School board elections moved to fall

There will be no election this spring for school board positions as this is the first year those elections will be held in November. School board elections were previously held in April of oddnumbered years, but due to a law passed recently by state legislators, those elections will now be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November in odd-numbered years, beginning in 2017, it was reported.

Year In Review: January through March events noted

Jeff Stithem, who holds posi-tion five on the Royal Valley Board of Education, recently filed for re-election, and all candidates have until noon on June 1, 2017 to do so at the Jackson County Clerk's Office in Holton. The election will be held Nov.

Previously, school board general elections were held in the spring of odd-numbered years with terms starting July 1, the same day that new fiscal years

start for Kansas school districts. The new law, House Bill 2104, now requires these elections to be held in the fall during the general election with terms starting Jan. 1, in the middle of the school district's fiscal year. The positions will continue to be non-partisan, it was reported, meaning candidates for school board positions do not list any political party affiliations.

County approves amendments to 2016 budget

By Ali Holcomb Amendments to the 2016 county budget were approved by the Jackson County Commissioners on Tuesday.

Any additional unforeseen revenues, which are not collected tax dollars, require the Jackson County Commissioners to amend the budget each year for several county departments, it was reported.

As 2016 draws to a close, The Holton Recorder takes a look back at the events that shaped the year in Jackson County. The following is the first of three parts to the review of the year. January

Norbert Marek Jr. was sworn into office as the new Kansas Second Judicial District Judge for Jackson County, replacing the late Micheal Ireland. Marek and Jackson County District Court Clerk Colleen Reamer also met this month with county commissioners to discuss potential courtroom renovations to maximize space and reduce the number people required to wait in the hallways outside the courtrooms. Royal Valley USD 337 Superintendent John Rundle has announced he will retire at the end of the current school vear after 40 years of working in the district, the last 15 years as superintendent. Rundle also worked for Royal Valley for five years at the middle school as a language arts teacher, eight years as elementary school principal and 12 years as curriculum director and assistant superintendent.

The Holton City Commission approved the \$75,000 installment purchase of an approximately nine-acre farmground tract that lies between the community garden at Countryside Park and South Iowa Avenue from Countryside Development Corporation. City Manager Bret Bauer said the newly-purchased land could "potentially" be used for a dog park.

Holton commissioners also approved insurance contracts with Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Kansas for fiscal year 2016, noting that the overall price of premiums will increase by 7.57 percent. Commissioners also approved a 3-percent across-theboard wage and salary increase for all city employees. Mike Meerpohl of Holton was appointed to fill the unexpired Holton City Commission term recently vacated by Erich Campbell, who is leaving to serve as a Kansas Second Judicial District magistrate judge in Pottawatomie County. Meerpohl, Christina Cobler, Rodney Miller and Christina Murphy have filed for election to the position in April, necessitating a primary election.

Jackson County has taken possession of the Forrester Truck Parts and Repair building north of Holton to serve as the new shop for the road and bridge department. County commissioners signed paperwork to purchase the building, seven acres of land and additional equipment at a total cost of \$380,000, with the department expecting to move into the new shop in March.

Kavden Blaise Evans wasn't due to arrive until about mid-January, according to his mothson Heights USD 335 Superintendent and Elementary Principal Adrianne Walsh said she was "very pleased" that the preschool program in her district would break even this school vear.

The Northeast Kansas Heritage Complex received a big boost in support after a total of \$216,000 was donated by community members and businesses during a dollar-for-dollar matching event sponsored by Denison State Bank. DSB leaders challenged county residents

State Fishing Lake was identified as Jon Paul Sumpter of Silver Lake, Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse said. The cause of death is still unknown, Morse said. On Tuesday, the commissioners held a budget hear-ing to discuss the amendments and then approved them unanimously.

By amending the 2016 proposed budget authority for the departments, the administrators will be able to use or transfer those funds.

The amendments include: * General fund in-crease from \$5,697,744 to \$5,847,443.

* Sheriff's office in-crease from \$2,359,610 to \$2,992,911.

* Road and bridge increase from \$3,095,487 to \$3,182,152.





