Noriega receives 20-year sentence

■ Judge: Stabbing victim 'screaming for justice'

Shortly before he was given a prison sentence of more than 20 years for the stabbing death of a Mayetta woman at his parents' home, Wilson Noriega expressed remorse for the November 2015 incident that ended the life of Leann Sanchez.

"I lost someone who was real close to me — a childhood friend... I know I'm going to lose my family," Noriega, 51, told Jackson County District Court Judge Norbert Marek on Thursday.

Marek, noting that no mem-bers of Noriega's family were in court that afternoon to support him, looked past those words and the terms of a plea agreement, in which the main charge against Noriega was reduced from first-degree murder to voluntary manslaughter, and handed down an aggravated sentence that Marek said will have Noriega in prison "until he's 75 years old."

"Leann Sanchez and the citizens of Kansas are screaming for justice," the judge said. "This is all I can give them."

The plea agreement, accepted by Marek during an April 14 hearing, sought the low end of a sentencing range between 221 months (18 years and five months) and 247 months (20 years and seven months), as well as credit for more than 18 months Noriega has spent at the Jackson County Detention Cen-

But on Thursday, Marek handed Noriega the upper end of the sentencing range for voluntary manslaughter — a level 3 person felony, according to Kansas law — and cut the credit for jail time to about four months, saying that whether the court had to hold to an agreement to a level 3 felony was "at the state's discretion.'

Wilson's anti-texting essay wins state contest

"As a firefighter's daughter, this is a conversation I have with my dad not just once a year, but multiple times a year,' she wrote "Texting is an addiction; people are on their phones constantly regardless of where they are. Phones have the power to ruin relationships and destroy

Workman described how peer pressure can help curb the use of cell phones while driving: "When the younger generation makes the active decision to call texting and driving 'uncool' or a stupid decision, they won't do it. When your peers tell you something is bad, you are inclined to believe that it is and you won't do it."

A historic hay barn, owned by Harold E. and Judy Thompson of rural Denison, was "demolished" by tornadic winds on Thursday, May 18.

The white barn was known as the Torrence barn, since it was built by Joseph Torrence in 1914, and it was once considered the largest barn in Jackson

County. The Thompson property is located one mile north and three miles east of Denison at 19845 Barber Rd.

"It happened around 8 p.m.," Thompson said. "The wind lifted the roof, and the whole thing shifted 50 feet to the east."

Thompson said there was no cattle or machinery in the barn during the incident.

"A huge amount of lumber was used to build it," he said. "If you built that barn today, it'd cost you \$300,000.

Joesph Torrence began building the barn in 1910 and, once complete with a gabled roof, it measured 70-feet by 100-feet and was 45-feet high. It was built for a large cattle operation, and the barn had double loaded

aisles with cattle mangers capable of feeing 100 to 150 cows

Considered a Midwest Prairie style barn, 12-foot by 12-foot pine posts were shipped from Arkansas on the railroad to Half Mound and then put on wagons to the ranch to construct the barn.

Hausslers comment on 2017 golf season, state tournament

Holton High School junior AJ Haussler has putted his way to the Class 4A state golf tournament for three straight years, and this year's tournament saw him battling adverse weather and course conditions, according to AJ and his father, HHS Assistant Head Coach Kurt Haussler.

Still, AJ said he was thankful for the experience.

"Although I didn't play my best, it was good to face some adversity and play in the rain," said AJ, who shot his way to a 45th-place finish at the state golf fournament, held Monday, May 22 at the Wamego Country Club.

Kurt acknowledged that the rainy weather and slick greens that day at Wamego "provided a challenging test for the entire 4A field." But despite the weather and course conditions, Kurt noted that his son still finished with his best score and placement yet at state competition.

"We are very proud of the way AJ continued to battle and give his best on every shot in challenging conditions," Kurt said. "It was a real test of patience and mental toughness, and we thought he did a great job in both areas.'

AJ shot an 18-over-par 88 at the state tournament, which was beset by rain that caused an hour's delay in play for all 101

participating golfers, it was reported. His score was hampered by a ninth-hole challenge that saw him shooting eight on a par-

'While he may not have executed every shot the way he wanted, he did the things we ask our players to do by sticking to his game plan with decisions off the tee, playing smart golf in using good course management, and staying patient in dealing with heavy rain and a weather delay during the round," Kurt said.

