

After receiving public comment, the Kansas Supreme Court will decide whether to adopt changes to the guidelines as proposed by the advisory committee.

PLAINS FOLK: An interview with Faye Gaines

In my last column I wrote about Faye Gaines, an 88-year-old New Mexico rancher with a wonderful independent spirit. My conversation with her reminded me of another conversation with another interesting octogenarian several years ago.

I don't recall just how I had made the connection, but I met with Jackie Laird in the Pioneer Woman Museum in Ponca City, Okla. I taped an interview with her in her wheel chair, Stetson hat on her head, sitting beneath an oil painting of herself as a teenage girl wearing a green riding skirt and an even broader-brimmed Stetson. Jackie was the last surviving trouper from the Miller Brothers'



famous 101 Ranch Wild West Show. Jackie's teenage years coincided with the last few years of the Wild West Show, where she rode bucking steers and did trick riding. She traveled all over the country and across to England and Europe with the show, accruing all sorts of experiences that were now just good memories. Well, most of them were good.

When she offhandedly mentioned Bill Pickett, the black cowboy from Texas who invented bulldogging, it suddenly occurred to me that she also would have known Buffalo Bill Cody, who in his last years, having lost his own Wild West Show to bankruptcy, had joined with the 101.

Here was my chance to learn about an icon of the Old West who is arguably the most important figure in American show business. Cody was the first popular-culture megastar in our history, and here was a woman who knew him firsthand. I was only two removes from Buffalo Bill!

"So you knew Buffalo Bill," I said

to Jackie, "Tell me about him." "He was a mean old son-of-a-b---," she said, "I didn't like him."

Once I had pushed my dropped jaw back into its normal position, I asked for an explanation. It seems that, in a pageant depicting Manifest Destiny, Jackie was part of a wagon-train family that is attacked by Indians. Buffalo Bill then leads the cavalry in charging to the rescue of the beleaguered pioneers. During daytime performances the Indians carried spears, but in the night shows they carried torches — much more dramatic and colorful that way.

During one of these evening performances the canvas on the wagon caught fire, as did Jackie's dress. Buffalo Bill came running up to her, jumped off his horse, and rolled her in the dirt of the arena to put out the fire.

Once the fire was out, he said, "Quit hogging the show," and jumped back

onto his horse. It turned out that Jackie was uninjured, but as an ambulance rushed her to a hospital she could hear the crowd crying for an encore; they thought it was all part of the act.

Now I don't think that Buffalo Bill was such an egotist that his admonishment was literal. Rather, I think that in all the excitement and stress, he was just trying to ease the situation. But all those years later that's not how Jackie Laird remembered it.

My other key memory of that occasion is that when visitors came in and saw Jackie, museum personnel would point to her, then to her portrait above her. Seemingly without self-awareness, Jackie would straighten in her wheelchair. Sixty or 70 years after having last performed with the Wild West Show, her show-business persona was still strong.

RVHS trio qualifies for state competition

While this year has been somewhat of an off year for the Royal Valley track team, with participation numbers down compared to past seasons, that didn't stop the Panthers from staying right in the thick of things at a tough regional track meet the team hosted last Friday.

After the dust settled, it was unsurprising to see Patrick Broxterman heading back to the state meet and being joined by first-time qualifiers Eugene Masquat and Macy Putnam.

There may have been some disappointments, with Lucas Broxterman and Kate Hanson both narrowly missing out on state berths, but that can be used as fuel for next season.

In fact, both Putnam and Masquat used similar feelings regarding their finishes in the 100m/110m hurdles to push them to qualifying performances in the final hurdle race of the night, especially Putnam.

"I think they were a little disappointed in the 100m that they didn't perform quite as well, it being a tough race and everything," RV coach Denise Visocky said. "Macy not being able to make the finals of that, I think that helped motivate her to really focus in on the 300 and go out there and perform well."

Both hurdlers finished fourth in the 300m hurdles to qualify for state, while Masquat narrowly missed out on going to state in the 110m hurdles as well after a fifth-place finish.

In the process, Putnam also set a new school record (48.22) in the 300m hurdles, breaking the previous record (49.2) set by Denise Place that has stood since 1990.

Those two first-timers will be joined at state by veteran Patrick Broxterman, who will be going for his third state medal on Saturday. After a third-place finish at the regional in Hoyt, both coach and athlete alike know it will be a tough road ahead in Wichita if he wants to accomplish that goal.

