RV proposing 2.247-mill cut

■ 2017-18 budget hearing set for Aug. 21

 The Royal Valley Board of Education is proposing a 2.247 mill decrease for the 2017-18 school year.

During a special board meeting on Thursday at the district office in Mayetta, board members present agreed to propose a budget funded by 45.158 mills, which is down from the 47.405 mills used to fund last year's budget. The board budgeted 47.897 mills during the 2015-16 school year.

"Taxpayers are going to see about a two mill decrease this year from the supplemental general fund," said Superintendent Aaric Davis.

The new proposed budget includes levying 20 mills for the general fund, 17.158 mills for the Local Option Budget (LOB) and 8 mills for capital outlay.

Davis said one of the biggest changes to the budget this year is that funds for KPERS (the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System) are no longer flowing through the district's general fund like last year.

The district's supplemental general fund is being reduced by \$100,480, from \$2,287,502 to \$2,187,022.

"We knew this was coming because of the reduction in enrollment," Davis said, noting that the district is down 60 students.

The proposed budget includes \$1,380,000 in possible expenditures in capital outlay for the school year.

"We're not necessarily going to spend that much, but we'll have the authority to do so," he said.

Williams trades school psychology for pulpit

 Kathy Williams is the new pastor of Holton First United Methodist Church.

Pastor Williams began her appointment here on July 1 and for the past three years, she served as an associate pastor at First United Methodist Church in Lawrence.

A native of Wichita, she's also served at churches in Topeka and Emporia.

Williams served as a school psychologist for 20 years before deciding to pursue ministry full time.

She has a psychology degree from Kansas State University and a master's degree in school psychology from Emporia State University.

"I've always been active in church, and I feel like God's been calling me for a long time," Williams said. "As a school psychologist, I worked with families who had children that were disabled. In that moment when you're working with families, they are so fragile and they're trying to understand why."

Delinquent tax list included

The Jackson County Delinquent Tax List for 2016 is published on pages 8-11 in this edition of *The Holton Recorder* and contains the names of Jackson County property owners with balances past due on real estate taxes due earlier this year. The list will be published in three consecutive Monday editions of *The Recorder*.

The first half of the taxes were due last December, and the second half were due in May.

The total amount of taxes past due in the county is approximately \$265,000, according to Jackson County Treasurer Linda Gerhardt.

Last year, a total of \$281,159 in back taxes were being sought.

Purple Heart Profiles

Mzhickteno survived World War II wounds

Editor's note: This is the 64th in a series of stories about past and present Jackson County residents who earned the Purple Heart Medal, which is awarded to military personnel wounded or killed in the line of duty.

The names of those profiled in these stories are among those placed on a special monument for Purple Heart Medal recipients now standing in Holton's Linscott Park.

Before LeRoy Mzhickteno of Mayetta — who preferred to go by the nickname "Mickey" — left the Jackson County area to fight in World War II in Europe, he made sure to take a little "Indian tobacco" with him for good luck.

"It gave me courage, you might say," Mzhickteno said in a 2005 video interview for the Veterans History Project. "It's good medicine, even though you can't pinpoint what it does to you. It's not like medicine you take to get well or something like that. It's just security."

By the fall of 1944, the tobacco had run out, or so Mzhickteno said in regard to the wounds he received when shrapnel from an exploding German shell got lodged in his back. But he survived the wounds and would go on to lead a long life back home in northeast Kansas after the war came to an end a year later.

Born Oct. 16, 1918, on the Prairie Band Potawatomi Reservation, the son of William and Ona Jane Seeley Mzhickteno, "Mickey" grew up on the reservation during the years of the Great Depression, getting his early education at Grand Prairie School before graduating from Mayetta High School.

In the spring of 1939, Mzhickteno joined the Kansas National Guard "to get some money," he said, because times were still hard, and even though his service didn't amount to more than "a few bucks a month," every little bit helped. He was a member of the Guard's Company E.

5 Years Ago

Week of Aug. 6-12, 2012
Two new pastors have been appointed to Evangel United Methodist Church of Holton, it has been announced. Dennis Paschke began serving as the church's head pastor at the beginning of July, and as of Aug. 1, Hector Sanchez is the church's new associate pastor, as well as the head pastor of Nueva Vida, the church's Spanish-speaking congregation.

Longtime Jackson County residents and volunteers Virginia Albright and Doris Foster were celebrated during this year's Jackson County Fair for their years of 4-H leadership and promotion for being named grand marshals of this year's fair parade.

The second-annual Jackson County Gypsies 4-H club's "Barnyard Bingo" fund-raiser during the Jackson County Fair parade was a resounding success, club members reported. The 4-H Gypsies sold about 100 pieces of chalk. The streets around Holton's Town Square and Fifth Street from the Square to the Fair Building were covered in chalk drawings. Jerry and JoAnn Nelson and family were the only winners this year, taking home \$50 after one of the Gypsies' horses left a mark on the family's chalk square on Fifth Street near Dakota Avenue.

The sweet sound of jazz music will fill the air in Holton on Saturday, Sept. 15, as Holton Main Street presents "Jazz on the Square." The event will feature Grammy-winning jazz trumpeter Jim Seeley, a Holton native. According to Holton Main Street director Bob Carlson, "This event will be unlike anything we've ever done in this town before."

