HHS graduates 61 seniors

Those were the words of Holton High School summa cum laude graduate AJ

Haussler, whose speech during last Saturday's HHS commencement ceremony began with a focus on one particular member of his family — his father, HHS social sciences teacher Kurt Haussler.

Scholar, the younger Haussler was allowed to honor a teacher whose influence on his life had the most impact. And even though he said he only had one class with his father as a teacher during his high school years, the elder Haussler taught him much more than he could learn in school.

"He's taught me more than just American history lessons and interesting facts about Teddy Roosevelt," AJ Haussler said of his father. "Most importantly, he has taught me to chase my dreams and never look back. This man has told me from a young age that no matter the circumstances, he will always be proud to call me his son."

With that, the elder Haussler stepped to the podium, and a father-and-son embrace was have and will continue to have cheered by those present to witness the passing of 61 HHS seniors from their high school years into the adult world and, in many cases, away from each other.

"This is where our paths deviate from each other," senior deviate from each other," senior class vice president Mason on personal opinion," Strader Chanay said in his ceremony- said. "There is no rule book closing speech. "Whether it's or specific code to being or straight into the work force, go and meet new people, see new places and make new memories, but most importantly, just be kind."

The theme of family was prevalent in the opening speech by class president Ashlyn Robinson, who noted that the graduating class, to her, was "a second family."

"The majority of us have been together since kindergarten," Robinson said. "We have been through many of the same struggles and have witnessed many of the same strange things. We know each other's strengths and there is no doubt we have seen each other's flaws. And while we may not always get along with one another, you know without a doubt that we

each other's backs."

Magna cum laude graduate Mason Strader focused his speech on the success that all graduates have the power to achieve, however they individually define it.

me here has what it takes to be successful, because it's all based on what you want your success

On the other hand, Haussler warned his classmates that there will be times that "you will fail." But those instances, he said, are opportunities for growth, as he has noted through his four years of playing high school sports.

"Failure is inevitable, and we will all experience failure more often than we will experience success," he said. "But just like with success, you cannot be afraid to fail... Without failure, we would never learn or grow."

Strader, like Haussler, also advised his fellow graduates to keep their families in mind.

Revitalization program discussed at city meeting

A group of Holton citizens with an interest in economic development in the city met with the Holton City Commission on Monday to ask what can be done to revive the Jackson County Neighborhood Revitalization Plan of years

The city's response: Talk to Jackson County officials

"We would elect as a city to participate in the revitalization plan. We've done it when they offered it to us before," said Holton City Manager Kerwin McKee of a tax-abatement program for new and rehabili-

tated properties that had been developed in the 1990s and offered by county officials but came to an end at the turn of the decade.

The economic development group, led by local contractor Mark Aeschliman, asked the city to consider working with the county to reinstate the program, which would promote the construction of new housing and rehabilitation of existing housing as an incentive to draw business and industry professionals to Holton along with their businesses and industries.

"A Tribute to Bob Brown: The Music Man" will open Friday at the museum, 327 New York Ave., and will include almost 100 photographs and pieces of memorabilia from Brown's career at HHS.

Brown, who will celebrate his 70th class reunion this coming weekend as a member of the HHS Class of 1948, spent 24 years as the vocal music teacher at Holton High, touching the lives of many local stu-

Born in Holton in 1930, Brown, now 88, was always

"I used to tap dance when I was young with a little soprano voice," Brown said.

After high school, Brown graduated from Bethany College before serving in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict. He then received a master's degree in music education from The University of

His first teaching job was at Onaga schools in 1955 where his salary was \$3,600 a year. He met his wife, Marilyn, during this time.

Since there was a shortage of music teachers, Brown taught at Soldier and Havensville schools before he began working at his alma mater in 1967 as the vocal music teacher. He retired in 1991.



The late '60s: a time of school consolidations

In The Holton Recorder's previous "Glory Days" sections, alumni from Jackson County's nine schools and from Wetmore have had the opportunity to feature their 50-year composite photos from their graduating classes.

However, in the late 1960s, smaller rural schools in Jackson County began the process of

consolidating into larger unified school districts, and as a result, the Glory Days editions, in the future, will eventually feature 50-year composite photos from just four schools — Holton, Jackson Heights, Royal Valley and Wetmore.

