## County's assessed valuation up

The valued assessed on all real estate and personal property in Jackson County increased by \$4.269 million this past year, according to the estimated valuations that were recently certified for Jackson County.

In addition, each school district in the county and each city, except Mayetta, reported an increase in its assessed valuation this past year.

The new assessed value of all real estate (\$91,780,331), personal property (\$1,968,859), state assessed utilities (\$14,494,796) and oil and gas (\$31,891) in the county has been set at \$108,275,877, which is up from last year's \$104,006,032.

The change is a 4.1 percent increase.

The county's assessed valuation was set at \$99,241,720 in 2014 and \$96,938,995 in 2013.

Real estate property values jumped \$3,849,561 from 2015 to 2016, which is a 4.19 percent increase.

Jackson County Appraiser Jason Claycamp said values on cropland went up 17 percent this past year and that grassland went up 7 percent. Those values are set by the state.

"We've had some new construction, like the new Casey's, which has been on the tax roll for a full year now," Claycamp said. "There were also several new houses in the county that were built last year."

An increase in assessed valuation is always helpful when the county commissioners begin preparing the county's annual budget and determining the mill levy.

The total assessed valuation of each county multiplied by the mill levy determines local funding. When the county experiences an increase in assessed valuation, it automatically generates more tax funds using the same mill levy as the previous year.

If the assessed valuation decreases, it takes more funds to generate the same budget as last year.

The assessed valuations of Jackson Heights (USD 335), Holton (USD 336) and Royal Valley (USD 337) all increased at least \$1 million from 2015 to 2016, it was reported.

The valuation for USD 335 increased from \$18,309,145 to \$19,373,441 (a \$1,064,296 increase) among Jackson County

values. The district also receives some values from Nemaha, Brown and Atchison counties, it was reported.

USD 336's valuation increased from \$43,406,971 to \$44,676,218 (a \$1,269,247 increase) in Jackson County. The district also receives some assessed value from Jefferson County.

The assessed valuation for USD 337 changed from \$30,131,036 to \$31,265,374 (a \$1,134,338 increase) this past year.

While it was just a slight change, the assessed valuation for the city of Holton increased \$166,751, from \$19,601,196 in 2015 to \$19,767,947 in 2016.

The Jackson County towns of Circleville, Delia, Denison, Hoyt, Netawaka, Soldier and Whiting all received increases in their assessed valuations this past year. The valuations included:

- \* \$590,086 for Circleville, up from 577,453.
- \* \$514,850 for Delia, up from \$499,848.
- \* \$540,716 for Denison, up from \$512,840.

## Wheat, hay harvest in full swing

The winter wheat harvest in Jackson County has just gotten under way in recent days, and so far, it's looking like this year's crop will be better than last year's crop, according to local agriculture experts.

On the other hand, this year's brome hay harvest has been spotty so far, with results depending on when brome seed was planted and fertilized, according to Meadowlark District Extension agent David Hallauer.

And then, there's that all-important factor of moisture. Last year, the county was inundated by spring rains, but this year, not so much — and that's been playing into early wheat and brome harvest results, as well as farmers' concerns about fall crops.

For now, the few Jackson County wheat crops that have been brought to market bode well for this year. Dennis Holliday, agronomy manager at the Jackson Farmers co-op in Holton, said the first few loads of wheat came to the local elevator this past weekend and

are looking good for early-cut wheat.

"Test weights so far have been in the 56-58 pounds per bushel range, as far as what's come in," Holliday said. "Good wheat is generally in the 60-plus range. We may still get there this year."

Hallauer agreed that this year's wheat crop is likely to be better than last year, when a high percentage of wheat was affected by disease — primarily wheat scab (fusarium head blight) and stripe rust.

"There's been some concern about stripe rust, and I think some of the areas that were susceptible to stripe rust or had some heavy infection last year might have been affected," Hallauer said. "But at this point, the stripe rust is going to manifest itself in grain yield. So those fields that were susceptible are going to be average to maybe a little bit below, and those that were not susceptible or that had a fungicide applied are going to be above average."

Indeed, the wheat scab and stripe rust infections last year

resulted in wheat crops that were in such poor shape that "there was a lot of wheat that couldn't be dumped here," Holliday said.

Concerning the brome harvest, which is under way in Jackson County, the results have been "very mixed," Hallauer noted.

"I've had a handful of people who said they were right on par with a pretty decent crop, and I've had a few others say they're looking at 60 to 75 percent of normal," he said.

The timing of fertilizer application may have had something to do with the inconsistency of this year's brome crop, Hallauer noted, but added the real culprit was the lack of moisture.

"We went through a time period in the early stages of growth, back in March and April, where we just didn't have very much moisture. So I would say it's probably better in those areas that had a little bit of moisture and were able to get a little bit of fertilizer worked in."