"This year, it's going to be a lot tougher go-around than it has been in the past. There's a lot of great high jumpers there in 4A, so he's going

to perform well in order to get back up on the medal stand," Visocky said.

Only three athletes may have made it out of regional competition, but Visocky noted she saw a lot of promising results. Lucas Broxterman narrowly missed out on joining his brother at state in the high jump, while Hanson was no more than two spots away from qualifying in all three throwing events.

Freshmen like Katie Hanshaw and Garrett Hicks also got a taste of what regional competition is truly like and Visocky said she saw some of those athletes, along with some returning upperclassmen like Jarrett Roy, walking away excited about what the future could hold for them.

"I think that will help motivate them to get even further next year and better prepare themselves and that kind of stuff," Visocky said.

The immediate future, though, holds opportunities for Masquat, Putnam and Patrick Broxterman and in the case of the former, Visocky said she will try to keep the first-time state competitors relaxed heading into competition in Wichita this weekend.

While the RVHS athletes and all others state qualifiers will get some practice time at Wichita State University's Cessna Stadium on Thursday, the most important thing for the Panthers to think about is treating it like just another meet, Visocky said.

If all three Royal Valley athletes can do that, then Visocky believes it has the potential to be a special weekend for all of them.

"They've all worked really hard this year. Patrick's been steady all the way through and he knows what to expect. Macy and Eugene are in that spot where they have a great opportunity to get a medal," Visocky said. "I'm just really excited for them and hopefully they do their best down there."

Putnam will get the first opportunity to compete for Royal Valley, with the 4A girls 300m hurdles preliminary heats starting at 4:20 p.m. in Wichita on Friday.

Wildcats hold their own at regional track

It's hard to imagine a regional track meet being on par with state as far as level of difficulty is concerned, but last Friday's Class 4A regional in Hoyt may have come as close as possible in replicating that state-caliber competition.

Truth be told, some events did in fact have the top four athletes in the class competing in the field, making qualifying for the state meet that much more difficult.

Holton's track team managed pretty well though, all things considered, as 11 HHS athletes qualified for state track and a couple more just narrowly missed out after all the results were tallied.

"Our team competed as well as it could have Friday, being one of the toughest regionals in 4A in terms of quality performances," coach Mark Middlemist said.

The Wildcats had their fair share of those quality performances, even among those who just missed making it to state, like Emily Degenhardt (girls 800m run) and Mason Strader (boys 1600m run), who set a new personal record that would've qualified him in any other regional.

"You can't ask for any better effort," Middlemist said.

Among those athletes going to state, some familiar names rose to the top for Holton once again as Kimmi Snapp, Indie Allen, Holly Karn and Luis Butto led the charge in the Wildcats' regional push.

Snapp was competing in one of those loaded fields in the 100m and 200m dash and, to boot, had to deal with a leg injury in the latter race.

Still, the senior managed to qualify in both races after a runner-up finish in the 100m dash and a fourth-place finish in the 200m dash despite that injury forcing her to pull up towards the end of the race (though she still broke her own school record in the event).

In addition to that, Snapp anchored the 4x100m relay with team members Holly Karn, Ashley Cook and Ashlyn Weilert, which also set a new school record at the regional meet. Their time of 50.25, good for a regional title, broke the previous record (51.1) set by Whitney Degenhardt, Crista Bechard, Melissa Nelson and Megan Middlemist in 2005.

Fellow relay team member Karn also qualified in individual competition, carving her own path to state in the 100m hurdles in a final heat that was neck-and-neck to the end.

"Holly had a great day in the

hurdles in a very competitive race there and showed some grit at the end, with the last two hurdles making a difference to push through the top four," Middlemist said.

Butto and Allen both pushed through to state in the triple jump, with Allen claiming the regional title and breaking his own school record (43' 8 1/2") in the process. The pair nearly also made it in the long jump and showed off the versatility that has defined the boys team this season by helping the 4x100m relay team (along with Miles McClintock-Strozier and Justin Pool) qualify for state as well.

One of those spots was intended for Will Wright, but an injury suffered at the Big Seven League meet sidelined him last Friday. While there were some inconsistencies having to replace one of the relay team members, Middlemist was glad that the flexibility of his athletes still allowed him to do that and get a few more athletes to the state meet.

