# Sheriff: Ex-employee's legal claims "baseless"

### ■ Dunn alleges wrongful termination over Ewing case

A former detective with the Jackson County Sheriff's Office has filed suit in federal court alleging that he was wrongly fired by Sheriff Tim Morse for his involvement in the Jacob Ewing case — a charge that Morse said is "a complete lie."

Al Dunn, who worked for the sheriff's office from 2000 until this past July, filed a suit on Wednesday in the U.S. District Court for Kansas in Topeka accusing Morse of terminating Dunn's employment with the sheriff's office for political reasons surrounding Ewing, who is facing charges of sex-related crimes in six different Jackson

County District Court cases. Morse, who is currently seeking reelection to the sheriff's post, said he intends to fight the suit in federal court, as Dunn and his attorney, Margie Phelps of Topeka, have requested a jury trial.

"Until now, the Jackson County Sheriff's Office has not had an employee claim under my administration in more than five years," Morse said Thursday of Dunn's claim. "I am going to fight this. There's no legit grievance. This case is a complete lie. His story is not accurate."

Dunn — who was promoted to detective in 2004 and to chief detective in 2007, the suit states - is seeking at least \$150,000 in "lost pay and benefits" and "mental distress," as well as punitive damages and court costs.

Dunn alleges in the civil complaint that after he got involved in investigating the charges against Ewing in late May, Ewing's family members and friends complained to Morse about the investigation.

Some of the alleged complaints, Dunn alleged, were from people "who believed themselves to have political influence" with Morse and allegedly wanted to "use the influence to stop the investigation of their loved one/friend." Dunn claimed that Morse then "pressured (him) to back off of his investigation" and respect an alleged "political need to appease" Ewing's supporters.

# Ewing's not-guilty plea follows Thursday hearing on sixth case

A Holton man accused of several sex-related charges involving six different women entered not-guilty pleas to all the charges against him on Thurs-day in Jackson County District

Following a preliminary hearing on the sixth sex-related case filed against Jacob C. Ewing, 21, in district court, Topeka attorney Kathleen Ambrosio asked Judge Jeff Elder to waive the formal reading on all the charges against Ewing and enter a plea of not guilty to each of the charges against him in all six cases. Arraignment in all six cases had originally been set for Thursday, Nov. 10.

Elder — filling in for District

Court Judge Norbert Marek announced that week-long trial settings had been scheduled by Marek during 2017 on each of the six cases, including the case involved in Thursday's hearing. The charges in this particular case were filed based on claims made by a girl who was reportedly 13 years old at the time of an alleged incident that occurred in the spring of 2014.

In this particular case, a week's trial was scheduled to begin Monday, March 27, 2017, with pre-trial motions to be considered on Wednesday, Jan. 18,

More than 70 supporters of either Ewing or his alleged victims packed the third-floor courtroom at the Jackson Coun-

ty Courthouse for Thursday afternoon's preliminary hearing, in which the girl testified that she met Ewing sometime during the fall of 2013. Both were attending Holton High School football games at the time, although they hung out in different circles, she said.

The girl said she and Ewing would communicate with each other via cell phone and various social media platforms until the night that the alleged incident occurred. That night, she said, she received a message from Ewing about "just hanging out and going for a ride," and she agreed to take him up on the of-

Jackson County Clerk Kathy Mick said advance voting will remain open in her office on the second floor of the Jackson County Courthouse daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Advance voting will close at noon on Monday, Nov. 7. Any registered voter can vote

in advance, and they must present some form of photo identification in order to do so, it was reported.

"We have about 50 to 55 people coming in each day to vote," Mick said.

As of Thursday, the clerk's office reported that 357 people in the county had cast their ballots in advance at the clerk's of-

In addition, 77 people voted in advance at an additional voting station set up at the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation elder center and 30 voted at the Royal Valley High School during a recent home football game.

Howard Schuler of McPherson and Jacobson laid out proposals for the search for an administrator to fill the position that Stones has announced he will vacate at the end of the current school year.