## Wholesale cost of electricity down

The amount of electricity used by Holton municipal utility customers hasn't changed much in the past decade, but the wholesale cost of that electricity has gone down by about 14 percent, the Holton City Commission learned on Monday.

The reasons for electricity costs coming down in recent years, according to Holton Electrical Production Superintendent Ira Harrison, involve an energy market

with several options available to municipalities, as well as the city's decision to change its energy supplier from the Kansas Power Pool to the Kansas Municipal Energy Agency's EMP3 power pool.

Harrison also noted that his department is continuing to look at demand-side options for municipal energy, such as wind power, as well as efforts to educate municipal power customers on conserving energy use.

Those details were part of an integrated resource plan created as a requirement of receiving electric power allocations from the Western Area Power Authority (WAPA), which has been providing the city with electric power since June of 2010, Acting City Manager Kerwin McKee said. The city is also required by WAPA to update this plan every five years, McKee added.

## Funds sought for concession stand project

Last year, when the new asphalt track was being installed around Jackson Heights High School's football field, Larry Amon wondered why the concession stand at the football field couldn't be updated as well.

Amon took the idea of mounting a volunteer effort to raise funds to fix the concession stand, which is located underneath the football field bleachers and has no running

water, to Jackson Heights Superintendent and Elementary Principal Adrienne Walsh.

"I talked to Adrienne at the eighth-grade graduation this past spring, and she told me we ought to go for that now," Amon said. "And then she told me we ought to take a look at the press box."

The press box, at the top of the football bleachers, was "dilapidated and rotted out," Amon said.

"I couldn't believe that thing

was in such bad shape," he added.

Furthermore, since the concession stand didn't have plumbing facilities, he wondered why the concession stand couldn't be moved to the former high school weight room, located north of the exterior restrooms, with a window built in for selling popcorn, soda and candy at football games.

## Volunteers needed to organize annual Relay For Life here

Volunteers are desperately needed to organize this summer's Jackson County Relay For Life, according to Melissa Easterberg, community manager of development for the American Cancer Society Relay For Life.

"At the moment, we don't have a volunteer base to really put forth a relay," Easterberg said. "We're in dire need of a group of volunteers that will help us plan the event."

Easterberg said there are two volunteers — Carol Buehler and Janice Schweigen — who are in the process of organizing the survivor's dinner that is held annually to honor cancer survivors, their families and caregivers.

"However, there aren't any volunteers working on the relay half of the event," she said.

The annual relay, which has been held in the county for more than 20 years, has tentatively been set for Saturday, Aug. 6, at the Jackson Heights High School track but that may change, she said.

"It's still currently on the



books for that date, but if we get a group of people in place and they start moving forward with the relay, we can look into moving it into September or October if we need more time," she said. "I don't want anybody to feel rushed or that they didn't have the opportunity to do 100 percent of a job."

If the Relay For Life continues as planned for Aug. 6, it will be run on a "condensed schedule," Easterberg said, noting the event would be held from just 6 p.m.

to 10 p.m.

"We've talked about doing the survivor's dinner and recognition piece and then going out to the track to do an opening ceremony that would recognize the teams and sponsors. We'd then do a couple of games and activities until dusk when we would do our luminaria ceremony and then be done," she said. "It wouldn't be an all-night walk anymore."

The Relay For Life is set up with a committee structure, Easterberg said, with volunteers assigned to different aspects of the event, including sponsorships, luminaries, recruiting, logistics and accounting.

"All of these different pieces of the event are separated out to different people depending on their skill set and what they are interested in," she said.

Sun not best option for brewing tea at home

Think twice before you brew sun tea.

Using the sun as a method to brewing tea is highly discouraged. The sun tea will not get hotter than 130 degrees F, which is not hot enough to



kill bacteria in the water or tea leaves.

In this method, tea is brewed by placing water in a clear container in the sun for a few hours. Sun tea is the perfect medium for bacteria to grow. If sun tea gets a thick or syrupy appearance, it may be due to the presence of a bacteria called *Alcaligenes viscolactis*.

Standard brewing processes for hot tea are hot enough to ensure that any undesirable microbes are killed, eliminating this risk. In addition to the insufficient heat, sun tea may sit

around at room temperature for a long period of time, giving the bacteria a chance to multiply and become a problem.

The Centers for Disease Control and the National Tea Association recommend the following when making tea:

- Brew tea bags at 195 degrees F for three to five minutes.
- Brew only enough tea that can be consumed within a few hours.
- Wash, rinse and sanitize tea-making equipment regularly.

Prepare cold brew tea in the refrigerator by putting tea in cold

water and leaving for a length of time depending on how strong you like your tea. Or, select tea labeled "Cold Brew," which is especially blended for ice tea.

## KDOT updates state maps for designated bike routes

Bicyclists interested in seeing designated bike routes in 19 cities in Kansas, traffic volumes along state routes or which county routes in Kansas are paved will make good use of the new 2016-17 Kansas bicycle map, designed to help bicycle riders plan their trips.