50 Years Ago Week of Dec. 25-31, 2011

The community of Hoyt is planning a Twelfth Night celebration this year. More and more communities across the country are using this celebration as an official close to the observance of the Christmas season. This will be the first occasion for it on a community-wide basis in Hoyt.

With a sudden change in the weather on Thursday, Dec. 22, Jackson County is assured at least a partially white Christmas. The first real snow of the season began falling that afternoon, after a break in the spring-like

conditions that had prevailed for more than a week.

On Tuesday, Dec. 27, Holton saw its first winter storm of the season when 91/2 inches of the white stuff got dumped on the area. This was the most substantial precipitation in Holton for more than 60 days, it was reported.



PLAINS FOLK: Native Americans of Plains thrive

By Tom Isern Along with most of the people reading this, I am a product of a settler society.

That's a term used by scholars who study the historical development of places around the world notably,

great

its grasslands - that have been colonized by European settlers.

Settler societies generally - but not always - came to dominate the places they occupy. They pushed aside the indigenous peoples, such as American Indians.

After a certain number of generations, the settlers - such as the German-Americans of my clan - came to consider themselves native to the place.

In the generation immediately following settlement, the settlers often used the phrase "vanishing native" to speak, wistfully, about the Indians riding over the horizon of history, presumably gone forever.

High schools and colleges took Indian names for their athletic teams, secure in the knowlover, the children born to the settler society have been eager to leave the prairies behind. Not so with the old natives,

the American Indians of the plains. They have cultivated a rich sense of place on the very reservations that once imprisoned them.

They have wed and produced children, many more than the settlers. Many, encouraged by government programs, have left, but many of these have returned to the plains.

Settler communities are full of old people. Indian communities are full of kids.

"This triumph of survival was hard-earned through resistance and adaptation," writes Wishart. 'A better future, when Plains Indians will thrive, not just survive, remains a battle to be won."

I'm quoting from a slender new book by Wishart, published by University of Nebraska Press, entitled "Great Plains Indians."

Now, it seems crazy for Wishart to try to cover this subject in less than 150 pages, but you have to understand what he's trying to do.

This is a book for us, of the settler society. Only in certain parts of the plains, such as Dakota or Oklahoma, do appreciable numbers of the settlers



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edge such taking would never be contested.

I remember, faintly, being a play-Indian myself, in a parade celebrating the centennial of my native state (see there, I used the term myself!), Kansas, in 1961. My costume was cobbled together from feedsacks fetched from the barn.

Except, well, the natives never vanished, they only lay low for a while. In terms of real estate, they lost big-time. In terms of demographics, they have made a remarkable comeback.

"On the Great Plains," writes the Nebraska geographer David Wishart, "reservations are now islands of population growth in a sea of rural population decline.'

Over the past three-quarters of a century, the settler society has seen declining birthrates. Morestill have frequent contact with Indian neighbors. Even there, most do not.

Wishart reminds us that not only are Plains Indians a continuing presence - they are players of increasing importance in the 21st century. Some in the settler society view this with fear. Others resent it when Indians assert the rights guaranteed them by treaty.

In an upcoming column, I'll explain why the treaties made in the 19th century are vitally important to all of us, Indian and settlers alike, in the 21st century. In the meantime, we have Wishart's handy book as a guide, not so much to the past as to the future of the plains.

Thank you from someone who enjoys having a Bill of Rights. How honored to be more than a citizen of America, yet the honor to be an American.


I commend you for publishing Mr. Anstaett's article.

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

CITY OF MAYETTA

ORDINANCE NO. 12-2016

AN ORDINANCE ADOPT-ING THE CODIFICATION OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MAYETTA, KAN-SAS, AUTHORIZED BY OR-DINÁNCE NO. 01-09 PRO-VIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN OTHER OR-DINANCES NOT INCLUD-ING THEREIN, EXCEPTING ORDINANCES CERTAIN FROM REPEAL AND SAV-ING CERTAIN ACCRUED RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES.