Moeckel said KASB, which reportedly filled 34 superintendent positions in Kansas during the 2015-16 school year, has a team of four members that will conduct the superintendent search at a proposed cost of \$4,250 plus travel costs.

KASB's selection process, Moeckel said, will include thorough background and reference checks of all applicants before the pool of candidates is narrowed down to four or five selections based on information obtained from district staff, administrators, board members and community members on what the district is looking for in a future superintendent.

Moeckel also told board members they may choose to interview a candidate that may not be on the final list of four or five, but the search team will give its reasons why that candidate did not make the final cut. 

### Keep politics out of judicial retention questions

Voting whether to retain or replace Kansas Supreme Court justices should not depend on your political party leanings but rather your opinion on how they have been performing.

At the directive of ultra-conservative members of the Kansas Republican Party, however, special interest groups are broadcasting some deceptive ad messages aimed at convincing voters to vote to replace four of the five state Supreme Court justices on the ballot.

Some such TV commercials appear to claim that the Carr brothers, convicted of horrific Wichita murders, were released by the Kansas Supreme Court. That is false. They remain in prison for life.

The real motivation behind the ultra-conservative Kansas Republican effort to replace the judges involves the public school finance case.

In the public school finance case, the Kansas Supreme Court has ruled, and continues to rule, that the state of Kansas is not currently providing suitable and fair education opportunities for all Kansas children.

Instead of taking action to correct the public school funding problem, Gov. Sam Brownback and his ultra-conservative followers have decided to take an "if we can't beat them, replace them" stance.

If voters oust the Supreme Court judges, then the governor will be required to appoint new ones - and of course he'll look for judges that share his opin-

The Supreme Court is the highest court in Kansas. It consists of seven justices, each of whom is selected by the gover-

The governor appoints from a list of three qualified individuals submitted by the Supreme Court Nominating Commission.

The Supreme Court Nominating Commission is an independent constitutional body created by the Kansas Constitution. The commission is a nine-member

board responsible for recommending qualified individuals for appointment to the Kansas Supreme Court and the Kansas Court of Appeals.

Four of the commission's members are non-attorneys appointed by the governor; four others are attorneys selected by attorneys in each of the state's four congressional districts.

The chair of the commission is an attorney elected by attorneys in a statewide vote. The commission sends the names of three qualified individuals to the governor for each vacancy. The governor interviews the candidates and makes the appoint-

After the first year in office, a justice is subject to a retention vote in the next general election. If a majority of electors vote to retain the justice, he or she remains in office for a term of six years. Justices are subject to a similar retention vote at the conclusion of each term.

The justice who is senior in terms of continuous service is designated by the Constitution as the chief justice, unless he or she declines or resigns the position. The chief justice exercises the administrative authority of


Justices of the Supreme Court ordinarily do not conduct trials. They decide an appealed case by reading the record of the trial and written briefs filed by the parties, and hearing oral arguments of lawyers.

Voting for retention of Justices Dan Biles, Carol Beier, Marla Luckert and Lawton Nuss will help ensure that Kansas retains three separate branches of government – the legislative, the excutive and the judicial.

Caleb Stegall, another Superme Court justice on the ballot, who was appointed by Gov. Brownback, is not targeted for replacement by the ultra-conversative Republicans.

Efforts to openly inject partisan politics into judge retention ballot questions should be rejected on principle.

## PLAINS FOLK: A visit to the Church of St. Levan

In my last column I wrote about the coffen stiles found in lich gates, the entries to churchyards in England.

On our recent excursion walking the coast around Land's End in Cornwall, Cathy and I saw a church tower a little way inland from the path near the town of Porthcurno.

where we spent the night.

The next morning we hiked a little less than half a mile across a field to visit the church of St.

The church sits about half a mile up from the sea.

We were fortunate to find when we arrived at the church a couple of men and several women preparing for a harvest festival the following day.