Anna Wilhelm of the Jackson County Historical Society reported that schools in the four Jackson Heights communities began to combine their high school classes in 1968. Netawaka and Whiting combined their schools, while Circleville and Soldier combined their schools, and all four combined to produce Jackson Heights'

first graduating class in 1970. Hoyt and Mayetta high schools consolidated into the

Royal Valley district in the fall of 1971, Wilhelm said. The first Panther senior class graduated in the spring of 1972.

Denison High School's last

year was 1969, and at that time, the school's students began attending Holton schools, Wilhelm noted. Delia's last graduating class was in 1966, it was



1968: Year of triumphs, tragedies

This 2018 Glory Days edition of *The Holton Recorder* is dedicated to the great local classes of 1968 that are celebrating their 50th year class reunions this year.

1968 was a year of great triumphs and tragedies in the United States. While America reached new heights by introducing the first 747 and orbiting the moon, all was not well down on Earth.

The United States lost a Navy intelligence ship and two proponents of peace - the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and Robert F. Kennedy.

Some of the best pop and country music of all time was playing on the radios in 1968. Songs like "Folsom Prison Blues" by Johnny Cash, "Wichita Lineman" by Glen Campbell, "Magic Carpet Ride" by Steppenwolf, "A Beautiful Morning" by The Rascals, "Hey Jude" by the Beatles, "Green Tambourine" by the Lemon Pipers and "Mrs. Robinson" by Simon and Garfunkel filled the airwaves.

The mini-skirt had officially arrived in 1968 and who could forget the great muscle cars from 1968 - the Road Runner, Mustang GT500, Camaro, Corvette, Grand Prix, GTO and others?

Here are eight events that made history during 1968.

1. Jan. 23: North Korea captures the USS Pueblo. When North Korea captured the American surveillance ship USS Pueblo, it sparked an 11-month crisis that threatened to worsen already high Cold War tensions in the region.

The North Korean military boarded the Pueblo, captured its crew and brought the ship to port in North Korea. The Pueblo's 82 surviving crew members reported that while in custody, they were held at a POW camp where they were tortured and starved.

After months of negotiations, North Korea agreed to free the crewmen after the United States acknowledged that the Pueblo had been spying and promised not to spy in the future. On Dec. 23, the crew was allowed to safely return to South Korean territory. Immediately, the U.S. retracted its acknowledgments. The crew was home in time for Christmas. But the USS Pueblo remains in North Korean cus-

2. Jan. 30: North Vietnam launches the Tet Offensive against the United States and South Vietnam.

In many ways, the bloody Tet Offensive signified the beginning of the end of U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War.

coordinated attack by 85,000 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese targeted 36 major cities and towns in South Vietnam. It caught U.S.-led forces by surprise.

Named after the Vietnamese Lunar New Year, Tet was a holi-

day during which the North and South had previously observed an informal truce.

U.S. and South Vietnamese forces eventually regained control of the communities they lost during Tet. Nevertheless, it became a wake-up call for Americans back home, who began withdrawing their support for the war.

3. April 4: Martin Luther King Jr. assassinated in Memphis, Tenn.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was standing on the second floor balcony of Room 306 at the Lorraine Motel when he was struck by a bullet at 6:01 p.m.

The 39-year-old civil rights leader was rushed to nearby St. Joseph's Hospital but never regained consciousness. He was pronounced dead at 7:05 p.m.

King's fellow civil rights pioneers made public pleas for a nonviolent response to honor his memory. But riots broke out in more than 100 cities across the nation.

Two months later, James Earl Ray was captured at London's Heathrow Airport. Fingerprints that had been traced back to Ray linked him to the crime. He confessed but later attempted to recant. Then he pleaded guilty to avoid the possibility of a death sentence. Later Ray tried to withdraw his guilty plea and obtain a new trial.

On the night King was assassinated, Democratic presidential candidate Robert F. Kennedy arrived in Indianapolis on a campaign stop. Upon hearing the news, Kennedy informed a crowd of listeners about King's death. They reacted with gasps and cries. Kennedy urged the crowd against bitterness, hatred or revenge. He called on them to embrace King's message of love, wisdom and compassion toward one another. Kennedy's speech is believed to have prevented rioting in Indianapolis

Just two months later, Kennedy himself was gunned down by an assassin at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles.