"This map provides so much information that is specifically geared toward bicyclists," said Matt Messina, bicycle and pedestrian coordinator for the Kansas Department of Transportation. "Its contents include bicycling statutes, safety tips,

suggested routes, future projects and more all in one publication. It is a great resource for all bicyclists from beginners to extreme enthusiasts."

The highways available for bicycles are color-coded by traffic volume. No traffic volumes are shown on the map on interstate routes, as bicycling on interstates in Kansas is against the law.

New features to this year's map include the Land and Sky Scenic Byway in the western part of the state and the inclusion of 487 miles of U.S. Bicycle Route 76 (USBR 76), which was designated in Kansas last fall. Pittsburg's city inset was also added to the back of the map.

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## Four die in accident

A Sunday afternoon two-vehicle head-on collision west of Perry in neighboring Jefferson County resulted in the deaths of three members of a Basehor family and an Oskaloosa man, according to the Kansas Highway Patrol.

The fatality accident occurred at about 3:20 p.m. on U.S. Highway 24 about a mile west of Perry, where a 1995 Ford Ranger pickup driven west on U.S. 24 by Ronald D. Heston, 56, of Oskaloosa, left the highway on its north shoulder and overcorrected.

Heston's pickup then reportedly went back across the roadway and into the eastbound lane, striking an eastbound 2001 Ford Windstar minivan driven by Travis D. Askew, 35, of Basehor, head-on.

Both drivers were killed, as were two other passengers in the minivan — Ashley A. Askew, 27, and the Askews' six-month-old daughter, Haley A. Askew, both of Basehor. Two other children in the minivan — five-year-old Linda J. Askew and three-year-old Lilly Askew, both of Basehor — were injured and taken to Stormont-Vail Regional Medical Center for treatment of injuries.

KHP reported that with the exceptions of Heston and Ashley Askew, all involved in the accident were wearing proper safety restraints at the time of the accident. Also assisting at the scene were the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, the Perry Police Department and the Perry Fire Department, it was reported.

## Watch out for slower farm traffic during spring, summer harvest

Harvest season is under way, and the Kansas Highway Patrol would like to remind motorists to use more caution and patience when traveling around farm trucks, tractors, combines and other implements.

"As harvest is under way, each traveler in Kansas needs to be more aware of increased farm implement and truck traffic. In Kansas we have many trucks exiting and entering the roadways at any given time. Traveling around these vehicles requires extra caution," said Lt. Adam Winters, KHP Public Information Officer.

Most farm equipment is not designed to travel at highway speeds, and may only travel 15 to 25 miles per hour, it was reported. Farm equipment is often wider than other vehicles, and is sometimes wider than the lane of traffic, so extra room should be allowed when traveling near an implement on the road.

Extra caution should be practiced on all roads, but especially on busy rural roads with unmarked intersections.

Preliminary numbers indicate that statewide in 2015, there were 106 crashes involving farm equipment. In those 106 crashes, no one was killed, but there were 40 people injured. Already this year, preliminary statistics indicate there have been 22 crashes, with four people injured.

It is important to share the road safely, for the sake of the farmers and for the motoring public. Tips to keep in mind when sharing Kansas roads with farmers:

- *Don't assume the farmer*

*knows you're there.* Most operators of farm equipment regularly check for vehicles behind them, however, most of their time must be spent looking ahead to stay on the road and watch for oncoming traffic. Implements are very loud, hindering the farmer's ability to hear your vehicle.

- *Pass with extreme caution.* Don't pass unless you can see clearly ahead of both your vehicle and the farm equipment you are passing. If there are curves or hills blocking your view of oncoming traffic, wait until you can clearly visualize the area you're passing in.

You should not pass in a designated "No Passing Zone," even if you are stuck behind a farm vehicle. Do not pass if you are within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevated structure or tunnel.

- *When a farm vehicle pulls to the right side of the road, it does not mean it is turning right or allowing you to pass.* Due to the size of some farm equipment, the farmer must execute wide

left turns, so allow it plenty of room and time to turn, and be alert to see if there might be a driveway or field they may be turning into.

- *Be patient.* Don't assume that a farmer can move aside to let you pass. Shoulders may be soft, wet or steep, which can cause the farm vehicle to tip, or the shoulder may not support the weight of a heavy farm vehicle. The farmer understands you are being delayed and will move over at the first safe location available.

- *Think of the slow moving vehicle emblem as a warning to adjust your speed.* When you see the slow moving vehicle emblem, you should immediately slow down. While the emblems are visible from a long distance away, it is often difficult to judge the speed at which you are closing in on a vehicle, especially at night.

- *Pay attention.* When you are not focused solely on the road, you increase your chances of a collision, especially if you should come upon a slow moving farm vehicle.