Be it Ordained by the Governing Body of the City of Mayetta, Kansas:

Section 1. The codification of ordinances of the City of Mayetta, Kansas, authorized by Ordinance No. 01-09 and K.S.A. 12-3014 and 12-3015, as set out in the following chapters, Chapter I to XVI and Appendices A and B, all inclusive, and entitled the "Code of the City of Mayetta, Kansas, 2016," is hereby ad-opted and ordained as the "Code of the City of Mayet-ta, Kansas, 2016," and said codification shall become effective upon publication of no fewer than 10 copies of said code in book form.

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances of a general nature passed prior to December 7, 2016, in force and effect at the date of the publication of no fewer than 10 copies of the "Code of the City of Mayetta, Kansas, 2016," and this ordinance, are hereby repealed as of the date of publication of said code except as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. In construing this ordinance, the following ordinances shall not be considered or held to be ordinances of a general nature:

(a) Ordinances pertaining to the acquisition of property or interests in property by gift, tion:

Ordinances opening, (b) dedicating, widening, vacating or narrowing streets, ave-nues, alleys and boulevards; (c) Ordinances establishing and changing grades of streets, avenues, alleys and

boulevards; (d) Ordinances naming or changing the names of streets, avenues and boulevards;

(e) Ordinances authorizing or directing public improvements to be made;

(f) Ordinances creating districts for public improvements of whatsoever kind or nature:

(g) Ordinances levying general taxes;

(h) Ordinances levying special assessments or taxes; (i) Ordinances granting any

rights, privileges, easements or franchises therein mentioned to any person, firm or corporation;

(j) Ordinances authorizing the issuance of bonds and other instruments of indebtedness by the city;

(k) Ordinances authorizing contracts;

(I) Ordinances establishing the limits of the city or pertaining to annexation or exclusion of territory;

(m) Ordinances relating to compensation of officials, of-ficers and employees of the city:

(n) Ordinances of a temporary nature;





* Learned that Commissioner Rob Ladner recently attended a Mayetta City Council meeting. Ladner asked that members of the city council think about a replacement for Dan Fenton, who wants to retire from the Mayetta Cemetery Board as treasurer and the responsibility of selling and laying out gravesites.

* Heard a weekly report from Eric Fritz and Earl Bahret, road and bridge department co-supervisors. The men and the commissioners discussed the possibility of purchasing a used force feed loader to assist with cleaning out ditches and hauling the dirt away. Fritz expressed his concern about the width of a windrow that the piece of equipment would pick up. No action was taken on

the issue. The commissioners informed Fritz and Bahret that crewmembers were to start hauling rock, using county equipment, to stockpile as long as the rock was not too wet. This rock was to be purchased out of county general funds.

* Learned from Terry Mick, bridge and special project manager, that the county need to purchase blank road signs. The commissioners signed a purchase order to National Sign Company of Ottawa for \$3,140.

* Learned from Mick that the department needs to replace steel and culvert inventory that was used for FEMA disaster projects



this year. Mick said he will prepare several purchase orders to be signed next week. The commissioners agreed to replace the inventory.

* Approved the fuel bid of \$16,471.70 for 3,500 gallons of unleaded fuel and 4,500 gallons of winterized diesel fuel, submitted by Haag Oil Company, which was the only company that submitted a bid.

* Agreed to pay \$896.72 in dues to the Kansas League of Municipalities.

* Signed hayland rental lease agreements at Banner Creek Reservoir for Landon Bagby and John Stous. The leases are for 58 acres at a cost of \$30 per acre.

* Met with John Kennedy, Banner Creek Reservoir director, who requested permission to seek bids on a new lawn mower with the trade-in of the department's current John Deere mower.

* Met in executive session for 15 minutes to discuss a personnel matter. Back in open session, the commissioners agreed to change the county's policy that states that employees on workers compensation cannot do light duty work. Now, if there is light duty avail-

able, the commissioners will require employees to work.

* Met with resident Brent Nelson, who expressed concern about the condition of M Road south of the highway.

* Participated in a webinar about the process of redistricting the county and the Fair Labor Standards Act.

* Adjourned the meeting at 4:30 p.m. All commissioners were present.

stronaut" had to return to the earth without any cracks.