They were placing flowers around the interior of the church, along with various food items that would be donated to the poor. They also gave us much fascinating information about St. Levan and the church itself.

St. Levan's real name was Selevan, and he arrived on the coast of Cornwall about AD 500, having floated across the Irish sea on a millstone (a bit of a miracle in itself).

A carving on the end of one of the pews in the church is of two fish, which, we were told, represented one of the legends associated with St. Levan: two chad caught simultaneously on one hook.

Every day Selevan would walk down to Porthchapel (porth is the Cornish word for beach) to catch a fish for his meal.

Thinking two fish excessive when he needed only one and not wanting God to think him gluttonous, he threw them back into the sea.

However, he immediately caught the same two chad again (how he knew they were the

same ones I don't know). Again he threw them back, and immediately he caught them again.

God must have wanted him to catch the fish, he thought, so he took them home.

There he found his sister and her two children had come for an unexpected visit. Thus he obviously needed the extra fish. The children, being very hungry, ate ravenously, got fish bones stuck in their throats, and died.

Why, one wonders, should the two children die such grisly deaths?

Seems to me cruel and unusual punishment for the small bit of gluttony on their part.

One part of the legend attributes their deaths to Selevan's throwing the fish back repeatedly instead of accepting them without question as a gift of food from God.

Whatever the case fishermen from the Land's End district even today call chad "chuckcheeld," the Cornish words for "choke child."

Another story associated with Selevan is about his cursing the name Johannah.

A woman named Johannah

was gathering vegetables from the garden for her dinner and chastised Selevan for going fishing on the Sabbath.

Noting that he was getting food for his meal just as she was, he pronounced that if another Johannah were to be christened at his church or his well, she would grow up to be a bigger fool than she was.

### **Applications** for ACEP now sought

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is now accepting applications for the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP), it has been reported.

Created under the 2014 Farm Bill, this program provides funding for the purchase of conservation easements to help productive farm and ranch lands remain in agriculture and protect critical wetlands.

'Conservation easements provide many public benefits to Kansans, including protection of open spaces, wildlife habitat, and wetland preservation," said Eric B. Banks, Kansas state conservationist. "We encourage private landowners, Indian tribes, and non-governmental organizations to contact their local NRCS office to apply."

There are two programs under ACEP, each with a different application process. Vesting the NRCS office will ensure the applicant receives guidance on the correct application process.

The goal of ACEP is to protect

land devoted to food production and wildlife habitat from being converted to non-agricultural uses, it was reported. ACEP is a voluntary program for landowners or tribal governments that allow them to leave a conservation heritage for their family and community.

Landowners can choose between the ACEP-Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) or ACEP-Wetland Reserve Easements (WRE) enrollments options. ALEs protect the longterm viability of the nation's food supply by preventing conversion of productive croplands and grasslands to non-agricultural uses. The WRE component restores wetlands to provide habitat for wildlife, including threatened and endangered species; improve water quality by filtering sediments and chemicals; reduce flooding; recharge groundwater; and protect bioogical diversity.

Kansas has approved a Wetland Reserve Easement Reservation of Grazing Rights
Option under ACEP-WRE for fiscal year 2017. This option is for selected counties in central and western Kansas, Landowners should check with their local USDA Service Center to see if this enrollment option is available for their county.

Landowners in these counties can select an enrollment option for length of time as well as for Reservation of Grazing Rights. The selection for a Reservation of Grazing Rights will result in a 25 percent reduction in the easement payment, in addition to any other reductions to the easement payment per enrollment option as applicable.

NRCS provides technical and financial assistance directly to private and tribal landowners to restore, protect, and enhance wetlands through the purchase of conservation easements. Eligible landowners can choose to enroll in a permanent or 30-year easement. Tribal landowners also have the option of enrolling in 30-year contracts.

It is important that applicants provide accurate records of ownership and ensure they have established a record of ownership with USDA's Farm Service Agency. Application information is available at your local USDA Service Center and at www.nrcs.usda.gov/GetStarted.