The town of Denison is getting ready to celebrate its 125th birthday, it has been announced. Planning for the celebration, which will take place on Sept. 8, began in October 2011.

10 Years Ago

Week of Aug. 6-12, 2007
After spending the past three years living in Shawnee, Wichita and Kansas City, Josh and Sarrah Moulin say they are ready to settle down in Holton and work at a community hospital. Sarrah began working at Holton Community Hospital at the end of May as a physical therapist, and Josh recently finished his preceptorship at HCH and will begin working full time after he receives his temporary license.

15 Years Ago

Week of Aug. 6-12, 2002
Jackson County native Lynn Jenkins received overwhelming support as the Republican candidate for the state treasurer post, receiving 1,226 votes from Jackson County Republicans (and winning the state election).

A trooper from the Kansas Highway Patrol explained the purpose of the agency's helicopter during a day camp hosted by the Jackson County Sheriff's Department. About 100 youngsters attended the day camp, many more than organizers had anticipated. During the two days, the youth learned about the workings of the sheriff's department, Kansas Highway Patrol, ambulance service and Kansas Fish and Game.

Jackson Heights' multi-sport talent Matt Hundley broke the school and Delaware Valley League high jump records, as well as earning all-state honors in both football and basketball. After getting some interest from the KU football program, Hundley signed at Baker.

25 Years Ago

Week of Aug. 6-12, 1992
Kathy Mick of Holton was elected to the position of county clerk after the primary election on Tuesday, Aug. 4, it was re-

ported. Mick was victorious over first-term incumbent Karen Parrett of Denison.

Within three weeks, lights that are on order should arrive in Holton and be installed on the city's two volleyball courts at Rafter's Park, according to local attorney Mike Ireland. Ireland and a group of local businessmen combined to ensure that area youths will have a socially acceptable means of entertainment during the evening hours in Holton.

The Rev. Stephen Cappleman of Holton, pastor of the Lakeview Faith Chapel, will leave for a missions trip to the former Soviet Union later this month, it has been announced. The church, located along U.S. Highway 75 in Holton, was organized in 1983 and constructed almost entirely by members of the congregation. Cappleman's trip was part of a tour dubbed "To Russia With Love," a non-denominational effort to deliver not only a basic message of salvation, but also Bibles.

Holton senior lineman Michael Sawyer set four new records and was just two pounds away from setting a fifth at the recent 1992 Holton Lift-A-Thon. Sawyer's new marks in the bench press (350 pounds), incline press (315) and dead lift (526) helped him amass a total-pound score of 1,945. His 760-pound squad was just one pound less than Mike Uhl's new record in that event. Uhl finished second overall, while Chris Gross and Heath Williams finished third and fourth, respectively.

A former Congressman's advice on conversing with elected officials

Do ordinary citizens still have a voice in Washington and in their state capitals? Despite the cynicism of these times, my answer is, yes, we do... But we have to exercise it.

I don't just mean going to a town hall meeting and yelling, or shooting off a letter or e-mail.

I mean making an appointment to sit down with your representative — in his or her office, at a cafe in the district, or wherever else you can meet — and holding a real conversation.

We don't do this often enough in our country, perhaps because most people think it's impossible to arrange. It's not, although it might take patience to get an appointment with a busy representative. And to my mind, it's the most effective way for citizens to communicate with their representatives.

This is important because the heart of a representative democracy does not lie in its electorate, or even its elected officials. It rests in the communication between them, in the give and take that allows each to understand the other.

Over my years in office, I noticed a few things about how to make this conversation more fruitful and effective, and, for what it's worth, I pass them along.

My guess is that in almost all cases, the representative will be gracious, attentive and welcoming; he or she will see the meeting as a chance to reach out and perhaps win a constituent's support. What makes the difference in these meetings is the manner in which the voter approaches them.

So my first comment is that you want to keep the discussion respectful and polite. Incivility and confrontation are counterproductive.

If you want to have an impact, do not be argumentative or confrontational. Explain how the issues affect you personally and make it clear that you're seeking to establish ongoing communication, not just a 'one and done' meeting.

If your representative comes to respect you because of your approach and your knowledge, that's an important step forward in expanding your influence.

Because don't forget that the reverse can also be true: You'll make it easy to ignore you by behaving ungraciously.

This next part may seem daunting, but it shouldn't be: Do your homework.

It goes without saying that you should identify yourself and whoever else is with you, let your representative know whom you're representing — don't exaggerate your numbers — and above all, make it very clear what you want him or her to do or not to do.

And you'll be far more effective if you're well-informed about the core facts on the issues and about the person you're speaking to: his or her party, length of service, committees, interests, views, ratings and priorities.

Understand that legislators deal with many challenging relationships: voters, donors, constituents, interest groups, party officials, congressional or legislative leadership, governors and presidents, and an array of others.

So, listen carefully and ask a lot of questions, and get clarity about where your representative stands on your issues and why. Test his or her knowledge of the issues, and the depth of commitment to the views he or she takes.

Be firm in insisting on direct answers, but don't be adamant or unreasonable. If you want to, record the session, but be sure to advise the representative you are doing so.