The attack took place shortly after Kennedy had wrapped up a speech in the hotel ballroom. As he cut through a kitchen corridor on his way to another part of the building, a Jordanian born Palestinian named Sirhan Sirhan opened fire, hitting Ken-

nedy in the head and back. Kennedy collapsed and was rushed to the hospital, where he underwent brain surgery. Twenty-six hours after the

Kennedy died. He was 42. Convicted of the murder in 1969, his death sentence was commuted to life in prison in 1972. Sirhan remains in a California prison.

Carlos, who had raised his

left fist, said the gesture was a display of black unity and that the two men's fists combined had created an arch of unity and

Two days later, Smith and Carlos were expelled from Team USA. When they returned home, they were hailed as heroes by members of the African-American community.

7. Nov. 22: "Star Trek" airs American television's first interracial kiss.

In an episode of TV's original "Star Trek" entitled "Plato's Stepchildren," the crew aboard the Starship Enterprise became enslaved by humanoid Platonians, who possessed a telekinetic ability to force them to do anything the Platonians wanted them to.

Enterprise Capt. James Kirk, a white man played by William Shatner, kissed Nichelle Nichols' character, Lt. Nyota Uhura, a black woman.

8. Dec. 24: Apollo 8 is the first manned spacecraft to orbit the moon.

On Christmas Eve, three astronauts circled the moon 10 times. Jim Lovell, Bill Anders and Frank Borman became the first human beings to travel to the moon.

Launched from the Kennedy Space Center, Apollo 8 was a mission of firsts: the first photos of Earth taken from deep space by humans, including the now iconic "Earthrise" photos; the first time the lunar surface was broadcast on live television; and the first time humans had traveled to the far side of the moon.

PLAINS FOLK: Living in a yurt

By Jim Hoy

Central Asian nomads live in dwellings that Mongolia call gers and Kyrgyz call yurts.

Like the tepees of Plains Indians, yurts are portable, but they are larger and more complicated to erect and take down.

Rather than conical, like a tepee, a yurt is round with a conical roof, and it is much larger than a tepee with walls around five feet in height and a diameter of anywhere from 30 to 50 feet (at least the ones we

Instead of being constructed of hide, a yurt is made of felt, often with a canvas covering.

On two nights during our trip, Josh and I slept in commercial yurts. That is, yurts intended to be rented for the night to tourists like us, something like getting a room in a Hampton Inn.

We saw many clusters of what I called yurt motels, with anywhere from half a dozen to 15 or more in

Some had wooden floors and some had rugs or carpets on the ground with grass growing between

One of the yurt motels we stayed in cooked and served meals in an adjacent wooden building while in the other there was one yurt for the kitchen and another one for dining, at which all guests would be served a set menu communally.

The two yurts we stayed in each had three beds, plenty of quilts for the cold nights, and a stove for heat-

They were decorated with brightly colored cloths and pictures hanging from the walls. Fuel for the stove was the standard nomad fuel of dried animal dung.

As we rode through the mountains we saw many large storage piles of fuel. In each of our yurt stavs a maid (or whatever her title would be) came in just after dark and started a fire in our stove, which produced plenty of heat and a not

chip fire in a Great Plains soddy would have kept a pioneer family

Experience

One of our yurts had a wooden door mounted on a wooden frame while the door of the other was a heavy cloth that was rolled up to open and unrolled to close.

Shoes are removed outside or just inside the door. The right side of a yurt interior is the woman's territory, the left side the man's.

On one night and early morning of our trek we had an opportunity to be inside a nomad's, not a tourist's, yurt. The wind that evening had made it impossible to pitch our cooking and dining tents, so our guide arranged for our cook to fix supper and breakfast in a nearby family's yurt.

Our smaller, lower-roofed tent was set up near the door of the yurt, next to a wooden pole to which the husband tied his saddled horse for the night. The rest of our group camped out on the ground about a quarter of a mile away.