"It's unfortunate for Will, but we're fortunate enough that we've got the depth, especially in that relay, that we can put somebody in there to get qualified," Middlemist said.

While state track will be an even bigger deal, Middlemist said he believes his team will be well-served and well-prepared coming out of that regional in particular as the athletes now get set to head to Wichita this weekend.

"I think being at a regional like we were last week prepares us a little bit for this week in terms of the pressure that's going to be there," Middlemist said. "Hopefully, we've mentally met that challenge and we have a good time down there."

There is a more relaxed atmosphere around the team now, despite the high stakes, as the student-athletes have been released for summer

break. Middlemist said he is trying to keep things that way before the Wildcats head down to Wichita to start preparing on Thursday.

Holton's athletes will practice on the Wichita State University track on Thursday and try to get all the jitters out then before preparing mentally that night and hopefully, Middlemist said, coming out and performing at their peak over the weekend.

"We've geared ourselves for this

all season long with our goals in terms of where we want to be. As far as practices now, we're just finishing up and fine-tuning everything to get ready to go this weekend," Middlemist said.

State competition for the Wildcat athletes will start on Friday with the preliminary heats of the girls 100m hurdles and Holly Karn up first at approximately 2:10 p.m. at Wichita State's Cessna Stadium.

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Large contingency of Cobras heading to 2A state track meet

By all measurable marks, this track season has far and away been a success for the Jackson Heights team. On top of the collective success earned by having one of the largest squads in the county, the Cobras saw that equaled at the individual level in last Friday's regional at Washington.

In total, 14 individual athletes qualified for state competition, which was the top mark in Jackson County, and for the first time that coach Lyle Alley can remember in his 36 years with the JHHS track program every male athlete who went to regional qualified in at least one event.

"I'd say we did pretty well. It just seemed like once we got going, every time we stepped on the track somebody was qualifying for state," Alley said.

While the Cobras turned in some of their best performances of the season, Alley was quick to remind his athletes that the regional is a qualifying meet. As long as they placed in the top four, they would be heading to Wichita, regardless of final times or distances.

That was important to remember for one athlete in particular as sprinter Peter Rupnicki had some uncharacteristic stumbles out of the starting blocks in the preliminary heats of the 100m and 200m dash.

Rupnicki got through to the finals in both races, though, and picked himself up to finish fourth in both events and punch his ticket to the state meet, which Alley said the junior was very excited about on Friday.

Alley left his athletes with two pieces of advice while getting off the bus before the regional began on Friday and Rupnicki ended up taking heed of both notes.

"There were two things I told them. Number one, just the tidbit about it's all about finishing. If you want to qualify for state, when the gun goes off get yourself in the top four and stay there. And then, I'm a firm believer that this time of year, if you don't take your 'A' game you don't deserve to go on to state, but, yeah, we brought the 'A' game with us on Friday," Alley said.

That carried over to other events

as well, with all three boys relays (4x100m, 4x400m and 4x800m) qualifying for state, while Wyatt Olberding (triple jump) and Seth Holliday (800m run) captured a pair of runner-up finishes at the regional meet.

Holliday in particular really anchored the team and seems to be settling into a rhythm in the 800m events especially, according to Alley. The senior had a season best time in the individual 800m while staying right on the heels of the defending state champion (Washington County's Dylan Hodgson) in the event.

In the 4x800m relay, Holliday wasn't far off that pace, but maybe his best showing was in the final leg of the 4x400m relay. With Jackson Heights in a close third, Holliday took the baton and recorded his best split of the season (nearly 51 seconds flat) to help the Cobras claim a regional title in the event.

"Those are the types of things that we've come to rely on Seth for. We just have confidence that when he gets the baton, he's going to do something special," Alley said.

All of the relay teams did something special at the regional meet, as all three boys relays clocked season best times to lock up their spots in the state meet. Alley highlighted the performance of two freshmen as well, Braden Dohl and Dalton Chartier, for stepping up and helping the 4x800m relay shave 17 seconds off its best time to solidify its qualifying mark.

The Lady Cobras were equally impressive in the distance races, as Kaitlynn Little qualified in both the 800m and 1600m run along with the 4x800m relay.

Competing with the top distance runners in Class 2A, Little did what she needed to in order to qualify individually and Alley noted she had a good race plan to put her in that position.