In short, having a productive conversation with elected representatives comes down to being informed, remaining courteous, being curious and open to dialogue yourself, and stating your views and understanding of the issues as clearly as possible.

If you engage in this fashion with your representatives on a regular basis, I think you'll have reason to be satisfied that you're stepping up to your responsibilities and raising your effectiveness as a citizen.

And if conversations of this quality are multiplied across the country, it really will improve the quality of our representative democracy and contribute to the direction and success of our country.

Silver Haired Legislature report is given

The executive board of the Kansas Silver Haired Legislature held its mid-summer issues meeting on Wednesday, July 26, in Salina.

The executive board is composed of the SHL chairperson from each of the 11 PSA (planning service area) districts across the state of Kansas, plus the officers of the overall membership of the organization.

These include the speaker, speaker pro tem, and the floor leader.

Jay Rowh, Mitchell County SHL representative, who is the president of the executive board, chaired the meeting.

PSA-9 includes the counties of Jackson, Washington, Marshall, Nemaha, Brown, Doniphan and Atchison.

In the spring and early summer, the SHL members within

each of the PSA districts meet to decide what issues are important to senior citizens in their district.

These issues are then brought to the state issues meeting, where they are discussed, debated and whittled down to a select few.

The resulting finalists will subsequently be presented to the entire SHL membership for its consideration at the annual conference in Topeka on Oct. 3-5.

A total of 28 local issues were initially brought to the executive board.

From this list, a total of eight issues were selected to be presented to the full membership in October.

Some of these issues will be forwarded as actual bills, while the remainder will be in the form of resolutions.

Four of these measures were carryovers from last year: support for Medicaid expansion; continued support for the

KDOT rural transportation program; support for the State of Kansas to fully fund KPERS as the law stipulates, and to not use KPERS funds as a "bank" for the state general fund; and urging the Kansas State Legislature to fund a Cost Of Living Allowance (COLA) for current KPERS recipients.

The four new bills and resolutions include: support for the Legislature to pass property tax relief for qualifying, low income senior citizens; repeal of the 2016 property tax lid bill which is creating difficulties for our county and city governments; an expansion of the "grandparents' rights" bill, making sure the concerns of the grandparents are considered in child custody cases; and a tightening of the current "uninsured motorists" law, thereby giving better protection to the general public when involved in an accident with someone not having vehicle liability insurance.

The next step in this process is for the entire SHL membership to discuss and debate these bills and resolutions in committee work at the annual session of the full Silver Haired Legislature this coming October in Topeka.

Those measures successfully passed out of committee will then face deliberation by the full SHL body, and if subsequently approved, will then be forwarded on to the Kansas Legislature for consideration with SHL support.

The Silver Haired Legislators represent the more than 500,000 Kansas seniors over the age of 60, most of whom vote in local, state and national elections.

The SHL is just one of the ways their collective voice can be heard.

GARDENER'S COLUMN: Lessons learned from garden

"What's that, parsley?" That was the question posed to me from a visitor to my garden.

"Celery," I said, bending down to break off a skinny, dark green rib.

I warned her that the flavor is far more potent than that of the celery found in the grocery store.

She bit into the stalk... crunch, crunch.

"This is how I remember celery tasting when I was growing up," she said, delighted. I think she said that her grandparents had grown celery.

I remember eating lots of celery growing up, too, but it came from the store.

My mom and no one I knew grew celery. However, our family's garden provided much in the way of vegetables.

At one time, it was a necessity for feeding five children. But it also provided more than nourishment.

I carry memories. I remember sitting in the garden with my siblings and eating peas fresh from the shell. They were sweet and we enjoyed the novelty of eating in the garden.

We must have eaten lots of them, or else my mom didn't plant all that many, because I don't remember shelling peas for dinner often.

My mom didn't seem to care that we ate all the peas before they made it to the table, though. In fact, she would remark that at least we were eating vegetables, and it was less work for her since she didn't have to shell them.

I still eat just-picked peas while in the garden, although they are snap peas and I don't need to shell them.

I remember plodding through soft, freshly turned soil and lifting earthy smelling potatoes that I dropped into buckets.

That wasn't as enjoyable as eating peas fresh off the vine, but I don't remember hating the chore.

I do remember hating it when my mom handed me the hoe and sent me to the garden, though. Now I can't wait to get out to the garden and weed.

After the buckets were filled with potatoes, we took them down to the root cellar where the shelves held jars of home-grown green beans and home-made wild plum jelly (the only jelly I remember my mom ever making).

I also remember going to the root cellar to gather potatoes that were shriveled and sprouting after several months in storage. I hated cutting up the rubbery things, although they tasted just fine once cooked.

I remember summer afternoons pulling husks off ears of sweet corn and digging corn earworms out from among the kernels (eww). We loved corn on the cob drenched in butter and heavily salted.

I remember biting into green apples from the trees in our backyard. We had four apple trees, a couple of Jonathans, a Delicious and a Winesap.

One of the Jonathans was a particularly good climbing tree, with low, thick branches that

emerged at a perfect angle. It was easy to climb and a great place to lounge. I spent many hours daydreaming in that tree.