# New school will be a source of pride for generations

The construction of the new Holton Elementary School for grades pre-kindergarten through fifth grade has entered its final stretch.

The construction work is on schedule, school officials say, and everything should be ready to go on the first day of classes. An open house at the new school is tentatively planned for 2 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 18.

After a tour of the new school with other Holton Rotary Club members last Wednesday, I don't think it's an overstatement to say that the new elementary school will immediately become one of the community's crown jewels.

The new elementary school brings Holton's public education system into the 21st century and immediately places the school system at the top tier of any in northeast Kansas.

The benefits associated with the new school will be realized throughout the entire community as well, as it will attract more new families, possibly more new businesses and possibly more new industries.

Often, local schools are the first thing that people want to tour when considering a move to a new town.

The new elementary school in Holton will have about 38 classrooms and will serve about

650 children all under one roof. The new school has so many extraordinary features that it is difficult to name them all.

Here's a few:

\*The school bus pick up and drop off location on the west side of the new school is designed to accommodate a lot of buses and a lot of kids. Bus

\*Across the street to the west, north of the old fair building, there will be another school parking lot. Teachers who have classrooms on that side of the school will park there and enter the lower front entrance – the same entrance for the bus kids.

For the most part, student lockers in the new elementary

one or two-on-two.

Each grade level area also includes special reading rooms and special education rooms that will be used for extra, more-individualized student instruction and as testing locations.

Local history will be an important theme in the new school. There will be a Jim Lane Cabin – a pioneer style cabin – built in the school to be used for educational purposes.

In the pre-school area, there will be a sensory room to help kids with hand-eye coordination. That room will also include a modern day covered wagon.

The new school will have a nice, spacious library with a pull-up portable wall so large groups can spill out into a hallway area, if necessary.

The new school will have wobbly chairs for some students who need that type of school chair to maintain their focus on school work. There will also be some standing desks for some students to use so they can stand up while doing school work.

The new school will have a large media room with a tall ceiling for a large video screen and a second-floor student viewing area for large assemblies.

Other features of the new school include a nice sized gymnasium and a stage area that opens from both the gym side and from the cafeteria side.

The new school has an elevator for those who have difficulty navigating stairs and a nice kitchen area.

The front entrance of the new school will have all the latest technology regarding safety and security. Office personnel will have a clear window view of everyone entering the school. The main entryway also has built-in glass showcase areas for rotating displays regarding local history.

The decision by Holton school patrons to build a new elementary school could not have come at a better time. State aid to build the new school in Holton will cover 58 percent of the costs.

The year after Holton approved its school bond issue, the State Legislature decreased that state aid percentage for new schools by 22 percent, making the new state aid match 36 percent.

Who knows if state aid to help local Kansas communities build new schools will even exist in future years.

The teacher and school patron committee that helped design the new school did a terrific job. The new school will be a source of pride in the district for many generations to come.

## Watch how your state safeguards your voting rights

# Politicians design voting laws that favor them

The elections process is not usually grist for inflammatory rhetoric. But this year has been different.

Republican Donald Trump labeled the GOP primary process "crooked."



Democrat Bernie Sanders suggested his party's use of super-delegates made its nominating process a "rigged system."

For many voters, the intricacies of voting rules quickly became a topic of overriding interest.

Now that the primaries are over, I hope Americans remain just as intrigued by the laws governing general-election voting in their states.

Because at the moment, this country is engaged in an experiment with the democratic process that should rivet everyone who cares about representative government.

We've seen two diverging trends in the states in recent years. One approach has sought to make voting more difficult. Since the 2010 elections, 22 states have put laws in place narrowing voters' ability to go

to the polls.

They have decreased the time allotted for voting; added tough ID requirements; reduced options for voting prior to Election Day; added proof-of-citizenship requirements; and made it necessary for voters to register well before election day. These steps, their backers contend, are necessary to guard against voter fraud and assure the integrity of the ballot.

Other states have moved in the opposite direction. They've made it easier to register to vote; have added longer hours for voting on election day; have moved to mail-in ballots; and encourage early voting. They've done all they can to make the process of voting simple and convenient.

On the whole, Republicans at the state level have favored greater restrictiveness and Democrats greater ease, but you don't have to be a partisan of one side or the other to recognize that politicians believe a great deal is at stake.

Whatever they give as their reasons for pushing a particular approach, you can be sure they are also calculating the effect of rules changes on the outcome of elections, and they'll do all they can to tilt the rules in their favor.

Which is why the question of how to approach the right to vote isn't going to be settled

any time soon. There are a lot of court cases pending in the various states, and it's likely there will be conflicting judicial opinions.

If we're going to debate the electoral process as a nation, let's keep in mind the core issue: it should be easy to vote – and hard to cheat.

Casting your ballot is a fundamental constitutional right, and ensuring that every eligible voter can do so is basic to our system.

Every American should be able to exercise his or her right to vote without feeling cowed – which is why I worry that efforts to limit voting will have a pernicious effect on our system of representative government.