Racing against a strong trio of runners from Maranatha in the 1600m event, Alley noted Little stayed with the third runner as long as possible on the way to a fourth-place finish. Then, she helped the 4x800m relay by running the opening leg to build

a lead. Two freshmen, Lexi Proffitt and Erika White, helped the Cobras stay at the front of the pack before fellow senior Aidan Allen anchored the relay for the JHHS girls and saw all her hard work culminate in a trip to the state track meet.

"Aidan was one of those young ladies who just came out and just kept sawing wood and finally in her last year as a track athlete it paid off," Alley said.

Abby Williams was the only other female athlete to qualify for Heights, setting a new personal record in the high jump and finishing as regional runner-up. Williams nearly made it in the long jump, too, highlighting the success of some young JHHS athletes this season.

While Alley noted there is no predicting how those young athletes will perform in their first state track meet, it is still a positive sign for the team no matter how the weekend goes.

"Either way, it's just a great opportunity for the young people to experience that and take that experience into the next track season," Alley said.

Now, this week leading up to the state meet in Wichita is about equal parts physical preparation and mental preparation, though Alley said he is mostly trying to keep the same routine for his athletes leading up to state competition.

If they stick to the habits that have worked all season, then Alley said he believes all his athletes have a shot at potentially medaling at the state meet, though he noted he will feel proud of these athletes no matter what happens.

"We've gotten there because we've worked hard," Alley said. "When you take a look at what these young people have been able to accomplish due to what we have to train on compared to what other schools are training on, you have to tip your hat to these kids. They've done a great job."

Jackson Heights will try to do a little more in Wichita this weekend, with the boys 4x100m relay team starting things off in preliminary competition at 10:05 a.m. on Friday.

Northeast Kansas track athletes have strong regional showings

With a shot at state glory on the line, several area athletes stepped up in regional competition over the weekend and nearly 200 athletes from the Twin Valley League, Big Seven League and NEKL will be representing northeast Kansas in Wichita this coming weekend.

Starting from the top down, a handful of fellow 4A competitors will be joining Holton and Royal Valley at the state meet this Friday and Saturday.

Perry-Lecompton and Jeff West headed east to Kansas City for regional competition on Friday and both teams saw multiple athletes qualify for state, though the Tigers had just one boy (Michael Majors, shot put) and one girl (Makayla Green, javelin) come out of regional competition.

The Kaws were led by regional champion Austin Kurtz, who won the boys javelin, while teammates Cody Williams, Cole Kellum and Seth Surface all punched their tickets in the same event (400m dash) and will be going to state as part of the 4x400m relay as well.

For the girls, Lexia Jamison (800m run), Abby Folks (triple jump) and Taylor Ball (shot put) will also be representing Perry at the state meet.

In Class 3A competition at Osage City, Nemaha Central ended up sweeping the regional titles in both division, while the Sabetha boys were runner-up and the Lady Blue Jays finished third as a team.

Numerous athletes took individual titles, including Jacob Koelzer sweeping first place in the 100m and 200m dash, as well as the long jump. Teammate Colin Lierz swept the top spot in the 800m and 1600m runs, while fellow Thunder athletes Zach Bradley (110m hurdles) and Caleb Bradley (pole vault) each took the top spot in one individual event.

Other regional champions from the area in the boys competition included Riverside's Andrae McGaughy in the 300m hurdles, Horton's Trey Dishon in the discus and shot put and Sabetha's Keegan Cox in the 3200m run, along with 4x800m relay team.

There were a handful of gold medalists from the Big Seven and NEKL in the girls competition as well, starting with Maur Hill's Kassie

Johnson in the 100m hurdles.

Fellow regional champions included Nemaha Central's Rachel Baumgartner (pole vault), Sabetha's Megan Garrett (high jump), Hiawatha's Emily Gartner (shot put and discus) and a couple more Thunder athletes to round it out, with Samantha Wessel winning the long jump and Shaylyn Stallbaumer taking first in the javelin.

Joining Jackson Heights at Washington were a number of TVL and fellow NEKL teams, who each had some success of their own, starting with host Washington County taking the regional title in the boys division and finishing runner-up on the girls side.

Numerous individual accolades were earned as well, with the Tigers' own Dylan Hodgson sweeping the top spot in the boys distance races. Washington County also had individual champions in the 110m hurdles (Jonathan Harding), high jump (Jerrod Hoover), pole vault (Justin Hoover), long jump (Kyle Edgar) and shot put/discus (Brett Herra), with the 4x100m relay team taking gold as well.