The elder Haussler noted that his son's third straight appearance at the state tournament capped a good season for AJ, which saw him finishing sixth at the Clay Center regional tournament and scoring well at all other competitions that involved the Wildcat golfers.

"AJ had an excellent junior season, medaling in every event prior to the state tournament and providing leadership to a young and inexperienced varsity team this season," Kurt said.

AJ also took some pride in the way his junior season turned out and acknowledged the work of his father and Head Coach Don Swisher in helping him to improve through the season.

"Overall, it was my best season so far, and I hope I can have another good season next year,"

KANSAS LEGISLATURE

Never-ending budget shortfalls bad for state

The state of Kansas faces an estimated \$900 million budget shortfall.

Gov. Sam Brownback is still in office but reports are still circulating that after this legislative session he may resign the position to take an ambassadorship in Rome in the President Donald Trump administration, as ambassador to the United Nations for food and agriculture.

The way Kansas state government is being operated these days - from budget crisis to budget crisis - is maddening and tiresome.

Kansans deserve better. If Gov. Brownback resigns, he will end his second term

as governor two years early. In the meantime, state legislators (many of them still loyal to Gov. Brownback's taxation vision) stopped their work Thursday to take a four-day weekend and maybe have a picnic, I guess, but before they left the State Capitol building, they advanced a proposal to increase state aid to Kansas public schools, it was reported.

Two-thirds of the House of Representatives members approved a measure to increase state aid to public schools by \$180 million in the new school term and to further increase state aid to public schools by another \$100 million in the following school term, for a total package increase of \$280 million.

The measure now moves to the Kansas Senate where state senators have already advanced their own bill to

increase state aid to public schools by about \$240 million over two years.

The Kansas Supreme Court, earlier this year, gave the State Legislature a June 30 deadline to complete work on a new public school funding formula, after it ruled the state's current formula both inadequate and unconstitutional.

The Legislature's will to agree on how much to increase state aid to public school is the first step.

The next step is showing the will to compromise on how to make the increase to state aid to public schools

This 2017 session of the Kansas Legislature has lasted 101 days, so far, and has just nine days to go as the state budgeted the session

The cost to Kansas taxpayers to fund the State Legislature is about \$45,000 for each day that it is in session.

For sure, this legislative session has not been a picnic for our state leaders.

The state's reserves have been depleted over the past six years, since the major tax exemptions of 2012 were enacted. The state has been in a never-ending state budget crisis since that year.

Efforts to turn this state into some things it is not have failed. Fairness in state taxation now requires state legislators to fully repeal those 2012 tax exemptions. David Powls

GRILLING? Don't forget the meat thermometer

Kansas State University food scientist Karen Blakeslee says getting ready for the outdoor grilling season requires one important tool in addition to tongs, a spatula and oven mitts.

"Grab that meat thermometer too," said Blakeslee, who is also coordinator of the university's Rapid Řesponse Center, a source of information on food safety and

other consumer topics.

"A thermometer is your best defense against any foodborne illness and checking for done-ness," she said. "Don't rely on color, because it's really misleading. Internal temperature is the best way to check for done-Blakeslee said digital, instant-

read thermometers are the best type to use for grilling because the sensor is on the point of the thermometer. "You will get a really quick

read with those," she said. "They will give you a reading in about 10 seconds.'

She added that depending on the type of meat you are grilling, there are three temperatures to remember:

• 165 degrees F – For any type of poultry, whether it's chicken or turkey, and regardless if it's ground or even whole.

• 160 degrees F – For any type of ground meat, including beef, pork or lamb.

• 145 degrees F – For steaks and chops, whether it is beef, pork or lamb. Try to insert the thermometer in from the side, not from the top. That will give you a better reading.

Blakeslee shared other tips to make sure your grilling experience is successful:

Cleaning The Grill

Caked-on grease or food can cause a fire. Brush and scrub the grates well. Some spray-on grill cleaners can be effective at removing residue.

Blakeslee also suggested taking the grate out and cleaning leftover grease and food particles from inside the grill. She also advised inspecting the cleaning brush.

"If you've got a brush where those little metal bristles are starting to come loose or break, it's time to throw it out and get a new one," she said. "Those may break off on the grate itself and if you don't see them, they could get stuck on your food, and you could ingest them.'