The evidence on this is mixed. A recent paper by political scientists at UC San Diego analyzing turnout between 2008 and 2012 in states with strict voter ID laws found that they depressed voting overall – more among Democratic constituencies, but among Republicans, too.

Yet recent research also suggests that the opposite is not true: easing voting rules in states that never tightened them does not necessarily boost turnout.

One certainty in all this is that a lot of people who are eligible to vote for various reasons do not choose to do so.

Of the 219 million Americans eligible to vote in 2014,

the Census Bureau reported last year, roughly 41 million were not registered; and turnout in actual elections is even lower. Voting behavior may be more related to motivation than it is to statutory activity.

A more pressing certainty is that our entire voting system needs attention. All too many jurisdictions try to run elections on the cheap, with machinery and processes that are inadequate to the task.

Even now, 16 years after the 2000 presidential election revealed deep flaws in the patchwork of ways we record and tally votes, the system remains rickety.

"The vigor of American democracy rests on the vote of each citizen," a national commission on voting once wrote. Keep that in mind this election year – and pay attention to how your state approaches its obligation to safeguard that vigor.

## Kansas fuel prices 13th lowest in U.S.

The Kansas average gasoline price dropped by 2 cents on the week ending June 20, making the state's average price the 13th-lowest in the nation, according to AAA.

Most of the monitored areas have seen a slight to moderate decrease in price this past week. Still comparable to averages in 2005, motorists are enjoying the lowest prices in 11 years.

Nationally, gas prices have fallen for nine consecutive days, reaching Monday's average of \$2.33 per gallon.

Averages are down 46 cents per gallon versus this same date last year, attributed to year-over-year surpluses, and these savings are likely to continue as supply appears more than capable of keeping pace with growing demand.

## IRS phone scam noted in Holton

The Holton Police Department is reminding people to be alert for Internal Revenue Service call scams after a Holton woman received a telephone call this week and was told by someone pretending to be an IRS agent that she would be sued for back taxes.

After receiving the call, which appeared to originate in the area of Eugene, Ore. (a 541 area code), the woman contacted *The Holton Recorder* with information about the call. The information was passed on to the police department, where Officer Steve Frederick said the call was clearly a scam.

“This is a pretty common scam,” Frederick said. “The IRS will never call anyone to say that they owe back taxes.”

The IRS confirmed Frederick’s comments, stating that the agency has seen a surge of these phone scams as scam artists threaten police arrest, deportation, license revocation and other things.

“Taxpayers across the nation face a deluge of these aggressive phone scams. Don’t be fooled by callers pretending to be from the IRS in an attempt to steal your money,” IRS Commissioner John Koskinen said. “We continue to say if you are surprised to be hearing from us, then you’re not hearing from us.”

Frederick said the origin of the call may also be questionable, as some scammers will also use what is known as “caller ID spoofing,” in which scammers can cause the telephone network to indicate to the receiver of a call a false number on their caller ID display.

The IRS will never call to demand immediate payment or call about taxes owed without first having mailed a bill; demand payment of taxes without giving the opportunity to question or appeal the amount claimed owed; require use of a specific payment method for taxes, such as a prepaid debit card; ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone; or threaten to involve law enforcement to have people arrested for not paying.

Anyone who receives a suspected scam call is advised to hang up immediately and report it to the IRS or to local law enforcement. Calls may be reported to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration, either online at IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting or by phone at (800) 366-4484.

If I had put in the trellises last year and kept the canes from flopping and rooting at the ends, most of the crawling and squatting wouldn’t be necessary.

However, things and stuff made me feel as if I didn’t have time to put in the trellises, so now I pay. Next year the trellises will be up and the berry harvest will be easier.

The blackberries have just begun their prime season while the blueberries slow down. Even a few red raspberries have shown up and maybe we’ll have a bit of a fall crop on all the pretty new canes.

The strawberries never materialized. After the first small harvest, they just quit. Perhaps the dry weather in March and April, or some late cold, shriveled up the flower buds. With some TLC for the rest of the summer and fall, I hope they rebound.

As the berries fade, I will keep an eye on the few peaches hanging from the tree and the abundant plums. Yes, the garden landscape changes, including the weedscape.

The front of one of my garden areas looks neat and tidy, as I’ve focused on this highly visible area. But go a little deeper and weeds carpet paths and compete

with vegetables. One weed I let grow because the foliage was pretty and I wanted it to flower so I could identify it.

The plant turned out to be claspng coneflower, a Kansas native, but one that grows south of us. It might have been in the bee-attracting seed mix I planted a couple of years ago, although I don’t recall seeing it. However, so many other plants were in that mix that I probably just didn’t notice it.

Like the black raspberry trellises, weeding the garden often gets set aside as other things, such as planting and harvesting, and music festivals, take precedence. At this point, clearing out the weeds can seem overwhelming, but I’ve decided not to lose sleep over it.