Applications can be submitted at any time, but to be considered for 2017 funding opportunities, applications in Kansas must be received by Nov. 25, 2016. Applications are currently being accepted for both agricultural land and wetlands reserve easements. Please contact your local NRCS office or conservation district office for specific information for your county.

universe, both while they're taking place and in the days that follow.

They let the voters see the candidates under pressure and gauge their performance. As scripted as they can sometimes seem, they still let us watch the candidates think on their feet. They're serious events, and are certainly more substantive than campaign speeches and television commercials.

It's true that they don't usually change the trajectory of a race although we won't know until Election Night whether this year's debates played a role in the outcome. They can reinforce enthusiasm, but it's rare that they create it from scratch.

Yet I think our focus on debates — at least in the form they currently take — is misplaced. It's not so much that they reward one-upmanship, a quick wit, and clever zingers - although they do. Rather, I think they don't actually help us make a good choice.

Over my years in Congress and afterward, I've sat in on a lot of meetings at the White House where foreign and domestic policy were discussed.

For the most part, I came away impressed by the process by which presidents make tough decisions. They go around the room, asking each guest, "What do I do now?" They ask participants to define the issue, lay out the options, identify American interests at stake, and make recommendations.

It's usually a sustained, unhurried process, with very little fancy oratory: instead, I've heard sharp debate and thorough discussion characterized by forceful, reasoned, fact-based, and responsible arguments.

Presidents pay close attention and sometimes take notes. They

Change nature of debates want to hear different opinions, seek advice, and then go off and make a decision.

You have to remember that the choices a president has to make are complicated and often very difficult — almost by definition, an issue doesn't get to that level unless it's a tough one. I've sat in on meetings with both Democratic and Republican presidents, and one of the things that often impressed me is that ideology has played a smaller role than you'd imagine. The con-

versations are quite pragmatic. What all this means is that the real quality you're looking for in a President is judgment: the ability to consider issues from all angles, weigh options carefully, and then choose the wisest course - sometimes from among a tangle of unpalatable alternatives.

That is what presidents do. But the qualities necessary to do this do not come through in the debates, which tell us very little about how candidates would do at exercising judgment in the fog of policy-making. A campaign event that calls for impassioned oratory, a quick wit, one-liners, and sharp digs is not especially helpful for helping us choose who is going to make the best

decisions. I think we can do better. Selecting a president is serious business. We want to put control of the process on the voters' side, and not let the

candidates get away with fluff. How do we do this? We change the nature of the debates. To begin with, I believe there should be a series of them, each focused on a single issue - education, say, or national security.

Candidates should face a panel of questioners asking them to address the toughest questions on those matters - people who are sharp and incisive and are prepared to follow up and press candidates when they spout mush. Ideally, the candidates should face this panel one at a time, rotating who goes first, and with other rules to assure fairness.

The point is, we want voters to go to the polls not just with a good idea of where the candidates want to take us and how they're going to get there. We also want voters to have a clear sense of how sound the candidates' judgment is, because that's ultimately what will make or break their presidency.





# Cobra boys team 7th at 2A CC

### ■ Title hopes dashed for JH's Little

Saturday's state cross country meet at Wamego was starting to look like it would have a good finish for Jackson Heights. The boys' team had finished seventh overall in Class 2A, and the girls' lone competitor, sophomore Faith Little, was predicted to bring home a medal.

In fact, Little's family members and friends were gathering at the finish line to cheer her on when they noticed that Little was at the front of the pack as she came down one of the 3.2-mile course's last hills and neared the finish line, and they prepared to celebrate a state title with her.

And then — as JHHS Cross Country Head Coach Brad Alley witnessed — with a quarter of a mile to go, the unthinkable happened.

"She started to weave off the

"She started to weave off the marked course," Alley said of Little. "That's when I saw her eyes kind of roll into the back of her head, and she collapsed."