On the girls side, there was a little more diversity as McLouth's Anna Moore earned a regional title in the 100m hurdles, while Valley Falls Dragon Tamara Drinkard claimed first in the high jump. Washington County got a pair of regional titles on the girls side as well, though, with Erin Alexander winning the shot put and the discus.

Finally, in Class 1A action at Valley Heights, the host Mustangs and several other TVL schools ruled the roost as the Heights' girls claimed the regional title with Centralia and Linn tying as runners-up. Meanwhile, the Mustang boys finished second behind regional champion Hanover and Frankfort took third for the clean sweep of the team hardware for the TVL.

In girls competition, a number of individual champions emerged including Centralia's Sadie Jones (3200m run), Linn's Kendra Bargman (100m dash and 200m dash) and Brooke Diederich (long jump), Axtell's Kiersten Talbot (1600m run) and Mariah Deters (high jump), Clifton-Clyde's Elizabeth Nobert (300m hurdles) and Kortnee Hubert (javelin), Hanover's Claire Zarybnicky (800m run), Valley Height's Shelby Vermetten (shot put

and discus) and a pair of relay teams from Hanover (4x800m relay) and Linn (4x100m relay).

Multiple-event champions highlighted the boys competition, starting with the Mustangs' own Elijah Smith claiming titles in both hurdle races, as well as the long jump and triple jump.

Other regional champions in the boys division from the TVL included Hanover's Evan Zabokrtsky (100m and 200m dash), Preston Juenemann (400m dash) and all three relay teams, while Centralia's Joey Ferron (shot put), Linn's Grant Cook (javelin) and Chad Gross (high jump) and Frankfort's Sheldon Parthemer (pole vault) all claimed first as well.