No particular cultivation tips were handed down to me in those days of my youth. You just stuck seeds in the ground and they grew, so did the weeds, so you had to hoe out or pull them.

Not that our garden was ever weed free. I remember pulling large leaves much like a downy elephant's ear off of some tall plant in the garden.

I now know it is a weed called velvet leaf. We were kids. We didn't know better. We liked playing with the large, soft leaves.

So what did I learn about gardening during my early years?

I learned that you put seeds in the ground and they grow. It's simple.

That's the important lesson -- I can do it. Given some soil and seeds I can grow food. That's all I needed to learn. So when I had my own a bit of ground to cultivate, I didn't hesitate; I made a garden.

Having a garden while growing up made it familiar, common, something everyone did.

Raising gardens goes back generations in my family. My grandparents had gardens. My great-grandparents grew food. It's what everybody did. So I continue the tradition. In some ways, my garden keeps me in touch with my ancestors.

Will that tradition end with me? My son is not an avid gardener, but having grown up

watching me stick seeds in the ground he seems to have inherited the "I can grow food" mentality. He has been known to fearlessly stick seeds and plants in the ground.

What are his memories of my gardens, though, simply avoiding the weeding that I'd asked him to do?

I also wonder what garden memories my grandchildren will call to mind in 10, 20, 30 years?

Picking and eating berries on our farm, most certainly. So far they haven't taken much interest in any of the vegetables I grow.

They're more interested in playing capture the flag and running through the cedar trees. But there's time yet. I just have to get them out here when the snap peas are in production. There's something about peas in the garden that builds memories.

They're probably more likely to be affected by their parents' gardens than by mine. I'm trying to help my step daughter in her gardening efforts, offering my extra tomato plants and occasional advice. So her children will have more memories of her efforts than mine.

But when that spark ignites in any of the grandkids at some future date, I'll be there to support the knowledge that yes, they can grow food. You just stick seeds in the ground and they grow. It's simple.

It was truly a night of wonderful entertainment.

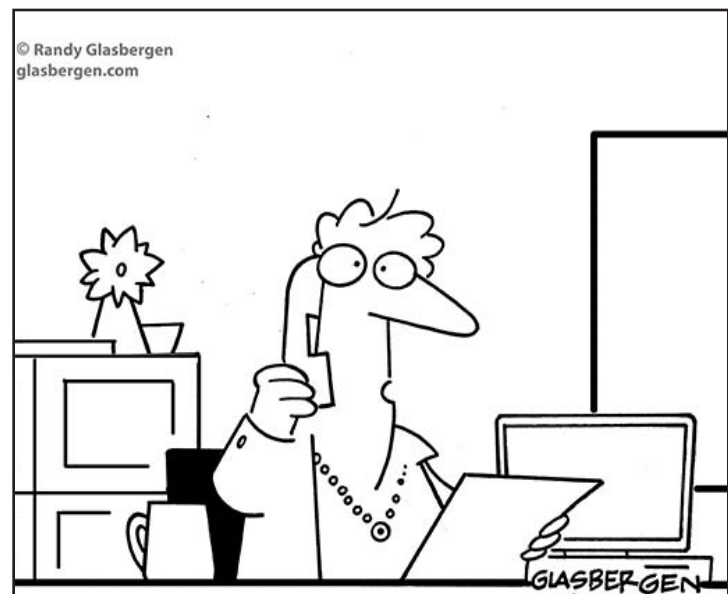
I enjoyed the featured entertainer, Brian Bausch, and his beautiful black stallion. The involving of so many children in different events was good.

Corn silage is "king of the roughages"

It's one of those calls you don't want to get: "How much is droughty corn worth for silage?"

Unfortunately, the spotty rains have meant crop failure for some and cheap feed for others.

The old rule of thumb is that corn forage is six to six and a half times the price of a bushel of corn standing in the field.



a quarter to two pounds daily growth gain.

Corn silage is a safe feed. It works well for starting cattle on feed. Cattle are easily changed from corn silage to a high-grain finishing ration. Corn silage is often used to furnish minimum roughage levels in high-grain finishing rations.

Harvest the corn plant at a stage of maturity that produces silage with 30 to 40 percent dry matter. Corn should be harvested for silage after the grain is well dented but before the leaves turn brown and dry.

There is no advantage for corn silage with more than 35 percent dry matter with respect to the nutrients produced per acre, digestibility of the silage or in the dry matter consumed daily by beef cattle.

The maximum percentage of grain in the silage is reached at a stage of maturity that corresponds to 35 percent dry matter silage. Further increases in dry matter of the silage are due to moisture lost from the corn plant as it matures.

The ideal moisture level depends somewhat on the type of silo used. Nutrients are lost in the drainage from a silo. Little seepage will occur from horizontal silos or small tower silos when dry matter levels range from 30 to 35 percent. There may be some seepage even when 35 percent dry matter silage is stored in large tower silos (30 feet by 70 feet).

Water should be added to forage with more than 50 percent dry matter to prevent the formation of tobacco-brown silage. Cut corn silage half an inch to three-quarters of an inch long, irrespective of maturity and moisture level.

Corn silages vary in their nutrient content. One of the biggest variables is the percent moisture in corn silage.