In addition, check the propane tank to make sure it's full and ready to go, and that there are no cracks in the hoses. Food Safety

Blakeslee cautioned against cross-contaminating foods.

"The main thing is if you're handling raw meat with tongs, don't use those same tongs that handled the raw meat with your cooked vegetables or meat," she said. "Wash your tongs in between handling raw and cooked foods. If you have an extra set, use a clean set instead.

"Once you take your meat off the grill, don't put it back on the plate that had the raw meat on it. And eat it right away. Once it starts to get warmer outside and up over 90 degrees, you can leave food out for about an hour, but after that I would put it in the refrigerator or ice chest."

In cooler, springtime weather, Blakeslee said food can be left out for up to two hours, but then should be refrigerated

• Use an ice chest – Ice chests are convenient for storing drinks or, when filled with ice, can help to keep food cold during an outdoor party.

"You're re-creating your kitchen outside," Blakeslee said. "If you have access to power outside, you could even have a portable refrigerator for your gathering. Remember to plug it in early enough to make sure it's cold."

Keep an ice chest in a covered area or out of direct sunlight, she added.

• Safety precautions – "Supervise the grill all the time," she said. "Pay attention to what's going on, because if you leave it unattended, it could spark a fire, or if kids or pets are running around outside, they may accidentally tip

Ham radio operating explained to seventh graders

The Jackson Amateur Radio Club (JARC) partnered and worked with the Hiawatha Amateur Radio Club Thursday afternoon, May 11, and talked with the seventh grade science classes at the Hiawatha Middle School about the ionosphere, introduced them to amateur radio and discussed how the properties of the ionosphere allow worldwide communication on the short wave bands.

Randall Noon, KC0CCR from Hiawatha, explained how the ionosphere is formed, how it refracts radio waves and how this effect is used to send radio waves around the world.

Richard Smith, WOQGS,

president of the Jackson Amateur Radio Club (JARC) of Holton, discussed how ham radio operators become licensed and the many ways in which ham radio operators communicate with each other. This includes communication by voice, by Morse Code, by texting, by television and by facsimile.

Jim Gerweck, KB0FVP from Falls City, who formerly was involved in Emergency Preparedness for Richardson County, Neb., then told the classes how ham radio operators provide emergency communications.

Because each ham radio station is independent, even when regular communications like landlines and cell phones are knocked out by storms or disasters, ham radio operators can provide emergency communications. There are currently about 738,000 licensed ham operators in the United


Smith explained how the astronauts on the International Space Station are all ham operators, and how it is possible for local ham operators to talk with them when the space station passes overhead.

To demonstrate how the local two-meter repeater works, calls were made from the classroom using small handheld radios to several local ham operators standing by including KC0RMJ, KC-

0CIO both in Hiawatha, and KB0WOG in Falls City, Neb.

This summer on June 24 and June 25, local ham operators from both Jackson Âmateur Radio Club and the Hiawatha Amateur Radio Club will gather at the south end of the Hiawatha Walmart to set up an emergency communication station.

They will exchange messages with about 35,000 other ham operators across North America, Central America and the Pacific for 24 hours to demonstrate their ability to provide emergency communications if needed. The public is welcome to observe.

Daily races remembered at SHS

By Alena Pfrang WHS Student Correspondent Back in the 1960s, Sabetha High School used to have some of the fastest quarter-mile runners. The high school boys would literally race for food during lunch time. Of course, everyone received lunch, but it was a matter of speed as to whether one got second helpings

This daily event occurred at the former Sabetha High School, which is now the Big Brothers Big Sisters (BIGGS) building on Main Street in Sabetha. David Pfrang, class of 1970, recently shared his story.

During this time, lunch was served at the elementary school in Sabetha. Therefore, students had to travel four blocks in order to eat. Back then, lunch wasn't just the time to eat; it was also the time to

Before lunch there was a study hall for the whole high school. As soon as the bell rang, the doors of the old high school burst open to reveal about three hundred students desperate to get their lunch.

To get to the cafeteria, some of the students would sprint a quarter of a mile down Oregon Street. Because the arrival of all of the students was overwhelming, lunch became hectic. There was always a teacher monitor giving out numbers to the students as they came in.

"I was always averaging positions nine through twelve on good days," Pfrang says looking back. The first ones to come were the first ones to be served any available second helpings.