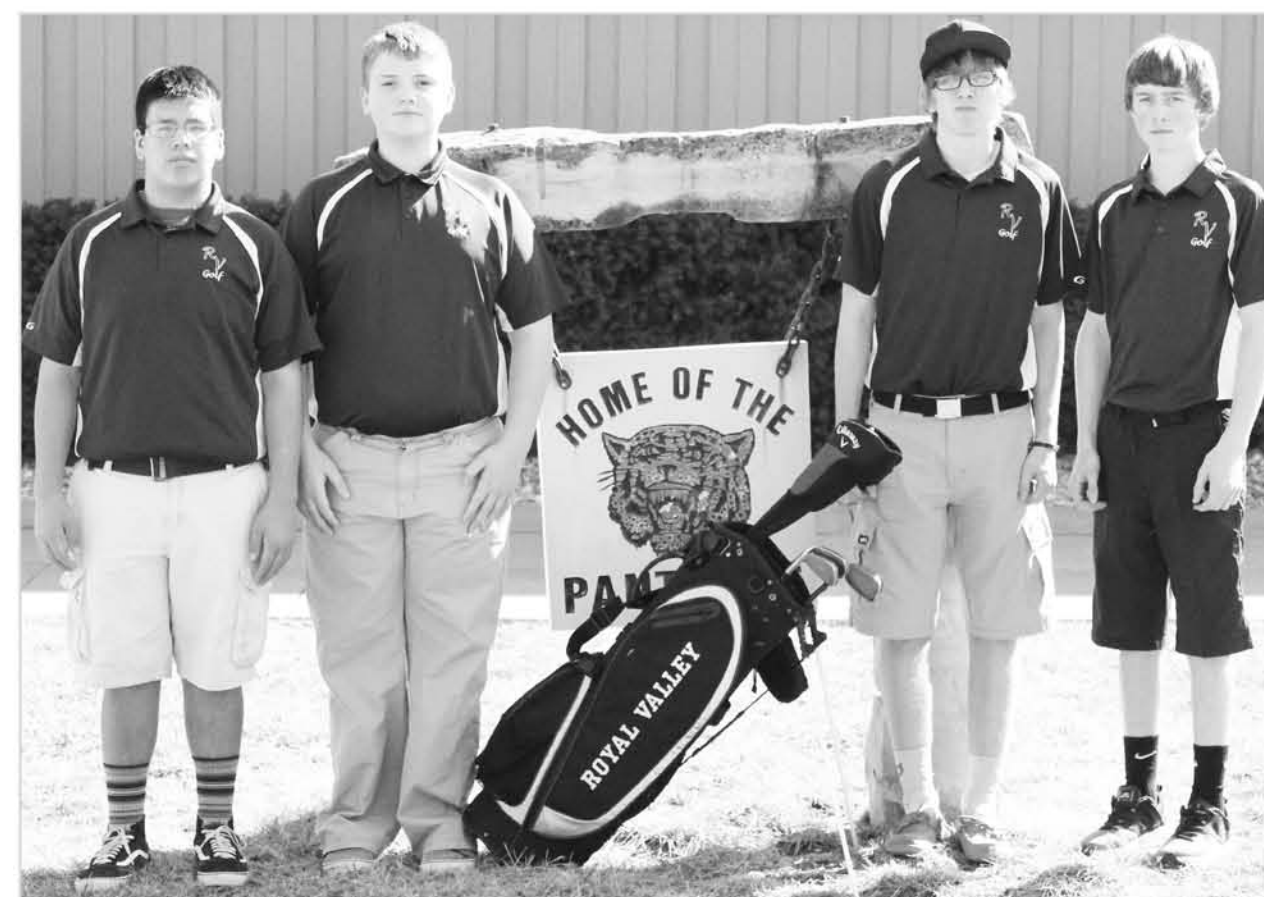

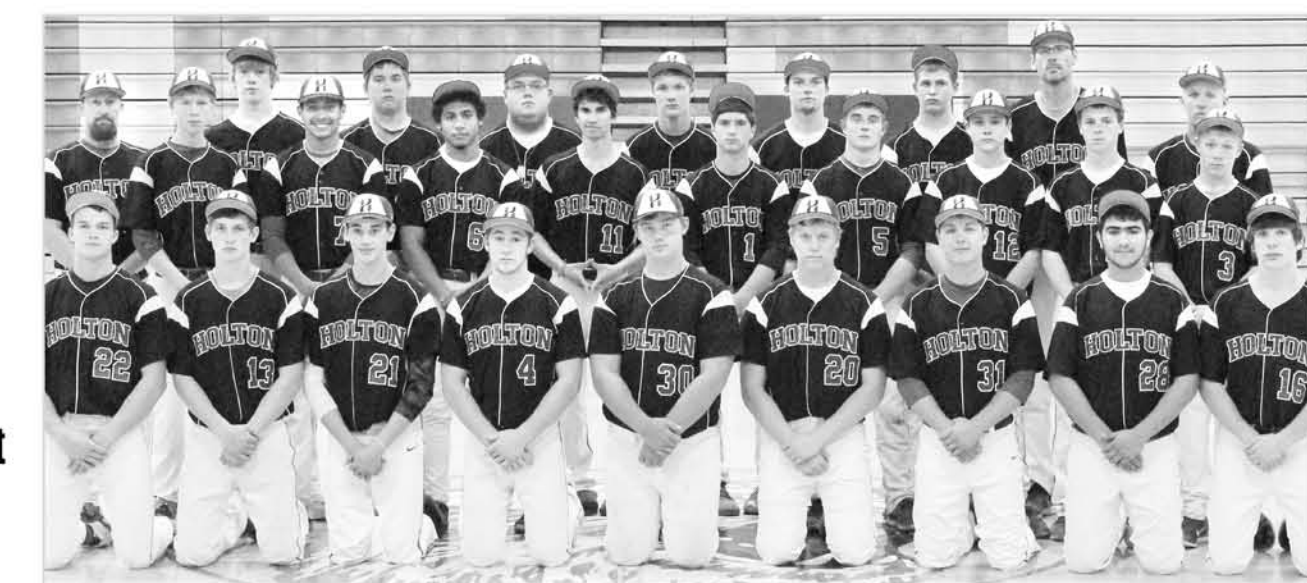

USDA: June 1 deadline reminder

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is reminding agricultural producers seeking federal crop insurance they must have their Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification form, commonly called Form AD-1026, on file with their local USDA service center by June 1, 2015.

Many farmers have their certification form on file meeting conservation compliance provisions since it is required for participation in other USDA programs, including NRCS conservation programs.

But producers, like specialty crop growers who receive federal crop insurance premium subsidies and do not participate in other USDA programs, must now file a certification form with USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), it was reported.

"Most producers already have a

certification form on file, but we want to ensure all producers interested in USDA benefits take the steps to be eligible," said Eric B. Banks, Kansas NRCS State Conservationist. "We want to make sure producers interested in crop insurance know of the upcoming June 1, 2015, deadline. We encourage you to contact your local USDA service center to ensure you are in compliance."