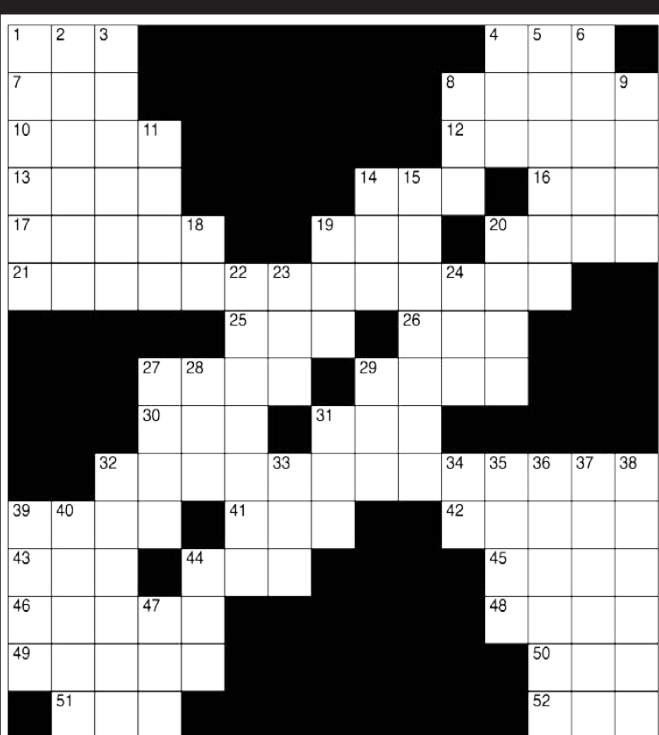

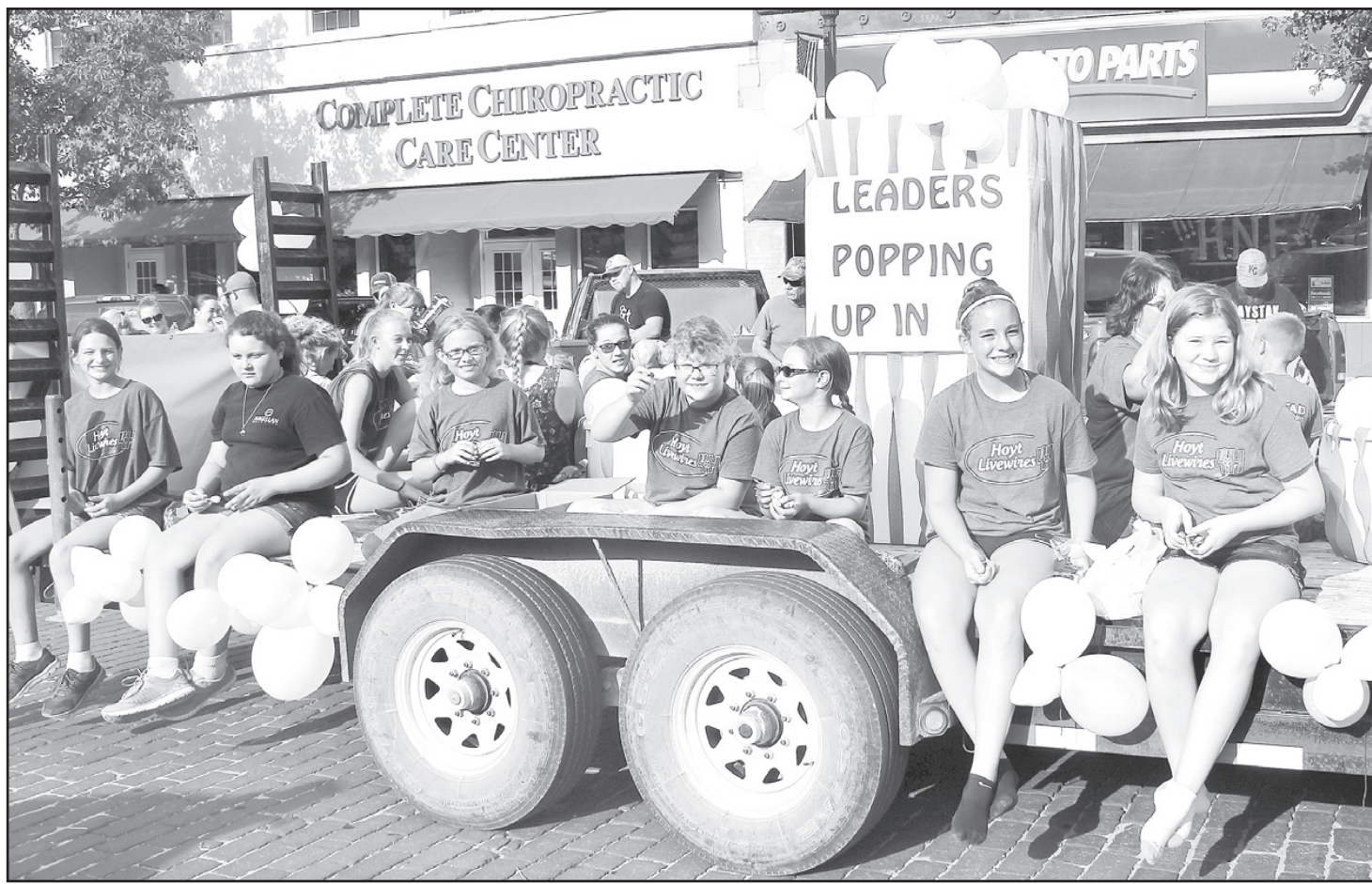

If HCH purchases the medical clinic part of the building, then it would become owner of the building along with owners of the Medical Pharmacy and Holton Dental business, also located in the building, it was reported. The monthly management up-