“One square foot at a time,” I noted in my last column. Focus on one square foot at a time. Each week I’ve managed to clear weeds from at least one small area, and pull those threatening to overwhelm seedlings. As I walk to the compost heap with yet another bucket of kitchen scraps, I sometimes pull a tall weed here and there.

Taking it one square foot at a time means I find joy in the garden rather than stress. Besides, the lamb’s quarters and purslane are free food. Why rush to weed them out?

Taken with another perspective, these weeds, some of them, anyway, might provide another benefit.

I recently attended a presentation on how microorganisms in the soil affect native prairie restoration, coming away with at least one lesson that can be applied to growing food and flowers.

That lesson? Diversity is a good thing.

Researchers have discovered that the most robust and resilient prairie ecosystem is a diverse one with many species growing all mixed up. I’ve known that, of course, but what I learned was a little bit of “why.”

Many plant pathogens (dis-

ease-causing microorganisms) are species specific, or at least family specific, only affecting one species or one family of plants. Researchers have found that in the zone where roots of different species mingle, far fewer pathogens exist than where only one species grows. That means that each plant thrives more because it does not have to put up as much of a fight against pathogens.

This can work in the garden, as well. Instead of planting rows of just tomatoes, put in a few tomatoes, then a patch of basil, a few tomatoes and a patch of basil. Or at least put a row of basil close to the row of tomatoes. Or do any other combination that works.

This spring I planted carrots and spinach on either side of my peas. In the flower garden intermingle various flowering and foliage plants instead of planting beds to just one flower. Crop rotation, changing what family of plants grows in an area each year, also helps in reducing pathogens, but is not as effective as intermingling species.

And now I come to the weeds. Even though I didn’t intend for them to grow in the vegetable garden they can serve the same purpose. Where the roots of weeds and my vegetables mingle in the soil, I presume the pathogen load will be less, thus reducing the stress on my vegetable plants.

Of course, too many weeds will thief nutrients and moisture from the vegetables. And fast-growing weeds can smother smaller or slower-growing herbs and vegetables. So there is a limit.

But I have a new perspective; to some extent weeds help reduce disease in my vegetable plants. I hope. Besides, the lambs quarters and purslane are delicious and nutritious, and the claspng coneflower is quite lovely; opportunities that would be lost with persistent weeding. Why worry?

# Partnership between county and Developmental Services considered

The Jackson County Commissioners are interested in having the county partner with Developmental Services of Jackson County, Inc. to provide jobs at the county's recycling center for some of DSJC's clients.

At a recent county commission meeting, Laura Golden and Beth Nelson from DSJC discussed the possibility of the non-profit entering into a contract with the county for employment services for its clients.

DSJC provides day and residential support to area adults affected by intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Nelson said that there are several clients who would be capable of retrieving recyclable materials from a resident's vehicle and sorting the materials into the appropriate piles and bins.

If a contract was signed, it would be a simple contract for services. The county would pay DSJC directly and would not be responsible for providing any benefits to the individuals working under the contract.

The commissioners said they were in favor of a contract and would be looking at next year's budget to see what kind of agreement could be made.

In other business, according to the approved minutes from June 13, the commission:

\* Heard a weekly report from Eric Fritz and Earl Bahret, road and bridge department co-supervisors, and Bryson Bain, shop foremen.

Fritz and Bahret requested that 2,000 pounds of rock be hauled to the Hoyt storage strip for future general road repairs and that 2,000 pounds be hauled to the new road and bridge shop.

\* Learned that crews are patching 254<sup>th</sup> Road from Q.4 to S Road instead of overhauling the road completely.

\* Learned from Commissioner Bill Elmer that he received many compliments on the condition of 246<sup>th</sup> Road during the Prairie Pickin' Party festival recently.

\* Met in executive session with Fritz and Bahret for 10 minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Met with Chad Phillips, custodian, to discuss the proposed renovations to the small courtroom by Judge Norbert Marek.

Phillips and the commissioners also discussed a 2007 Grasshop-

per mower in the custodial inventory.

The commissioner approved a motion to transfer the mower from the custodial department to road and bridge.

\* Met in executive session for five minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Met in executive session with Dan Robinson, noxious weed director and solid waste manager, for five minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Approved a request from Sherri Ladner, 911 coordinator and sheriff's office administrator, and Lisa Hyten, victim services coordinator, to use the first floor meeting room of the Jackson County Courthouse to hold law enforcement training about victims of domestic violence.

The women also request \$300 to provide food for the 30 people expected to attend the training. The commissioners agreed.

\* Heard a weekly report from John Kennedy, Banner Creek Reservoir director, who reported that revenues for the week of June 5 - 11 totaled \$6,415.

\* Discussed current swimming regulations at the reservoir. Current rules state that swimming is only allowed at the designated swim beach areas.