Producers are advised to visit their local USDA service center before the June 1 deadline to ask questions, get additional information, or learn more about conservation compliance procedures. Producers that file their form by the deadline will be eligible for federal crop insurance premium subsidies during the 2016 reinsurance year, which begins July 1, 2015. The June 1 deadline does not apply to producers seeking benefits from FSA and NRCS programs.

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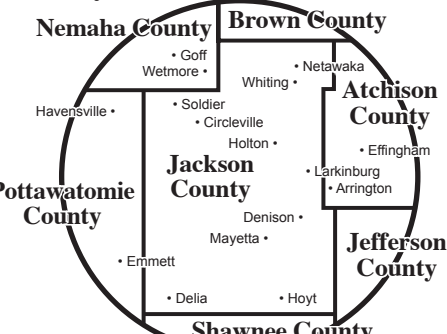

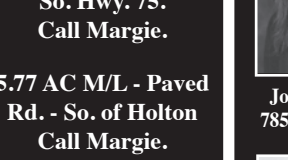

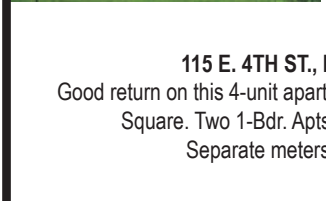

Its inductees have made significant contributions to the achievement, tradition or history of the 35th Division of the United States Army, the 35th Division Association and their community, state or nation. Criteria for induction include honorable service in the division or in a unit attached or assigned to the division, 20 years of retirement from the division, or three years after death.

Deghand was killed in action on Sept. 15, 2006, in Spira, Afghanistan, as a result of small arms fire while conducting combat operations as part of Operation Mountain Fury, part of Operation Enduring Freedom and an anti-Taliban operation. At the time of his death, Deghand, 42, was a sergeant first class; he was posthumously promoted to master sergeant.

A year after his death, the first of two notable dedications to Deghand was made prior to the Hall of Fame recognition. A fallen soldier memorial was placed on the Jackson County Courtyard at the southeast corner of Holton's Town Square in Deghand's honor, and it features a brick walk containing the names of Deghand and other Jackson Countians killed in the line of military duty.

In 2008, Deghand's name was attached to the creation of a new Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) post, Bernard Lee Deghand Memorial Post 12073, housed at Fort Leavenworth. Deghand had been a VFW member, and a majority of the post's members at the time of its creation were also members of the 35th Division, it was reported.

was turned for the building of the new church in early June 1912. Various families and community members assisted in purchasing the altar and articles necessary for the church, which was officially opened in 1915.

The altar for the church was imported from Italy. A pot-bellied stove provided heat for the church, and it was placed near the altar. A large bell and stained glass windows were brought from St. Joseph's Church in Hoyt when it closed in 1924 and remains at the church today.

As was common to all Catholic churches at the time, mass was in Latin, but at Our Lady of the Snows,

worship included Indian hymns and simple hymns sang in English.

The Jesuits left the area in 1965, and the church was closed for 20 years. The church and hall fell into disrepair with no assigned pastor for sacraments. The church reopened in 1986.

The original church hall was completed in 1952 and dedicated by Bishop Edward J. Hunkler. When the hall was reopened in 1987, it was dedicated to Sister Therese Klepac, who served the church from the time it reopened to the day she died in 1994.

The hall was renovated in 2001 with the assistance of tribal

funding. Funeral dinners are also prepared and served in the hall by parishioners.

Our Lady of the Snows and its congregation are a vital part of the spiritual life of the Potawatomi community. Parish life includes Catholic catechism classes, baptisms, first Holy Communion and confirmation.

In 2000, Our Lady of the Snows was selected as a pilgrimage site for the Jubilee Year. Archbishop James Patrick Keleher was presider at mass and a crowd estimated at 300 attended this special celebration and feast provided by the parish and the Potawatomi Tribe on Nov. 19, 2000.

Honor flag escorted by law enforcement through county

A United States Honor Flag was escorted through Holton Tuesday evening by Kansas State Troopers and Jackson County Sheriff Office deputies, it was reported.

The Honor Flag named "Harwood One" was en route from the funeral of Omaha Police Officer Kerrie Orozco, who was killed last Wednesday while attempting to serve an arrest warrant.