date included the following:
 * The nominating committee has interviewed two community members for potential board or subcommittee appointments, it was reported.
 * Potential annual savings have been researched by contracting with Stormont Vail for reference lab services.
 * As a Critical Access Hospital, HCH is required to have a sponsoring hospital. A sponsoring hospital for HCH has been discussed.
 * Carrie Saia (CEO) has met with the new Holton USD 336 Superintendent Bob Davies today and HCH will be offering sports medicine services to the school district again in academic year 2017-2018.
 * Some recent marketing efforts were shared with the board.
 * The board was notified of \$3,600 in additional costs for the bulk oxygen storage tank project. It was also reported that HCH is required to have a protective barrier around the tank area.

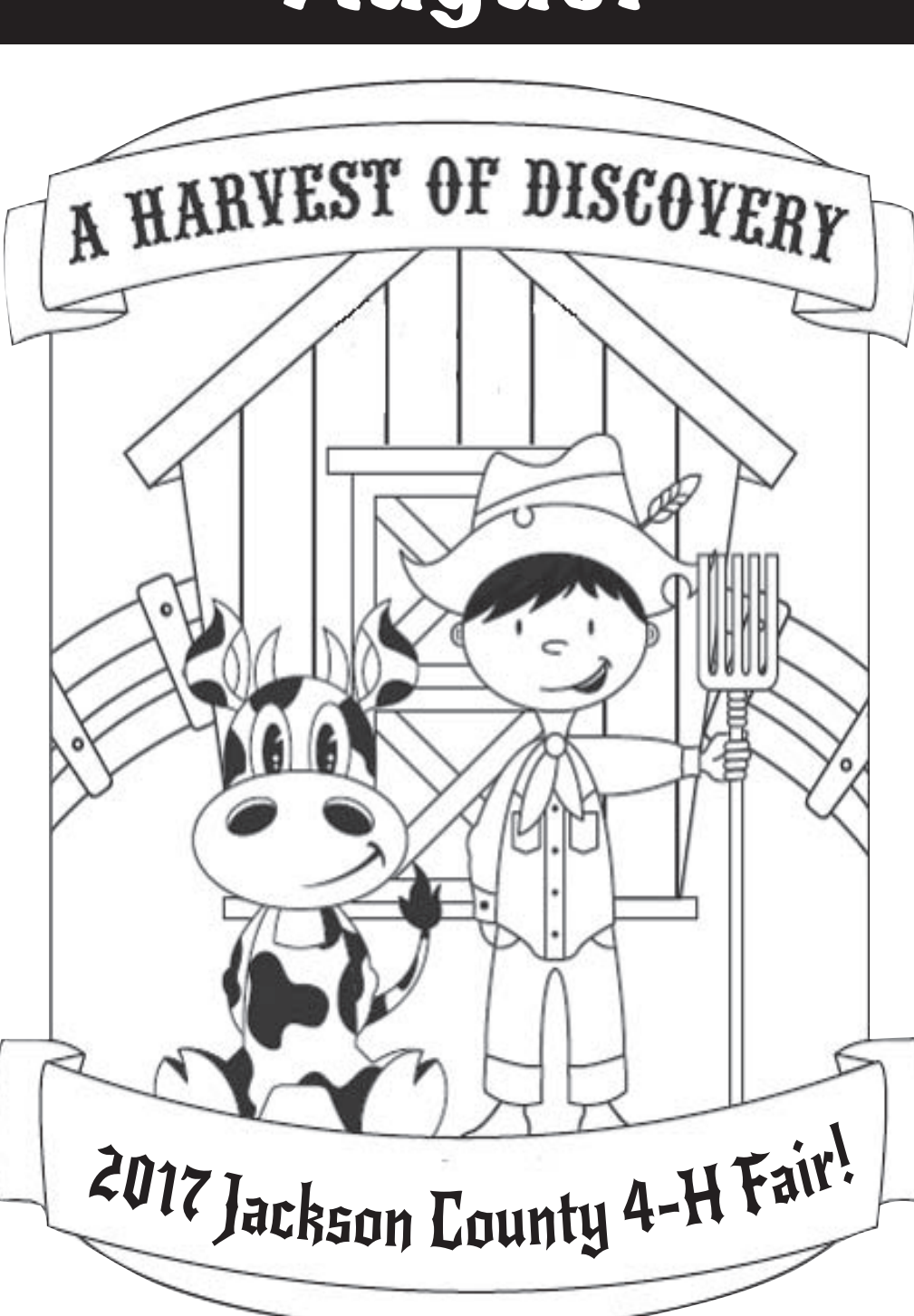

LAWN CARE

Crabgrass prevention planning starts now

Isn't it great when even just a little rain really greens up the lawn? Especially after a period of hot, dry weather? Only then do you take a closer look and realize it isn't a nice fine bladed turf grass, but an infestation of crabgrass! Welcome to August!