To start off the project, students made a capsule for the egg. There are two different types of capsules students could make: a crash landing capsule and a capsule with a

Students had 20 minutes to complete the capsule using recycled bottles, duct tape, tissue paper, balloons, etc. Only four out of 18 students in class had a successful capsule, which protected the egg. The four students who succeeded, Ben Bontrager, Cali VanAusdall, Aiden Andros and Uriel Tomas, used a parachute to help land the capsule.

"I was surprised that mine didn't crack because the parachute didn't work that well." VanAusdall said.

The next day in class, students had 20 minutes to try to build the capsules so they'd land without hurting the egg, and the students who succeeded in the capsule drop built a

rocket out of two liter bottles and cardboard as the fins. Students spent time fixing the rockets during the next three class periods for 30 minutes.

The rockets were filled halfway with water, and they were shot off by using an air compressor. Only Taygen Altenburg's egg survived the landing.

"My rocket had a very rough landing, and as I unwrapped my egg, I felt very nervous the whole time. Then, when I discovered it wasn't broken, I was very happy," Altenburg said.

After the project, students completed multiple calculations of the height, the ascending and descending time and the distance traveled.

a child after a December plea deal in which five other related charges against Bond were dismissed.

Dr. Vance Lassey says he will have one of the first Direct Primary Care medical practices in a rural setting in Kansas. About 100 people attended an informational meeting about DPC here that was hosted by Lassey, who said he is leaving his practice at Family Practice Associates in Holton after nine years there so he can start his own "Holton Direct Care" practice in the community, hopefully by March 1.

Fred Fernkopf of rural Holton has retired as a postal carrier for the Holton Post Office. Fernkopf worked at post offices in Topeka and Holton for a combined 30 years of service. While Fernkopf officially retires on Feb. 29, his last day of work was earlier this month since he had accrued several days of vacation. Fernkopf said he was traveling out of town to work construction in 1986 when he looked into a career with the U.S. Postal Service.

Scott Buchheit of Netawaka pleaded no contest to one count of rape in connection with a series of alleged incidents with a girl with minutes to go before a jury trial was set to begin in Jackson County District Court. The plea deal — in which 10other charges against Buchheit were dismissed — negated the need for a trial, but Buchheit would almost immediately seek withdrawal of the plea deal, saying his attorney provided "ineffective counsel."

Ideas for Holton city projects to be paid for with the city's capital improvement and equipment reserve funds were discussed by the Holton City Commission after receiving an update on high balances in the two funds both at the present time and also with amounts proposed to be added to each fund by the end of 2016. Bauer also gave commissioners a list of possible capital improvement projects and equipment purchases for this year.

For the first time since 2003, the Jackson Heights High School boys varsity basketball team has won the KSHSAA Class 2A state basketball tournament. The Cobras beat Salina-Sacred Heart 64-55 in the final game of the state tournament, held in Manhattan, to win the champion-

ship.

Åfter 45 years of business, Ron's IGA of Holton will close at the end of March, according to store owner and manager Scott Coleman. The store will be closing because of encroaching competition and declining sales, said Coleman, who noted that he had mulled over the decision to close the store for about three vears.

Holton resident George E. Fleshman Jr. has been arrested and charged with second-degree murder in connection with the death of his wife. Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse said. The charge was filed following an investigation into the death of Elizabeth Fleshman at a Topeka hospital in October 2015 following an incident at the Fleshman home.

The Holton City Commission has tentatively accepted a proposal to sell two lots in the city's industrial park at the north edge of town on the west side for a total of \$32,000 to B&P Propane of Holton, it has been reported. The purchase contract agreement presented to commissioners this month is contigent on B&P seeking and receiving Industrial Park (IP) zoning through the city's planning commission and obtaining a special use permit.

Updated radio system equipment has been purchased to improve radio communication between fire departments, emergency medical services and law enforcement within Jackson County. The Jackson County Commission this month approved a purchase quote of \$104,648.90 from KA-COMM., Inc. of Manhattan to fix and upgrade the radio system that Jackson County dispatchers use to page fire and EMS personnel to emergency calls.