That evening we watched as the husband drove his flock of sheep and goats into a small square pen, his small son (maybe six years old) running from side to side to push the overflow of animals back so that his father could push them through

We didn't think there was any way they could all fit inside, but they did with a little room to spare.

Nearby was the area where this pen had previously stood, the area covered a few inches deep with dry, compacted "fuel" ready to be cut into chunks and stacked. The inside of this yurt was filled

with the family's possessions. We ate at a low table while sitting on the floor. The kitchen stove, cabinet, and other cooking things were on the right side, the heating stove just inside the yurt's felt door. Our cook, however, had set up his portable propane camp stove to

the left of the door. We ate both supper that evening and breakfast the next morning in the yurt, which was much warmer than our tent! It was really interesting to have

this close-up experience with some of the Kyrgyz nomads, even if we couldn't have a conversation beyond gestures and smiles.

Josh and I were up fairly early the next morning, but the horse outside our tent was gone, as were the sheep and goats. Obviously, the husband was already out on the steppe with his flock.

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

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

Haussler, a recent HHS graduate, posted an 81 score to tie for 35th at the Class 4A golf tournament at Emporia, while Royal Valley High School junior Corey Humpert posted a 101 score to place 77th at the Class 3A golf tournament at Seneca's Spring Creek Golf Course. Both state tournaments were held on

At Émporia Municipal Golf Course, Haussler started off with a rough patch on the back nine, going two over par on the first three holes, but rebounded with a pair of birdies and shooting for par on three of the remaining holes to finish five over par.

Haussler started the front nine with a birdie, but hit a series of bogeys to finish the front links at five over par, finishing with an 81 score on the par-71 course. His score put him into a four-way tie with Chanute's Kobe Chance, Anderson County's Carson Powelson and Wamego's Anthony Sramek for 35th place in a field of

Haussler'sperformanceatEmporia marked the fourth straight year that he competed at the state level, and he had also medaled in every regular season tournament in both his junior and senior years, it was reported.

Meanwhile, at Seneca, RVHS golf coach Willie McClane noted that Humpert ran into some trouble

on the front nine, going three over par on two holes and six over par on a third hole.

"There were a couple of holes that he made some tough decisions on, and he tried to get out of them," Coach McClane said of Humpert. "Overall, if you take away those three holes, he

played a pretty good round."
Humpert's 101 score put him into a tie with Sterling's Wyatt Schmidt for 77th place out of a field of 104 golfers, capping a junior year that McClane said represented a growth year for the young golfer.
"He's gro

"He's growing up and maturing," McClane said. "Last year and in his freshman year, he was taking a while to shake off his mistakes before moving on to the next hole. But he's going to be moving into a leadership role next

McClane said that despite his team's struggles, Royal Valley 'had a really good group of kids this year" out for golf. In addition to Humpert, he also looks to junior Charlotte Rooks to move into a leadership role next year, while senior DJ Kester, who accompanied Humpert to the Class 3A regional tournament, moves on.

"DJ struggled a few times here and there this year, and even though he's a senior, you can see the youth in him where he still struggles with a hole and it takes him the next hole or two to calm back down," McClane said of Kester. "But I hope he continues to play. I'm glad he was part of

NEK-CAP, Inc. has announced that Debby Davis is retiring from the organization on June 1 after 33 years of employment.



Before he brought musical productions to HHS, Brown and Ed Hayes put together several youth productions during the summers in the late 1960s and early 1970s under the name "Fun City."

The first musical put on by "Fun City" was "Bye Bye Birdie," and the costume worn by Dennis Ireland, who played Conrad Birdie in that production, will be on display at the museum, as well as the costume worn during the HHS production of the same musical

Brown directed and choreographed 16 musicals during his tenure at HHS, including "West Side Story," "Guys And Dolls," "South Pacific" and "Sugar."

Programs and photos of the musicals will be shown as part of the museum exhibit.

Besides musicals, from his place behind the piano, Brown directed mixed choirs – up to 250 students at one point – and started the Notables, the HHS show choir, which traveled and performed around the state. He also directed other special groups, such as the Pop Chorus, the Hi-Lo's and quartets.

"I didn't have many free nights," Brown said. "It was a 24-hour job, but it was fun."