With the new docks in place, Kennedy said he has seen more people using the docks as a swim platform.

Kennedy recommended that all areas of the reservoir be opened for swimming.

The commissioners agreed to approve an amendment to open all of the reservoir for swimming. Swimmers and fishermen, however, still must not interfere with boats loading and unloading at the boat docks.

\* Learned that Kennedy received an \$1,800 quote for an eight-foot by eight-foot kiosk building for the north entrance to the reservoir.

The kiosk would include a service window with a small awning. Electrical service for lighting and air conditioning is included in the quote.

\* Met in executive session with Jackson County Appraiser Jason Claycamp for five minutes to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken back in open session.

\* Met with Cindy Cluck and Kristin Watkins from Northeast

Kansas Multi-County Health Department to discuss the department's budget.

\* Met with Moni Al-Aasar with BG Consultants and Terry Mick, county bridge and special project manager, to discuss state funding for bridge replacements. Through the program, the state pays 80 percent of the bridge cost, while the county pays the rest.

The men discussed the structurally compromised bridges in the county that would be good candidates for the county's application for the program.

\* Received a budget request of \$2,102 from the Northeast Kansas Area Agency on Aging.

\* Awarded a bid to Alpha Title of Topeka to provide certificates of title for the upcoming county tax sale. The business bid \$90 per tract.

The other bids submitted were \$145 per tract from Title Abstract Company of Holton and \$100 per tract from Kansas Secured Title of Topeka.

\* Met with David Elsbury, KANZA Mental Health and Guidance Center CEO, and Bob Wayman, KANZA board president.

Elsbury and Wayman discussed state budget cuts for KANZA and also asked if the commissioners had finalized the contract for the billing responsibility and fees for grant writing and renovating the former Moser building for KANZA's office.

The commissioners said they were waiting for Shawna Miller, county counselor, to review the contract before taking any action.

\* Approved a motion to donate \$25 to the Holton FFA Chapter for its National Conservation Foundation.

\* Met with David Mills from Kansas Audio Video to discuss color options for the sound-absorbing foam panels that will be installed on the walls of the first floor meeting room.

\* Signed payroll change notices for Travis Spiker (promotion at the jail), Sarah Sweet (new hire at the attorney's office) and Tyler Caudle (promoted to a full-time sergeant at the sheriff's office).

\* Signed a purchase order for two computers, two monitors, one server computer and other equipments for the attorney's office at a cost of \$3,820. The items were purchased from The Computer Doctors of Holton.

\* Adjourned the meeting at 4:30 p.m.

# Two arrested after pursuit in Jackson County on Monday

Two northeast Kansas men were taken into custody here Monday morning after a pursuit in Jackson County, according to Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse.

At about 11 a.m. that day, the Jackson County Sheriff's Office received a report of a possible impaired person driving a white 1998 Nissan with Oklahoma plates northbound on U.S. Highway 75 near 182<sup>nd</sup> Road.

A Holton police officer attempted to stop the vehicle in Holton and a pursuit ensued. The pursuit was later terminated due to a mechanical failure in the police vehicle, Morse said.

Jackson County Undersheriff Darrel Chapman located the

vehicle at 11:13 a.m. and once more entered into a pursuit.

Morse said he deployed stop sticks at the intersection of Kansas Highway 9 and R Road. The chase continued to 326<sup>th</sup> and R Roads when a passenger allegedly threw out a sack from the passenger side window.

Undersheriff Chapman then struck the Nissan with his patrol car, which incapacitated the suspected vehicle, it was reported.

Two occupants fled from the vehicle and ran south of 326<sup>th</sup> Road, Morse reported. A Taser was deployed, which led to the capture of the passenger.

The Kansas Highway Patrol helicopter, KHP Troopers, Kickapoo Tribal Police, Sac and Fox Tribal Police, Horton Po-

lice, Brown and Nemaha Counties all assisted with the search for the driver.

A KHP K-9 led police to the alleged driver, who was hiding in the field and taken into custody.

A sheriff's office K-9 later located the sack that was thrown from the suspected vehicle. The sack contained drug paraphernalia, Morse said.

Michael Francis Edwin Dorsch, 31, of Horton was identified as the driver of the vehicle. Stephen Duane Cadue, 24, of Horton, was the passenger.

Both Dorsch and Cadue have outstanding warrants and are being held in the Jackson County Jail. Charges are still pending, it was reported.

# Hays man arrested here on suspicion of burglary, auto theft

A Hays man was arrested here Monday on suspicion of burglary and auto theft on the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation, it was reported.

Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse reported that Trenton Voss, 27, was arrested by the sheriff's office after receiving a report of a suspicious person on 250<sup>th</sup> Road just west of M Road southeast of Circleville.

Morse said that Voss was found in a stolen blue Chevrolet pickup truck that was taken

from a residence earlier that morning on 162<sup>nd</sup> Road near Mayetta.