None of this was apparent to those at the finish line who were waiting to see Little cross first, but when Stanton County's Rebeca Avelar, followed by Bennington's Kya Johnson and several others crossed the line with no view of Little in sight, the attitude shifted from high spirits to concerns that something must have happened to her.

Those concerns were answered when paramedics brought Little to a first aid tent near the end of the course via utility vehicle. Family members, friends and race officials gathered around her to make sure that she would be fine.

"I just want to go home," Little was heard to say.

Alley said Little stayed at the first aid tent for more than half an hour recovering from the collapse, coping with both the dizziness of her physical condition and the disappointment of not being able to finish the race. Later that night, Alley noted, Little contacted him to let him know that she was in "pretty good spirits" despite what had happened earlier.

According to Alley, Little's race started off well.

"She ran the first part of the race about as good as she could possibly run," he said. "She stuck to the game plan, which was to get in that top five group in the first mile. We wanted to make sure she stayed within striking distance of the first girl for the entire race."

Alley estimated that Little "probably got a little bit impatient" with about half a mile to go, and she attempted to "make a move" on Johnson as they drew near the finish line. As Little approached Alley at the quarter-mile mark, the coach could sense that something was wrong.

"She literally just pushed her body to the absolute max," Alley said. "She made a decision that she was going to go after it, and unfortunately, her body said no when her mind was saying yes."

In spite of what happened on Saturday, Alley said he is confident that Little — a two-time state champion at last spring's track and field competitions — will bounce back, and as a sophomore, the goal of a state cross country championship is still within her reach.

"Anybody who knows Faith knows that this will only motivate her," he said. "She believes that she's capable of winning the state title in cross country, and I promise you that she will be the most motivated girl in the state when it comes to track and cross country."

As stated earlier, Jackson Heights' boys team took seventh place overall. The Cobra boys were led by junior Dalton Chartier, whose 22nd-place finish had him three seconds short of medaling, but as Alley noted, Chartier still ran a good race.

"Dalton's been our number one runner all year," Alley said of Chartier. "We've come to expect him to be there. I think he's going to have a really great season in track next spring, and he'll carry it over into cross country next year."

Chartier was followed by senior Mark Mavrovich, wrapping up his high school cross country career in 43rd place out of 99.

career in 43rd place out of 99.
"He'll be missed," Alley said
of Mavrovich. "He's led us
well."

Sophomore Lane Thomas finished two places and four seconds behind Mavrovich, and Alley noted Thomas' dedication and drive for being a dualsports competitor, dividing his time between cross country and football.

"This was a really good experience for our boys because they're pretty young," Alley said of the boys team's final meet of the 2016 season. "Coming here and experiencing this is a pretty valuable experience. I thought we ran reasonably well. We knew coming in this was going to be tough for us. But we were pretty happy to be here, and I thought they ran pretty hard for us."

Elsewhere at Saturday's state meet for KSHSAA classes 1A, 2A and 4A, Wetmore High School senior Aaron Achten capped an impressive high school cross country career with his third-straight medal in the 1A boys' race.

Achten, who set school track and field records in 1600m and 3200m runs this past spring and finished in fifth place at last year's state 1A cross country meet, crossed the finish line in 13th place this past Saturday.



# Holton Wildcats earn 4A-DII playoff berth

For the 19th straight season,

the Holton Wildcats football team has qualified for the state playoffs.

The Wildcats defeated the Santa Fe Trail Chargers 36-24 on Thursday evening to earn the playoff bid.

The Wild-cats scored first in the first quarter and led almost the en-

tire game, except for a short time in the second quarter (about 40 seconds on the game clock) when the Chargers led 24-22.

Holton made two big defensive stands in the second half to prevent the Chargers from scoring.

In the fourth quarter, the Wildcats controlled the football the bulk of the time enroute to the district win that punched their ticket into regionals.

HHS head football coach Brooks Barta said afterwards that the Chargers had been a great opponent.

"We were not very assignment correct on defense for the longest time," coach Barta said. "We tried to make them earn everything they got. They played well.