The flag passed through Holton at 6:20 p.m. yesterday.

The honor flag was being escorted from Omaha to Lawrence where it will leave this evening to Colorado for the funeral of Colorado State Patrol Cadet Taylor Thyfault, 21.

The Honor Flag is named after Topeka Police Officer Jason Harwood, who was killed in the line of duty on September 7, 2014 in Topeka.

Harwood's twin brother, Kansas State Trooper Jeremy Harwood, led the honor flag through Jackson County.

Holton's water is safe to drink

Holton water customers were recently notified that in spite of a recent violation of a drinking water contamination standard, there is no cause for alarm.

On May 13, city officials issued a statement saying that results for a public water standard collected during the first quarter of 2015 showed that the water system exceeded the standard for the maximum contaminant level for total trihalomethanes, or TTHM. While the standard for TTHM is 80 parts per billion (ppb), the average level of TTHM measured in the city's water over the past year is 89.5 ppb, it was reported.

That amount, it was noted, does not pose an immediate risk, nor is there a need to resort to using bottled water, although it was reported that consumption of water containing more TTHM than the maximum contaminant level over a period of several years may have an increased cancer risk. Anyone with specific health concerns related to TTHM is

advised to consult their doctor.

The violation reportedly occurred during a free chlorine burnout, which is part of routine maintenance of the city's water system, it was reported. The city has finished the burnout, and on March 1, the water system went back to using combine chlorine, which reportedly minimizes the formation of trihalomethanes.

Trihalomethanes are formed as a by-product predominantly when chlorine is used to disinfect water for drinking. They represent one group of chemicals generally referred to as disinfection by-products, resulting from the reaction of chlorine or bromine with organic matter present in the water being treated.

Trihalomethanes produced in the treatment process have been associated through epidemiological studies with some adverse health effects. Many governments set limits on the amount permissible in drinking water. However, trihalomethanes are only one group of many hundreds of possible disinfection by-products — the vast majority of which are not

monitored — and it has not yet been clearly demonstrated which of these are the most plausible candidate for causation of these health effects.

In the United States, the EPA limits the total concentration of the four chief constituents (chloroform, bromoform, bromodichloromethane and dibromochloromethane), referred to as total trihalomethanes (TTHM), to 80 parts per billion in treated water.

City officials are anticipating that the problem has been resolved, although the possibility exists that the next quarter's average may also be slightly out of compliance due to the use of free chlorine in the burnout period. Compliance is based on an annual running average, it was reported.

The city's most current water test results for TTHM, noted on April 14, were taken from two samples, measuring 32 ppb and 35 ppb, respectively. Anyone with further questions on the matter is encouraged to contact Holton City Manager Bret Bauer at 364-2721.

Rate hike forces county to switch health plans

A proposed 58 percent hike in the health insurance rates for county employees has forced the Jackson County Commissioners to switch health care plans within Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas.

The commissioners were recently notified by BCBS that the county's insurance rates for the coming year, which begins in July, were set to increase by 58 percent. The sharp increase is due to Affordable Care Act stipulations and the experience rating of county employees, it was reported.

The commissioners met with Stacy Elersic from BCBS recently to discuss insurance options for the county's renewal process. Elersic provided the commissioners with rates for the state employee health plan's non-state employers program.

For the past three years, the county has been its own health group with BCBS. Now that the rate for that group is set to increase, the commissioners have decided to enter into a different BCBS plan. The commissioners signed a three-year contract to join the health plan for "non-state employers."

By switching to the new BCBS plan, employees will continue to receive benefits covering medical, dental, prescription drugs and an optional vision plan. It was also reported that the deductible paid by county employees will actually be a little less by switching groups.

In other business, according to the minutes from a special meeting on Friday, May 15, the commission:

* Received a signed thank you note for funds used for Holton High School's after-prom.

* Met with Janelle Welliever from the appraiser's office to discuss vacating a road near 214th and U Roads. The commissioners asked her to contact the landowner to the north.

* Met with John Kennedy, Banner Creek Reservoir manager, to discuss putting either a trail or a sidewalk to the reservoir from Holton.

* Met in executive session for 10 minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

* Met in executive session for 40 minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

* Received and approved a request from the Whiting Ball Association for \$2,500 for utilities, equipment and upkeep of the facilities.

* Adjourned the meeting at 2 p.m.