Additionally, these high school boys would do anything to be the winner. Cheating was very common in these lunchtime races. During the study hall before lunch, the boys were already planning ahead as to what they could do to gain an advantage in the competition for food. Seeing as the study hall class was located on the second floor, being on the ground floor was definitely a great advantage.

"All the excuses used were like timing bathroom breaks, going to the library and going to your locker just so you could get down on the bottom floor so you can take off," Pfrang recalls. "People would get so desperate. One kid even jumped out of a window from the second floor. However, that kid never did

it again. Another way that the Sabetha High School boys gained the upper hand in the relay was by literally pushing and shoving each other into hedgerows surrounding the Oregon Street houses.

"One day, I got lucky and the bell rang just as I was by the front door," Pfrang said. "I beat everyone. I mean I was motivated to get down there as fast as I could because I was number one. Crossing that last street, I started to celebrate thinking 'I am the champion!' Then I go up to the teacher and he hands me the number three. I remember thinking, 'What the heck is this?' I found out the two kids in front of me had jumped in a car with somebody they knew. That's how they got down there so fast. That's the closest I ever came to being number

The desperate competitors didn't stop for the cars; the cars stopped for them. Since there were many intersections between the high school and the grade school, the male students would leap over cars or jump onto vehicle hoods and trunks to try and catch a free ride to the cafeteria.

The walk back from lunch was much more relaxed. After all, there was no hurry to get back to the school. The first ones to arrive at lunch were the last ones to arrive at the school because of the second helpings of food. On snowy days, there were snowball fights on the journey back to class. Pfrang remembers, "My class was the champion of snowball fights, mostly because there were more of us."

All in all, these ultimate races were unforgettable for Pfrang. From shoving other students into hedgerows and catching free rides on random vehicles to making up excuses to go downstairs, there was always that determination to get the first servings of food at lunch.

"At that time, we always had the top quarter-milers and distance runners in the league because we had to run for our food five days a week. Even if it rained or snowed, nothing stopped us from running down that street," Pfrang recollects. "Then the new Sabetha High School was built in 1970, ending the 'ultimate race.' It's just amazing how things have changed.'

The Middle." Finally, the high school choir ended the night with "If Heaven Wasn't So Far Away," "Amie, That's My Job" and "Love Is An Open Door."


High school choir member Mariah Ramirez feels that the concert was a success.

New developments in Ewing cases reported

New developments have arisen in the case of a Holton man who has been charged with sexual offenses against five different women and the possession of pornographic materials reportedly involving minors, it has been reported in Jackson County District Court.

In the latter case, Jacob Ewing, 22, recently charged with 13 counts of sexual exploitation of a child after a search of Ewing's cellular telephone and computer reportedly turned up as many images or videos of alleged child pornography, will face a preliminary hearing on those charges on July 27, it was reported.

The upcoming hearing was scheduled during a Thursday preliminary status hearing in district court. According to the new charges, Ewing allegedly viewed child pornography in October and November of 2014 and in January and July of 2015. Kansas law prohibits the promotion or possession of such images and videos where the subject being filmed is under the age of 18.

According to court docuents. District Court Judge Norbert Marek also recently ruled on a series of motions filed by prosecuting and defense attorneys in advance of an upcoming trial, set to begin on June 26, that included granting a motion from the State of Kansas to allow "violent pornography" and "links to violent pornographic websites"

as evidence against Ewing. In the two court cases that are being tried in June, Ewing has been charged with rape and aggravated criminal sodomy against two different women. Prosecutors alleged that Ewing, after allegedly watching hours of "violent pornography," was "said to have replicated" violent acts from the pornographic materials with the two women.

"The relevance of this evidence could prove motive, intent, preparation, plan, knowledge or identity," Marek wrote in his ruling allowing the por-nographic material to be used as evidence. "This evidence is relevant and its probative value is not outweighed by the potential for undue prejudice."

Special prosecutor Jacqie Spradling, who alleged that Ewing watched violent pornographic videos for four hours a day, listed as possible evidence information from 10 such videos that Spradling said could be used as evidence against Ewing. Marek said seven of the videos were admissible as evidence in the recent ruling.

Ewing, who was acquitted of child sex charges in an April trial, will also face trials in August and October. He currently remains in custody at the Jackson County Detention Center.