If crabgrass is what you've got, control is likely what you are after, and by far the best way to keep it at bay is by maintaining a good, thick lawn. Crab-



grass is an annual, meaning it must come up from seed each year. Seed needs light to germinate. That means that if a lawn is thick enough that sunlight does not reach the soil, crabgrass will not germinate.

Sounds easy, right? Not in Kansas! Temperatures favor cool season grasses in spring and fall, but are definitely favorable to warm season grasses like crabgrass in summer. Because our lawns are typically stressed in summer – or even dormant – we have to take alternative methods into consideration. One of those is application of a crabgrass preventer in the spring.

Crabgrass preventers don't actually prevent germination completely, but they do kill the seed as it germinates. That means that most products do not have any effect on crabgrass that has already come up. Too late with an application of the crabgrass

preventer, and all of a sudden you can get a mess (like the one you are facing now) on your hands.

Fortunately, we also have herbicides that will kill crabgrass after it has emerged. They include products like Ortho Weed-B-Gon Max + Crabgrass Control, Bayer All-in-One Lawn Weed and Crabgrass Killer and Fertilome Weed Out with Crabgrass Killer, all of which contain the active ingredient quinclorac (the crabgrass herbicide) plus other active ingredients for control of broadleaf weeds.

Quinclorac is an excellent crabgrass killer that controls not only crabgrass but also has activity on foxtails and certain broadleaves like bindweed, black medic and clover. If by chance you are bagging the lawn and using the mulch, remember, composting does not break down quinclorac and it

can do great harm to garden plants as well.

As temperatures decline in August, cool season turfs respond and start to green up, giving crabgrass some competition – and maybe even making crabgrass a non-issue in a good stand of turf by September. The first frost will actually take it out completely.

Even so, now is the time to start thinking about prevention for next season. Multiple season long preventative type products are available that can give excellent control. Remember the value of a good, thick turfgrass stand?

September and November are the two most important cool season turf fertilization windows. Start planning your "crabgrass competitor" fertility program with a soil test now.

Stress is unhealthy for mind and body. When we experience stress or trauma, our bodies release a hormone called "cortisol." Normally, levels of this "stress hormone" are highest in the morning and decrease as the day goes on. However, those who experience chronic stress and/or have a history of trauma have smaller declines in their cortisol levels. This abnormal pattern of cortisol depletion, called a "flatter diurnal cortisol slope," has been linked to the progression of cancer, hardening of the arteries, and other diseases. Researchers have also found that a flatter diurnal cortisol slope among expectant mothers is associated with an increased risk of giving birth to lower birth weight babies. "It was always so difficult for me when I worked with them because I wanted them to know this faith that I have that helps you to be able to see things so much differently. I wanted them to know that they and their children were loved and that this disability didn't change anything about this God who loves them."

Williams said she began to realize her desire to help people feel healed and restored.

She went on to St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Mo. for seminary and graduated with a masters in divinity.

Williams said that the bishop and members of the cabinet of the Great Plains Annual Conference, which includes Kansas and Nebraska, determine pastoral appointments.

"It's a prayerful process, and they just try to match our gifts with the mission of a church," she said.

This isn't the first time Williams has been to Holton. She interviewed for a school psychology position at Holton schools several years ago.

"I interviewed here for my first school psychology job," she

said. "I was offered the job, but I didn't accept it because Emporia had already offered me a position."

Holton is the smallest community that Williams and her husband, Earl, have lived in. The couple has two children, Christopher, 25; and Alexandria, 20.

"It's different from Lawrence, but it's been wonderful," she said. "The transition has been great. Everyone has been warm and friendly. This is the first time we've lived in a neighborhood where we know our neighbors."

In her first month at the church, Williams said she's been impressed with the congregation's desire to help others.

"There's a great sense of generosity here and the realization that there are people in our community who don't have some essential needs," she said. "I would like to even deepen our church's relationship with the schools. They've been hit so hard with budget cuts."

The church is located at 1401 West Fourth St. Adults and children's Sunday School classes are held each week at 9 a.m. followed by the worship service at 10:15 a.m.

For the new school term, the district's assessed valuation has been set at \$31,858,524, up \$607,956 from last year's \$31,250,568. For the 2015-16 year, the district's valuation was \$30,100,043.

The total local taxes levied for the coming year are proposed at \$1,369,637, compared to \$1,413,269 last school year.

The district is paying off \$2,340,000 in lease purchase principal, which is down from last year's \$2,695,000.

The board approved a motion to publish the proposed budget, and it appears on page 7 of this issue of *The Holton Recorder*.

A hearing for the budget has also been set for 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 21, at the district office in Mayetta.

In other business during the special meeting, the board:

* Agreed to award core graduation credits for approved technical education courses at Washburn Tech.

* Agreed to elect Advance Insurance through Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas as the district's insurance provider for short term disability insurance, accidental death and dismemberment insurance, term life and term life insurance and voluntary life insurance.