Photos of several of the show choirs, as well as several show choir dresses, will be available to view at the museum.

A quilt made of t-shirts from the many musical productions will be on display. The quilt was made by the Browns' daughter, Lezlee Heryford. The couple, who have been married for almost 61 years, have two other children, Bryce Brown and Liza Zimmerman.

Some of Brown's several awards will be available to view at the museum. Brown was inducted into the Holton/ Jackson County Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame in 2009, and in 1988, he was named Holton High School's Alumnus of the Year.

"I was humbled," Brown said when members of the Jackson County Historical Society told him they wanted to highlight his career at the museum. "The public has been very good to

For 65 years, up until the fall of 2016, Brown played organ each Sunday at Holton's First

United Methodist Church. "Music is so good for people," Brown said. "You can't take that away from you.'

Aeschliman commissioners that in light of comments made to him about building new houses in the area, which can be a "very expensive" undertaking, he wanted to know if the city would be willing to make incentives for potential homeowners who were willing to move to Holton and "not do things the cookie-cutter way" when it comes to housing.

Such an incentive, Aeschliman and others noted, would be similar to the Neighborhood Revitalization Program, which, under the county's auspices, provided a "progressive" tax abatement to property owners making improvements that raised the appraised value of their respective properties for a set period of time, after which the city would receive the full benefit of property taxes.

Others, such as Holton resident Brooks Barta, said that while the city may not see that full benefit immediately, it's what is "10 years down the road" that the city should consider.

"It's not a moneymaker. It's a town-maker," Barta said of the program. "Not everybody wants to build new, but if they do, we should provide incentives for them to build."

Commissioners appeared to agree with Aeschliman and others present at Monday's meeting about bringing the program back. But as McKee noted, Jackson County officials should be contacted as well about reviving the program.

"The way it's worked in the past, the county starts it up and the cities join in," McKee said. Every time the county offered it, we've joined in... If they adopted a new program, we'd put it to the commission about joining in again."

In other business on Monday, commissioners approved hiring Wichita-based infrastructure planning firm UCI to provide the city with a detailed proposal for work on the water clarifier at the city's water plant, whether the proposal involves building a new clarifier or rehabilitating the existing one, at a cost of

McKee said the city has been investigating the cost of repairing the 38-year-old clarifier, which separates minerals such as iron and manganese from the city's drinking water. Engineer Don Hellar of EBH Engineering of Great Bend has been working with the city on rehabilitating the water plant and recommended UCI to the city based on their work on similar clarifiers.

Hellar told commissioners prior to Monday's meeting, he met with UCI representatives who provided him with a \$510,000 estimate for a completely new clarifier, which for the city may "blow the budget" but would be a better option than rehabilitation. He said that while rehabilitation of the clarifier is still recommended, there are reasons why some contractors still prefer installing a new one.

"My general rule of thumb is that if I can rehab it for half of new or less, I'll look at that, but if it's more than that or the equipment is 35 to 40 years old, I get nervous," Hellar told commissioners. "Six months after you're done, something else may go wrong.

Commissioner Dan Brenner asked whether "technology has evolved" to the point where the city could get along without a clarifier. Hellar said that while there is technology available, the city's plant still needs a clarifier because of the amount of iron and manganese in pretreated water.

'There's so much that it just plugs up the filters so fast," Hellar added.

Commissioners also: ■ Noted the absence of Commissioner Twila White. Commissioners present included Brenner, Robert

Dieckmann (mayor), Meerpohl and Tim Morris. ■ Approved minutes from the commission's May 7 meeting and budget appropriations made

since that meeting. Approved a home occupation business application as submitted by Michael J. Craig for a small engine repair business at 225 W. Second St. after the Holton Planning Commission recommended approval.

Approved a liquor license renewal for Down The Hatch Liquor L.L.C., doing business as Jerome's Retail Liquor. McKee said the new owner of the liquor store, located at 409 Arizona Ave., has opted not to change the name of the store.

■ Voiced approval of a request from McKee to attend the International City/County Management Association convention in Baltimore, Md., this September.

■ Heard a progress report from McKee on the brick street rehabilitation project in the 600 block of Iowa Avenue, which has been delayed by recent