"In the second half, we buckled down and finally made some big plays on defense."

Coach Barta said he was proud of his team.
"I thought if we ever got on

"I thought if we ever got on a roll, we could be a dangerous team," he said. "I think we're getting there. We have to continue to get better defensively." The Wildcats struck paydirt

The Wildcats struck paydirt first capitalizing on a nine-play, 65-yard drive to start the game, starting at their own 35-yard line.

Running back Bryson Patch scored a touchdown on a three-yard run. Jackson Martin's PAT was blocked and with 8:28 left in the first quarter, Holton led 6-0.

SFT responded with its own eight play, 70-yard scoring drive at the 5:00 mark on a fourth down and goal play from the Holton four-yard line. A two-point conversion pass attempt failed, leaving the score at 6-6.

It took Holton just five plays on its next drive to score again at the 2:00 minute mark as running back Spencer Baum broke loose for a 46-yard TD run. Nobody could catch Baum after he broke through the left side of the Holton line. Baum also scored the two-point conversion on a short run. This scoring drive was five plays and 60 yards.

At the end of the first quarter, Holton led 14-6 but SFT had the ball and was threatening to score. The Chargers converted on a fourth down and seven situation by completing a pass to the Holton seven-yard line.

The Wildcats then held the Chargers on the first three downs. On fourth down and 13 yards to go, however, the Chargers scored on a 19-yard TD pass in the corner of the end zone. The two-point conversion was no good, leaving the score

at 14-12. This scoring drive by SFT was 10 plays, 72 yards.

As had been the case earlier, the Chargers could not contain the Holton ground game on the next series. On the second play from scrimmage, Baum broke loose again, this time for a 55-yard TD run. He also scored the two-point conversion and with 7:00 left in the second quarter, Holton led 22-12.

SFT roared back on its next possession, too, scoring on a nine-play, 67-yard drive. This time the Chargers scored on a 43-yard TD run at the 4:52 mark. The two-point conversion was no good, leaving the score at 22-18.

The only turnover of the game occurred on Holton's next possession. On the team's second play from scrimmage, the Wildcats fumbled away the ball at their own 47-yard line.

SFT's first play from scrimmage resulted in a 17-yard run. With the clock ticking down to under 2 minutes, the Chargers scored on an eight-yard slot reverse play to take the lead for the first time. Their fourth try at a two-point conversion failed, bringing the score to 24-22. This was a six-play, 47 yard scoring drive.

As long as there was time on the game clock, there was time for either of these teams to score. With 65 seconds left until halftime, the Wildcats started at their own 31-yard line. After a 19-yard run by the Wildcats, Baum broke loose for a 30-yard run, taking the ball to the SFT 20. Fullback Tyler Price carried the ball to the SFT 10, then Baum took it to the 5. On the next play, Baum scored a TD with 18 seconds left. The twopoint conversion run was no good, leaving the halftime score at Holton 28, SFT 24.

Holton's first big defensive stop came on SFTs first possession of the second half. The Chargers started at their own 25-yard line and after earning two first downs had advanced the ball to the Holton 43. On fourth down and five yards to go, the Chargers attempted a pass but it fell incomplete. After running 10 plays, SFT was forced to turn the ball over to Holton.

It took the Wildcats just four plays to score, as Baum took the ball, broke a tackle, cut back across the field and scored a TD from 47 yards out. QB Mason Strader carried the ball in for the two-point conversion to make the score 36-24.

### NRCS working with ag producers to save monarch population

The monarch is one of the most familiar butterflies in North America. The orangeand-black butterfly is known for its annual, multi-generational migration from Mexico to as far north as Canada. Monarch butterflies depend on milkweed to lay their eggs during the journey.

But monarch populations have decreased significantly over the past two decades, in part because of the decrease in native plants, including milkweed, on which their caterpillars feed. Agriculture and development have removed much of the native milkweed that once spanned the country.

The Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) is working with agricultural producers to combat the decline of monarch butterflies by planting milkweed and other nectarrich plants on private lands.

NRCS provides technical and financial assistance through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

With assistance from NRCS. producers and conservation partners can plant milkweed and nectar-rich plants along field borders, in buffers along waterways or around wetlands, in pastures and other suitable

EQIP applications are accepted on a continuous basis, however, NRCS establishes application "cut-off" or submission deadline dates for evaluation, ranking, and approval of eligible applica-

The cut-off date this year is Nov. 18, 2016. EQIP is open to all eligible agricultural producers. To apply for EQIP or to get more information on the program, contact your local USDA Service Center or local KDWPT office.



In June of this year, the complaint stated, Dunn was suspended pending "an alleged investigation into alleged insubordination." Dunn claims he was not contacted by anyone for information regarding any alleged insubordination, and in July, he was fired from the sheriff's of-

Dunn said in the complaint that Morse denied requests for information as to why he was terminated, both personally and through an open records re-

"Plaintiff believes and expressly alleges that he was pressured, including by his suspension and ultimately his termination, to work for defendant Morse's political needs, and that because he did not yield to this official pressure, he was suspended and terminated," the suit

Morse said the claims made am not going to be bullied." by Dunn in the civil complaint are "completely baseless" and that the suit "smells of electionyear politics."

"The sheriff has the authority to hire, fire, demote and promote personnel as needed in order to guarantee the public receives adequate services," Morse said. "Sometimes we have to make those necessary adjustments for personnel. There is always just cause, even though these are sometimes tough decisions. I had to do what was right for the county and do my job.'

Morse said Dunn's claims that he was encouraged by Ewing's family and friends to back off the investigation into Ewing's alleged activities are also incorrect.

'I have no connection with the Ewing family," he said. "There's been no support or pressure whatsoever from the family. I

Furthermore, Morse said, the Kansas Bureau of Investigation stepped in to assist the sheriff's office with the investigation against Ewing following Dunn's termination, rendering Dunn's claims of pressure from the Ewing family "absurd."

"We've conducted more than 100 interviews and gone to other states," he said. "This is very widespread."

Dunn and Phelps said they would not comment any further on the civil complaint, it was re-

Phelps had also represented Dunn's wife, Tina, in a similar claim made against the county in April 2011, when Tina Dunn filed suit against then-Sheriff Charles Cornell and his department, citing wrongful termination and a hostile work environment as grounds for the suit. The case was settled out of court.

The two of them allegedly went to Olive Hill Cemetery west of Holton where "stuff happened," starting in the car before they got out of the car, she said. They moved around to the front of the car, where Ewing allegedly sodomized her, she added.

"It hurt," she said. "I was

The girl said that when she asked Ewing to stop, his first response was, "No." At another point, she said she asked him to stop because the act "hurt really bad," and he obliged.

After she returned home from the cemetery, she told a friend who lived in the same apartment complex that the act had caused her to bleed from her rectum. The bleeding continued for about two weeks, she said.

At first, she said, she was afraid to report what had allegedly happened between her and Ewing because she was afraid that she would get in trouble with her father and that she did not have the courage to report the alleged incident.

But after she was contacted by another woman previously identified in court as another

of Ewing's alleged victims, she case - aggravated criminal said she called 911 to report the alleged incident.

It was noted that the alleged incident occurred sometime in the spring of 2014, but the exact date was not made clear by the girl during the hearing.

At one point, she said it occurred "after school was out" for the year; at another, she claimed it happened prior to Easter of that year.

Elder said probable cause in the case had been established and recommended the case proceed to arraignment, at which point Ewing entered not guilty pleas to the two charges in the sodomy and aggravated indecent liberties with a child.

Ambrosio then noted that no pleas had been entered on the other five cases against Ewing, and she asked Elder to waive both the formal reading of charges in the other five cases, as well as Ewing's right to a speedy trial, and entered an across-the-board plea of not guilty to the charges in the other cases.