* Agreed to hire Bailey Schultz as an early childhood

special education para, Trent Oliva as the elementary PE teacher and head baseball coach, Esther Cumpston as the RVMS assistant volleyball coach and Shannon Akin as the vocal music accompanist.

* Approved new board appointments, including Sherri Schulte as board clerk, Tammy Ruddy as board treasurer and Katie Petesch as the authorized food service representative and the representative for school nutrition.

137th Infantry Regiment, 35th Infantry Division.

Two days before Christmas 1940, it was reported, he was mustered into the U.S. Army as a private first class in Holton, and he and his company were sent to Camp Joseph T. Robinson in Little Rock, Ark., for a year's training. He was wrapping up that training when Japanese forces bombed Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

"We were just fresh out of real hard training," Mzhickteno said. "That's when they shipped us out to California."

Mzhickteno's first stop in California was at the Presidio in San Francisco, where he and others were put on guard duty because it was suspected that the Japanese would attack that city next. He and other members of his company would later be shipped down to Los Angeles for more training and guard duty.

After that, Mzhickteno was sent to Camp Rucker in Alabama for more training, then to Camp Butler in North Carolina for even more training.

"That was a little bit different, because we were getting ready to be shipped out to Europe," he said of all the extra training.

Mzhickteno then headed to New York for a few days before he would be shipped overseas,

and he experienced a significant amount of disappointment while there. First, he said, he wanted to see the Empire State Building, but was let down by the fact that much of that building was shrouded by fog.

The second big disappointment came while he was on the troop ship heading out of New York harbor toward Europe. His desire was to go up onto the ship's deck to see the Statue of Liberty, he said, but he was not allowed.

"I wanted so bad to see it," he said.

Mzhickteno and several hundred fellow soldiers spent 10 days on that troop ship crossing the Atlantic Ocean before they landed in Liverpool, England, a city he said he didn't have time to explore before he and his unit were taken by convoy to Omaha Beach in France. They landed there about a month after D-Day, but there were still reminders of the great battle that had taken place there.

"There were some sunken boats," he said. "All the fighting was gone from the beach, but you could still see evidence of how brutal it was."

Even with that battle over, he said, he still had second thoughts about going into France.

"I remember thinking, we didn't know what we were getting into," he said. "I should have stayed at home."

Mzhickteno and his fellow

soldiers saw some intense battle during the late summer of 1944 in the hedgerows of France, where he said he nearly got hit by a German mortar shell. This particular shell, he said, was supposed to have exploded on impact, but didn't.

"One of them hit right in front of me. I was by myself. And it didn't explode. It would have blew me to kingdom come," he said. "I remember thinking, oh, thank you, whoever it was that put that shell together."

Not long after that, however, his luck — and his "Indian tobacco" — ran out. Sometime during the fall of 1944, Mzhickteno was in action somewhere in France, chasing the retreating German army when one of the Germans' artillery shells exploded nearby, and shrapnel hit him in the lower part of his back.

"That shell exploded pretty close to me," he said. "I didn't know how close, but I could hear it coming. They don't make too much noise."

Even with the shrapnel in his back, Mzhickteno said he didn't feel too much pain — just an urge to get out of the area before the Germans started shelling again. All alone, he walked "maybe three or four hundred yards" to the nearest aid station for treatment, but for some reason, he was refused.

"The case wasn't severe

enough," he said.

He did, however, get treated in a number of hospitals in France and then England before he was sent back to fight in the Battle of the Bulge, where he said he saw six planeloads of casualties coming back from the first day of fighting.

Now a sergeant, Mzhickteno was returned to his own unit and put in charge of replacement troops of "all ages" who were difficult to control. These troops, he said, were more interested in confiscating the food and wine in a village they captured than in pursuing the German Army.

Mzhickteno knew better than to just blow off the retreating Germans.

"Don't ever underestimate those Germans," he recalled thinking at the time. "They were smart cookies. They had more time, more equipment, and they'd have whipped us so easily that it wouldn't have been funny."

According to a news article printed in *The Holton Recorder* in the spring of 1945, he was praised for his commitment to the cause in the dying days of the war.

"Sgt. Mzhickteno, a National Guard man, is a squad leader in the Light Machine Gun section, and has been since the trying days in the St. Lo campaign," it was reported. "Sgt. Mzhickteno is a very cool leader in the thick of the fight and he's a natural born leader."

Mzhickteno was discharged on Oct. 20, 1945, returning to northeastern Kansas and moving to Lawrence, working at FMC for more than 40 years. He moved back to the Potawatomi reservation in his later years.

On Sunday, Dec. 13, 2009, LeRoy "Mickey" Mzhickteno died at his home near Mayetta. He was buried in the tribe's Danceground Cemetery.

Fatality accident investigated

This morning, Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse reported that the Jackson County Sheriff's Office was investigating a traffic fatality accident that occurred shortly before 6 a.m. approximately half mile north of Kansas Highway 16 on M Road, three miles west of Holton.

Morse said the vehicle appeared to have been traveling northbound when it crossed onto the west side of the roadway, rolled and landed back on its wheels.

Upon arrival, deputies found the only occupant and driver deceased. The name of the driver had not been released by press time. The cause of the accident remains under investigation.