Area residents who live in the unincorporated areas of Jackson County are reminded that they have until April 1, to register or re-register their dog with the county if it's a pit bull or a hybrid of that breed. The Jackson County Commission approved a resolution last year that requires owners of certain dog breeds to register each year at the Jackson County Sheriff's Office and pay a \$25 fee.

Commissioners also expressed their concern with a state property tax lid bill by attending hearings on the proposed Senate Bill

316 at the State Capitol Building in Topeka. The hearings included testimony from opponents of SB 316, as well as proponents of House Bill 2609, an alternate option to the Senate bill that would limit how much property tax revenue can be increased without a public vote.

Also this month, commissioners and John Kennedy, Banner Creek Reservoir director, discussed the possibility of providing rental cabins at the reservoir while looking at "creative ways" to possibly fund the construction of such cabins. Kennedy also presented commissioners with the reservoir's annual report, which noted that revenues at the reservoir were up about \$15,000 from the previous year.

The possibility of connecting a road that runs behind Holton Community Hospital, Gillil-and Drive, to the road that runs through the Holton Industrial Park was considered this month by the Holton City Commission. Commissioners had discussed the idea during a recent brainstorming session on uses for city capital improvement funds.

Jackson Farmers operations manager Gary Amon announced that he would be retiring this month after 42 years with the coop. "Actually, it'll be 42 years, four months and 12 days to be exact, but nobody's counting over here," Amon joked. Area farmers and friends were invited to wish Amon well on his retirement during a special reception at the co-op.

Soldier resident Anthony Bowers was found guilty late this month by a Jackson County District Court jury on child sex charges stemming from incidents that allegedly occurred in late 2012, but for the time being, he remains free on bond. No sentencing date was set immediately, but Bowers would be jailed in early April on a charge of violating his probation in another unrelated case.

Sheriff says claims against him are false

Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse has stated that a former county detective's claims of unlawful termination allegedly stemming from not helping the sheriff downplay an investigation into allegations of rape against a Holton resident are false, according to documents filed Tuesday in federal court.

Morse, represented by Overland Park attorney Toby Crouse, responded to the federal court lawsuit filed in October by former Jackson County Detective Al Dunn by alleging that Dunn was instead fired from the sheriff's office for insubordination. Dunn, who had worked for the sheriff's office starting in 2000, was suspended on June 24 of this year and eventually terminated on July 12, according to court documents.

Dunn's lawsuit against Morse claims the sheriff unlawfully suspended and then fired him because Dunn refused to take

action to shelve an investiga-tion into Holton resident Jacob Ewing, who is currently facing six sex-related criminal cases in Jackson County District Court. Ewing's family had asked Morse to drop the investigation against Ewing, Dunn alleged.

In Tuesday's filing, Morse responded by denying Dunn's allegation that the sheriff was influenced by Ewing's family to stop the investigation. The sheriff also noted that the investigation into Ewing continued following Dunn's termination from the department.

Morse also stated in the filing that he "assigned other detectives to the investigation and diminished Dunn's role because of Dunn's poor performance earlier in the investigation and during an unrelated investigation and trial," saying the former detective "failed to collect essential evidence" in the unrelated matter.

which resulted in a hung jury, Dunn was accused by the defense of conducting an incompetent investigation and his performance was the focus of the defense," Tuesday's filing stated. "Because of these accusations and Dunn's performance, Morse decided it was necessary to assign duties to other detectives to avoid Dunn becoming the focus in the Ewing case.3

Morse also denied Dunn's claim that Dunn was asked to drop the investigation because complaints from Ewing's family and friends could have an effect on Morse's efforts to be reelected as Jackson County Sheriff in November. Morse, who has served as sheriff since 2011, was eventually re-elected.

Dunn, represented by Topeka attorney Margie Phelps, is currently seeking \$150,000 in dam-ages for lost salary and mental and emotional distress, accord-"During the unrelated trial, ing to court documents."

The additional funds for the road and bridge department include reimbursements by the Federal Emergency Manage-ment Agency, as well as the sale of equipment, according to Jackson County Clerk Kathy Mick.