Voss is also a suspect in a burglary and theft to a shed located on 250<sup>th</sup> Road, it was reported.

Jackson County Sheriff's Office investigators also assisted the Potawatomi Tribal Police in processing a burglary scene at the Potawatomi Government Center where Voss is suspected of burglarizing that location earlier Monday morning.

Voss is also suspected of an

additional theft of a vehicle near 162<sup>nd</sup> and Q Road and is believed to have attempted to steal a number of other vehicles, Morse said.

A complete list of Voss' charges have not been released by the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

Harrison told commissioners that the resource plan has “changed a little bit” from the plan approved by commissioners five years ago, adding that the plan “gives you a real idea of what the city has done in the last five years and where we are today.” But the plan also serves as a set of suggestions from WAPA on how to run the city’s energy utilities more smoothly and effectively, he added.

“They’d like us to put some renewables to work,” Harrison said. “They’d like to see us be efficient in what we do, whether it’s street lighting or things that we’re doing around town and in different departments.”

It also serves to inform WAPA of energy use across different classifications, he said. The majority of electric power used by municipal energy customers in 2015 — 44.2 percent — was used by commercial customers, followed by residential customers with 38.56 percent and industrial customers at 17.24 percent.

Meter counts “haven’t really changed a whole lot from year to year,” Harrison told commissioners, noting that the city’s electricity use peaks are “down from what they used to be.” But with new businesses — mainly the new Walmart that is set to open soon — and the new Holton Elementary School coming on line, Harrison said, “our consumption’s going to be a little higher.”

Harrison also noted that his department would like to seek options for wind energy, since the city is looking at losing its contract with Kansas City Power and Light for 1.3 megawatts of supplemental power this December. He added that he would like to get a wind power source online sometime next year.

In other business at Monday’s meeting, the first to be held after City Manager Bret Bauer’s departure, commissioners voted to increase the monthly salaries of staff at Holton City Hall by \$250 per person per month until a new city manager is hired. In May, commissioners approved a monthly salary increase of \$2,500 for McKee while he is serving as acting city manager.

It was reported in May that during the two previous periods in recent years when McKee was promoted to acting city manager

— first in 2007 after Brad Mears’ departure, then in 2009 after Glenn Rodden’s departure — McKee had given part of his extra interim salary to personnel at City Hall to assist with extra work in the wake of the city manager’s departure.

On Monday, Commissioner Twila White noted McKee’s actions in sharing part of his temporary salary increase with city staff and told him that the city should give those personnel their own temporary increases “without you having to give part of your salary away to do that.” White suggested the \$250 monthly increase for personnel while the city continues to look for a new city manager.

Commissioner Tim Morris agreed with White’s suggestion, noting that the commission should have done that the last time a similar situation arose. Commissioners voted unanimously to grant the temporary monthly salary increases for Holton City Clerk Teresa Riley, administrative assistant Michelle Raaf and utility billing clerk Amber Baxter.

Riley later noted that as of Monday, the city had received four applications for the vacant city manager’s position. The deadline for applications is Thursday, June 30, it was noted.

Commissioners also:  
■ Approved minutes from the June 6 meeting and budget appropriations made since that meeting.

■ Noted the proclamation of Saturday, July 30, as Kansas All-Star Football Shrine Bowl Day, in honor of Holton High School student Mason Barta’s participation in the annual Shrine Bowl football game in Emporia. Barta’s father, HHS head football coach Brooks Barta, was present to witness the proclamation on his behalf.

■ Heard updates on the demolition of two properties deemed unsafe structures by the city earlier this year. Commissioner Mike Meerpohl said one of the properties, located on New Jersey Avenue, is “almost entirely cleaned up,” and White said the other property, located on Kansas Avenue, is “becoming a skeleton.”

■ Adjourned the meeting at approximately 7:25 p.m. All commissioners were present.

The Holton City Commission regularly meets on the first and third Monday of each month at Holton City Hall. However, due to the next regularly scheduled meeting date falling on Independence Day, the next meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 5 at City Hall, it was noted.

Moisture is also another important factor for hobby gardeners, and Hallauer said that while last year’s spring rains made the quality of those gardens “inconsistent,” gardeners are still keeping an eye on how much moisture their gardens get.

“It appears to me that most gardens are, across the board, doing fairly well this year,” he said. “But this lack of moisture we’re having right now is really requiring them to stay on top of the watering.”

Area farmers are also keeping an eye on the forecast to see if rain is coming to help with fall crops that are starting to spring up.

“It’s probably too early to tell,” Holliday said. “Most of the corn got in early, and it’s looking good right now. But this dry weather has got everybody concerned a little bit.”

Easterberg said to organize a relay, six to eight volunteers are needed, with meetings a few times a month prior to the event. While Easterberg is unable to attend all the meetings herself, she said she is able to be a resource to event organizers.
